From Pastor Denise

Happy New Year Trinity! I hope in this coming year you feel God's presence with you every step of the way.

For my article this month I would like to follow up on Tammy Woodbury's article last month and share my thoughts on the pray ground we are exploring. And then share my thoughts on my project for sabbatical this coming summer.

First the pray ground. I am excited about a pray ground because I want Trinity to be authentically welcoming of children. As children develop their faith, it is crucial that they are able to participate in the life of the church as children, without expectations being put upon them that don't allow them to be themselves. About 24 years ago now when I served a congregation in Racine, my ministry focus was around Family and Children's ministry. At the time I was also having my own children and learning from them about what it means to be a child. My own recollections were dim – funny how we lose that perspective as adults. My children were going to a Montessori school and from that I learned about Sophia Cavalletti and the church versions of Montessori style learning – for Catholics, through Cavalletti, it was Catechesis of the Good Shepherd. Cavalletti and Maria Montessori developed a Theology of Childhood and Catechesis of the Good Shepherd was the result. In American Protestant circles, it was Godly Play developed by Jerome Berryman. The whole idea is to walk with children in their faith journey through a learning process that allows them to experience and learn at their own pace and in the ways that children learn best – by observing, imitating and participating. I learned a lot more about this as I attended the annual Children's Spirituality Conference. But more importantly, I saw this all play out in the children of the congregation as well as my own children.

Pray grounds in congregations allow children to be up front where they can observe, imitate and participate in worship in ways they have traditionally not been able to participate – as their authentic selves. I remember my own growing up in the church – sit still, don't move, be quiet, don't ask questions. It was all kind of traumatic actually. The message it sends is that you are welcome only if you behave, dress, speak and act a certain way. I hear from many adults that this is one reason they fell away from the church and then are hesitant to bring their own children to worship. A pray ground allows children to be who they are as they participate in worship and in the life of the church.

When I was at All People's Gathering last month, I noticed that they have a pray ground in their sanctuary. I asked one of the members what their experience of the pray ground has been. They said they liked it because the kids are up front and participating. It can get a bit loud at times, they told me, but having the kids up front participating in worship far out ways the few times it gets loud or distracting. And as adults we can choose to manage our own ability to be distracted in order to benefit from having children participate more fully in worship. I've had to manage that myself when I am preaching and now I'm used to it. As we begin to have more children and families being active at Trinity we need to explore every avenue of authentic welcome.

So, as we move through this process of learning about pray grounds and what they have to offer, I hope you will participate in the listening sessions that will be scheduled in the new year. We will also try to create some renderings of what it would look like. You can also take a look at other congregations that have pray

grounds – either online or by visiting in person – one is All People's and another is Kingo in Shorewood. There are many more but I'm not going to list them all.

Second, my project for sabbatical this coming summer (June, July, August of 2026). The council has been talking about entering the Reconciling in Christ process to designate Trinity as an RIC congregation. This means entering a process that will help us determine whether or not we can be an authentically open and affirming congregation to the LGBTQIA+ community as well as people of color.


So for my sabbatical project my plan is to visit churches in our synod who are RIC and learn from them how their process went, what were the learnings, the surprises, and the challenges. And then to also hear about how they are living into being an RIC congregation. I would also like to visit some congregations who went through the process but voted not to become RIC – what were their learnings, surprises and challenges. Then in the fall when I return from sabbatical I will share my learnings with you all as we consider engaging in the RIC process. There may also be some opportunity for you as a congregation to do some learning around this process as well. With help from the Endowment Fund and the Greater Milwaukee Synod we will have some funding to have a part-time pastor with you during the summer to help in leading worship, teach Bible Study, provide pastoral care and hopefully provide a session or two about RIC. Then I could also learn from you and hear about your thoughts and questions.

The consideration of a pray ground as well as the RIC process are both about living into being an authentically diverse congregation. Jesus modeled this for us in his own ministry as he welcomed children, women, the poor and all those whom society deemed unworthy. Trinity is a very welcoming church and is already diverse in regard to socio-economic status and age. These two considerations will help us build upon what we already live into as we strive to follow Jesus' example of an inclusive and welcoming ministry.

If anyone has any thoughts about what I've written here, I'd be happy to get together and hear your thoughts and have some conversation together.



Hat, Sock, and Mitten Tree



Highlights from the December 2025 Council Meeting

- We began with devotions and shared a childhood memory of church and how that affected us.
- All reports were approved.
- We discussed council nominations for 2026 so far we have 3 people being nominated for open positions.
- An update on Reconciling in Christ indicated that the initial team had met to discuss the process outlined by Reconciling Works and next steps for building our team.
- An update on bringing the pray ground proposal to the congregation was discussed featuring renderings and listening sessions. This process will be planned for the new year.
- The council discussed a draft expense budget for 2026. The treasurer, David, presented some things that would change in the new year that we need to anticipate. We are waiting for pledges to come in before we look at a full budget.

Financial Update for November

<u>Financial Update for November:</u> We did take a small step forward in November. We were at a positive balance for the month but our year-to-date deficit balance is still high for being this close to year end.

- 1. Net income was +\$1,391; Year-To-Date net income is now -\$7,875.
- 2. We did have \$1,170 given for Thanksgiving even though we didn't have a service.
- 3. Compared to last year at this time, we are \$2,000 up in operating income, but also up \$7,000 in expenses.

As we approach another year end, we do want to thank Trinity for the financial support you provided throughout the year. There is still time for any special gifting to help reduce our deficit so we can start 2026 with a balanced budget.

Special request: For those who have already turned in your pledges; Thank You! If you have not pledged yet, it is not too late. We very much rely on pledges to determine what ministries we can continue to support in 2026. Right now we are at 70% of our pledge goal.


