Christmas Letter from Pr. Jason

"But the angel said to them, 'Do not be afraid, for see—I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord." (Luke 2:10–11)

Beloved in Christ, grace and peace to you this Christmas.

I often wonder what it must have felt like to hear those words for the very first time. *Good news of great joy for all the people*. After generations of longing, after silence and uncertainty, after fear had become a familiar companion—suddenly an angel breaks open the night with hope.

I imagine those shepherds blinking in disbelief.

Could this really be for us? For people like us? For a world like ours?

And maybe that is the most important question of all:

Do you believe this message is for you?

Because the birth we celebrate is not an old story we dust off once a year. It is the ongoing promise of God breaking into the world—into *our* world—with courage, tenderness, and joy. Emmanuel, God-with-us, arrives in vulnerability: wrapped in cloth, laid in a manger, entrusted to ordinary people who dared to believe that God's love could take on flesh.

And that love keeps arriving.

At the table.

In our community.

In the small, human connections that knit our lives together.

Through the students, faculty, alumni, neighbors, and friends who form the heartbeat of St. Luke.

In our online gatherings and face-to-face moments.

In every act of ministry and every step toward justice, mercy, and belonging.

This is the good news we proclaim together—that Christ is born *for all people*, including you, including us, including the world that still waits for peace.

As we continue this ministry of welcome, hope, and liberation, I invite you, if you are able, to make a special Christmas offering. It is a gift that will strengthen our worship, our campus ministry, our outreach, and the daily work of love that defines St. Luke.

Your generosity embodies the very joy we celebrate.

My prayer is that this holy season fill you with wonder.

Merry Christmas, dear ones. And blessings for a bright, courageous, joy-filled New Year.




