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This Christmas tradition of ours is a reminder that God so often flips on its head our understanding of what is important in this life.

If they were, then Jesus would be on the very bottom of the list of divine favor!

And yet, he is the highest form of divine favor, and was born into this world in a town that was not his parents home, removed of dignity of being born in even a private room, and laid in a dirty trough that animals feed from.

Surrounded not by family and friends, but strangers and outcasts.

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I think it is kind of poetic, that the first people to welcome Jesus into this world were shepherds, who people considered criminals and outcasts.

And the person who joined Jesus in heaven on the day of his death, was also a criminal.

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The good news of this story is that Jesus didn't come for the righteous.

Jesus came for the unrighteous.

Jesus came to be a light for those whose lives live in darkness.

Jesus came into this world, not to affirm those on top.

But to lift up those at the very bottom.

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This is the greatest story ever told, because it proclaims that the God of the universe cares for even the worst of us, the least of us, the ones whom the world wishes to wipe away or forget about.

Its a proclamation that God cares about every human life.

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Today a child is born,

One who is born with us, for us, and among us.

One who understands the gravity of sin and the darkness of life.

One who came not to proclaim judgement, but to forgive and provide mercy to all people.
