During the Christmas season, from Advent until the Epiphany, I participated in a virtual retreat centered on the ancient practice of "Give Me a Word," a practice associated with the Desert Mothers and Fathers from the first few centuries of Christianity. Seekers would find a hermit in the desert and ask to be given a word. They would then journey with this word, letting it teach, guide, and transform them for days, months, or years. The invitation of the retreat I completed was to find a word that I will travel with for 2026. The word I was given during days of readings, meditations, and journaling is "the Way." (I know. I know. That's two words.)

As I'm sure you are aware, what is now Christianity began as a movement in Judaism. In the first few decades after Jesus' death, his disciples and those gathering around them were not called Christians. Instead, they were often referred to as "followers of the Way." The early decades of this new Jewish sect fascinate me, and I am currently insatiably curious about "the Way." In one of the most famous scripture passages, Jesus described himself as "the Way," (John 14:6), but what does that really mean, and how does one find the Way?

While I'm hoping (ok, expecting) to grow in understanding during 2026, my starting place for the Way is along these lines: The Way is a path of interdependence between myself, others, and God. Taking out any one of those three risks reduces my journey to self-reification and invites an understanding of God, others, and myself that becomes self-serving, despite my best intentions.

As demonstrated time and again in the Gospels, the Way modeled by Jesus involves accompanying, serving, and speaking out with others simply because *all* of us are created with equal worth and dignity. No one has to earn being treated with dignity. If service is the only form of action I take along the Way, however, I risk missing the equally important process of self-transformation. The Gospels also witness that the Way Jesus travels requires ongoing self-transformation, but there's a catch: we cannot be transformed only through a relationship with God; we need others, especially the marginalized and scapegoated, in order to be transformed into someone traveling the Way.

Note my use of "to be transformed"; I cannot transform myself—at least not in the ways called for by Jesus—despite what we read and hear regularly in our society. I need both God and others in order to be transformed along the Way. Even the isolated Desert Elders had periodic seekers to talk with.

I encourage each of you to consider asking for a word for 2026. Start praying, reading, meditating, journaling, asking and/or noticing. Perhaps a word will be gifted to you.


