Pastor Cathy's Reflection

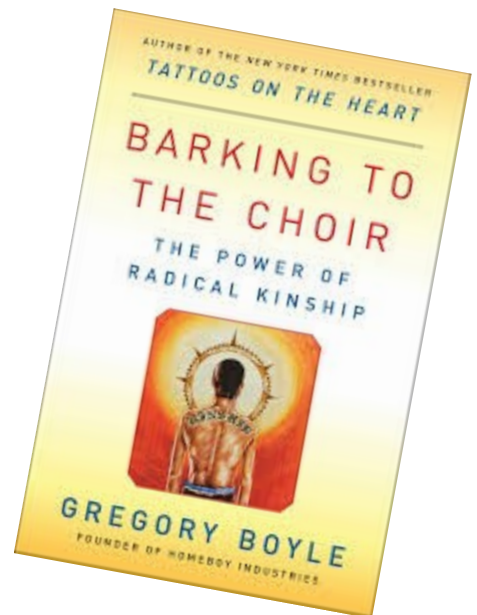
As we approach a New Year, we also enter into the liturgical season of Epiphany which invites us to notice how God shows up in unexpected places and people - celebrating the manifestation and revelation of God. The Magi follow a star not to a palace, but to a child born on the margins. The church, too, proclaims that God's light is revealed—not just to the powerful or the certain, but to seekers and those on the margins. The Magi cross cultural, political, and religious borders to encounter the Christ Child, discovering that God's presence is found not in dominance, but in vulnerability and love. They do not arrive as saviors, but as seekers, seeking the revelation of the holy in their midst.

Epiphany sends the message that *God is with us, especially where we least expect it*. During these six weeks of Epiphany, our Tuesday book study will be exploring the unexpected ways God's revelation and manifestation appear on the streets of Los Angeles as we read one of Father Greg Boyle's books:

“Barking to the Choir: The Power of Radical Kinship”

Father Boyle is a Jesuit priest and founder of Homeboy Industries in Los Angeles. His life's work with former gang members is rooted in a gospel-shaped conviction of kinship, insisting that everyone belongs, even when society says that some people are “too broken” or “beyond hope”. He writes: *“The measure of the health of a community is when it stands in awe of what the wounded have to carry, rather than judging how they carry it.”* Father Boyle's experience is that people don't change when they are shamed; they change when they are cherished. Epiphany calls the church to be a place where people welcomed into community as they are.

Epiphany also shines light on systems that deny belonging. Boyle's stories expose how poverty, racism, mass incarceration, and violence distort our shared humanity. To follow the Epiphany light is not only to feel compassion, but to seek justice—to ask how we, as the church, can help dismantle injustices and build communities of healing instead.



Join us in January for Vital Conversations on Immigration

Sunday mornings 11:30am-12:30pm, January 11 - February 1

This Christmas season we remember that we are a people of faith who are shaped spiritually by biblical stories of refugees and migration. We remember that the Holy Family had to flee to Egypt in the shadow of violence under King Herod soon after baby Jesus was born. We recall stories of Abraham and Sarah's pilgrimage to stories featuring both Naomi and Ruth as courageous migrants/refugees/immigrants, to Jesus' ministry as a wandering teacher who crossed borders, broke barriers, and called us to love boldly.

In order to fulfill the grant requirements from the grant proceeds our church received from General Commission on Religion & Race for our Asylee program, we are required to offer this class on Vital Conversations on Immigration to both our congregation and the community. Please consider joining the discussion.

Scripture is filled with movement, displacement, and divine accompaniment. And yet, too often, our communities respond to today's immigrants not with compassion, but with fear; not with welcome, but with walls. This series of Vital Conversations on Immigration from the General Commission on Status and Race is so important for "such a time as this". It offers us an invitation—a sacred opportunity—to go deeper into discipleship and understanding of those who have been pushed to the margins.

While immigration is definitely a political issue, it is also a theological and spiritual issue deeply rooted in our Christian faith. Throughout scripture, God calls us to welcome the stranger, care for the sojourner, and recognize the sacred worth of every person. Yet in our current context, immigrants are often criminalized, excluded, and dehumanized. In the face of such injustice, the Church must not remain silent.

Our Social Principles of the UMC affirm (§163.G): "We oppose all laws and policies that attempt to criminalize, dehumanize, or punish displaced individuals and families based on their status as migrants, immigrants, or refugees. We challenge policies that call for the separation of families... and we oppose the existence of for-profit detention centers for such purposes."

Our hope is that the conversations we have regarding immigration, may hold the potential for deeper understanding, healing, growth, and transformation. As a Church that embodies justice, mercy, and hospitality, we are called to also be people who welcome, who advocate, who accompany, who declare: "You are beloved. You belong. We acknowledge you."

During these sessions, we will examine:

- The biblical and theological foundations of welcome, hospitality, and justice
- Why people migrate and how global and national systems shape those decisions
- The deep connection between migration, displacement, and land—particularly in Indigenous communities affected by colonization and forced relocation
- How race, culture, and power intersect with immigration in the U.S.
- How the Church can move from acts of compassion to systems change and prophetic witness
- What it means to build congregations of true welcome, accountability, and inclusion

CONFIRMATION 2026



Starting in the new year, Pastor Cathy and Pastor Ferdie, along with other adult volunteers and mentors will be facilitating a Confirmation class for youth in 6th grade or older.

Confirmation is a meaningful step in a lifelong journey of faith, not just one decision to be confirmed (or not). Confirmation is not about having all the answers. It's about learning how to ask faithful questions, how to live with compassion, and how to keep showing up to God's grace. It is the beginning of an ongoing conversation about what it means to follow Jesus, to live out our baptismal vows, and wrestle honestly and authentically with our questions and doubts, and listen for God's call in our lives. Confirmation is a sacred process in which Confirmands will be encouraged to reflect on, discuss, serve, and connect what they are learning to the real life around them. Through the process of going through Confirmation classes, they will begin to claim faith as their own with curiosity, creativity, and spiritual growth.

Confirmation is not something young people do alone. Faith is formed in community. The entire congregation will be asked to pray for our young people as they enter into this bold step in discipleship, and some adults in our faith community will be asked to serve as mentors to journey alongside our young disciples. Together, we will model what it looks like to grow in faith, ask questions, and show up for one another.

We are excited to walk this journey with our youth toward a deeper, more mature faith that will continue to grow for a lifetime. If you have questions or would like to learn more about our confirmation process, please talk to Pastor Cathy, Pastor Ferdie, Kristin Thorsness or Jenny Blake.

Confirmation classes will start early in the new year (most likely the beginning of February) with Confirmation Sunday being held on May 24th when we celebrate Pentecost.

We serve, as needed, to help ease the burden of families who are coping with the loss of their loved one. We invite you to join us.

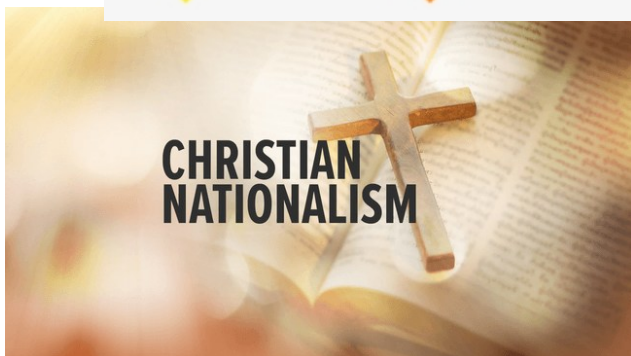


Ways you can help at a Celebration of Life service and at the Reception that follows the service:

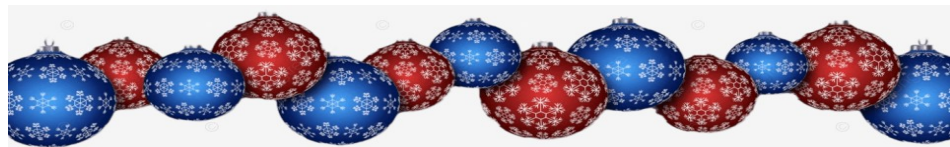
What is Christian Nationalism and How Should we Respond?

Allayna's West Bank Expedition

Plan to join us after worship on Sunday, January 4th, for a presentation from Allayna Farmer, one of our former youth, now working on her Master of Social Work in Philadelphia.

Allayna traveled to the West Bank with the Sabeel delegation to meet with people, communities, and organizations who specifically want international visitors. (Sabeel is a Christian-based organization working towards religious liberation for Palestinians.) They planned to create a bridge between Americans and Palestinians and to develop effective advocacy work upon return to the United States.
