PASTOR'S MESSAGE

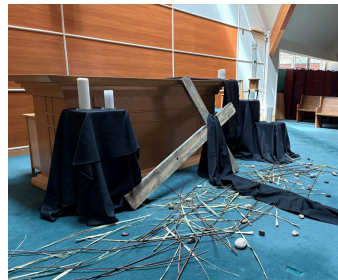
Dear Beloved of God,

January always feels like a doorway. We step through it with one foot still in the year behind us and the other reaching into what we cannot yet see. As a pastor, I find myself reflecting on “time” this month. Not because new calendars magically make us new people, but because the turning of the year reminds us our lives are held in the steady faithfulness of God, even when our days feel uncertain.

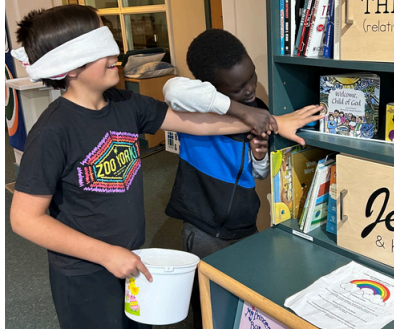
In the church, we don't begin our year in January. We began the new church year in Advent, listening again to the promises of the coming of Jesus. We walked to the manger at Christmas, where the eternal Word took on flesh and entered our ordinary world. Now, as we settle into winter, we remember something important. The same Jesus who came to Bethlehem has come for us, here and now, in our real life, with our real fears and real hopes. Our hope doesn't rest in resolutions or self-improvement projects. It rests in the promise that Jesus came for us all, not for the polished or the put-together. The cross and empty tomb stand at the center of our lives, not as decoration, but as the heart of our comfort. We belong to Christ because he has claimed us, and he holds us in God's love and grace.

As I think about the months ahead, I picture our life together as a congregation. We worship, we sing, we gather at the table, we pray for one another, we have coffee and fellowship, and we learn again what it means to live by grace. Some seasons feel strong and full of energy. Others feel quiet and fragile. Yet every season rests on the same promise. Jesus meets us where we are and leads us forward. My prayer for us this January is simple. Not that we would become busier or better, but that we would become more aware of the love we already live in. The Holy Spirit keeps working through the Word, through forgiveness, and through the fellowship we share. Even in winter, Christ is at work in us and among us. May we walk into this new year with steady hope and quiet joy in Jesus. New Years blessings!

Dear Members, Friends, and Supporters of Lutheran Church of the Cross,

Thank you for your faithful financial contributions over 2025. Your support is vital to the work of the church and is greatly appreciated. Our community and growing and thriving thanks to your care and provision.

As ELCOC Council prepares its 2026 budget, we ask you to consider what you are able to give through 2026, and provide that in the form of a pledge, if possible. What is this meeting about?

For congregations like ours that are registered nonprofits, this meeting is not just a good practice; it's a requirement under Canadian law.

Do we really need to attend?

In short, yes - and we would love to see you and connect with you. This is a chance for us to come together as a congregation to celebrate our ministry over the last year, dream about our future, and prayerfully consider the direction God is calling us. We welcome all to attend our AGM meetings at ELCOC - however only church members have the ability to vote.

How do I check if I am a member?

You can email or call the office to check on your membership status at ELCOC. We will have a list of all current members at the meeting for the official sign-in to assess quorum and attendance. We will also have a sign-in for any non-members who wish to attend as guests. If you are interested in becoming a member in the next year speak to Pastor Lindsey and they will ensure you are invited to our next new members class in the spring.

What do we do at the AGM?

At the AGM our church council co-chairs will lead us through an agenda that will: Review and approve reports & financial statements. Elect church council board members. Approve budgets for the upcoming year. Discuss key developments, issues, and plans for the year to come - like the replacement of our Sanctuary furnace.

AGM Reports will be available to pick up from the church or download from our website on Sunday January 25th 2026.





Merry Christmas and New Year blessings!

Christmas is a story of new beginnings and every New Year we reflect on the past and the present. Many congregations sense that “change is in the air!” The ground beneath us feels different than it once did. Questions we once avoided now need to be asked. This moment is not a failure of faith. It is often how renewal begins!

God is always doing something new, even when we struggle to see it. The Spirit whispers through small signs of life, through unexpected joy and quiet faithfulness. We are invited to ask, together, where do we see grace already at work among us? Where does hope shine brightly (or perhaps in a gentle flicker)? What gives us energy? These sightings are not distractions from renewal. They are signs of God at work among us.

Why do we exist? A congregation is more than its history, its building, or its habits. We know we exist to bear witness to God’s love revealed in Jesus Christ! That means churches have a vital role in our communities. Once again, we have the ability to reimagine our vocation as God’s people. God has placed each of us and each congregation in a particular time and place for a reason.

Renewal naturally requires courage. There are losses to grieve and fears to name. It’s not about doing more but about going deeper. How are we forming disciples who follow Jesus beyond Sunday worship? How are we nurturing prayer, generosity, hospitality, and service? These practices shape hearts and open us to transformation – it is the work that has been given to all!

Finally, renewal always turns us outward. God calls us not only to survive, but to be a gift – to give ourselves just as God became a gift in the Bethlehem babe. Who lives around us that we do not yet know? What joys and struggles shape our neighbours’ lives? How might God be inviting us to walk with them, learning as much as serving?

Trust this: God is not finished with any of us. The future may not always be clear to us, but the promise is sure.

May the blessing of Christmas renew our hearts and inspire us in faithful living once again. May the New Year bring us together in proclamation and holy living that the world may know Christ.

ELCIC UPDATES



A reading from Luke: “In those days a decree went out from Caesar Augustus that all the world should be registered.” (2:1)

Dear church, we are taught by social media feeds and by the evening news broadcasts to know names like: Donald Trump, Vladimir Putin, and Emperor Augustus. World leaders. Politicians, who wield power, who keep records, who announce that the world should be registered, and the entire world moves at their command – even the poor and the pregnant!

The name Augustus meant more than just an inconvenient government decree. In many inscriptions, Augustus was hailed as “saviour of the whole world.” One declares that his birthday “has marked the beginning of the good news through him for the world. As emperor he was called kyrios, “Lord.” His laws were presented in official propaganda as, “good tidings of great joy.” This is how the Christmas gospel begins – a word of power – a decree. The gospel writer doesn’t provide an exact history so much as creates a picture of the world Jesus was born into: economic hardship – a reign of power.

The gospel writer is inviting us to listen carefully and to look closely, busily re-arranging and contrasting our ideas about power, about history, about good news of great joy – in this child lying in a manger – heard against the backdrop of empire builders, power brokers and census takers. To people suffering under unbelievable oppression, under the thumb of imperial Rome – Luke proclaims that they will hear and see truly good news not in imperial decrees, but in a manger – in this “good news of great joy for all the people” – in a birth announcement which calls forth worship and adoration, amazement and awe, wide-eyed wonder and running feet, and hope.

When God chooses to encounter the empire and the idolatry of imperial power, God comes as a helpless infant; when God chooses to bring hope, God comes not in official propaganda, but as a babe wrapped in strips of cloth; and when God chooses to embrace us and all of humanity with the gift of love God comes not as a decree but in flesh.

This gospel writer invites us to ask the very real questions during the advent candle lighting, and our worship, and in our gathering with family and friends, with neighbours and strangers; in the midst of our very real losses and mourning, and our very real concerns for creation, and for what we are seeing in many nations of the world: who saves and who gives peace? who claims our ultimate loyalty? who is it who is good news of great joy? who is it that brings peace built on justice, equality, and recognition of every human life as sacred?

Come to Bethlehem and see, Him whose birth the angels sing, Come, adore on bended knee, Christ the Lord, the newborn king.

On a wall in a concentration camp barrack, a prisoner had scratched an inscription: “We believe in the sun even when it does not shine. And we believe in God even when we do not see God!” The inscription is an irrepressible and strong expression of the hope in God that sprouts even in the most hopeless places. The message is scratched into the wall – perhaps to hold it firmly and to share it with the other prisoners for encouragement and hope.

Like the prisoner, the apostle Paul also wrote words of hope to sustain faith. But he did not scratch these words on a wall. Paul wrote them in a letter to his friend, fellow believer and co-worker, Titus. Together, they were building a new congregation on the Greek island of Crete. When Paul had to continue his missionary journey, he left Titus there with the task of choosing elders for the new congregation. Soon after, he sent these encouraging words back: For the grace of God has appeared, bringing salvation to all.

The words express the core of the Christmas message: That God came very close to us in Jesus Christ to proclaim God’s grace and forgiveness. They remind us of God’s intervention in the world over 2000 years ago, of something that has already happened. At the same time they remind us of something that will happen again this Christmas. God’s salvation is brought to us anew as God’s healing action through Jesus Christ – for the joy of people and for peace in the world.

In Viborg, where I live, we have a nice little lake with an outlet to a stream. There is a bridge over the stream. Here, when hiking, you often stop and look down at the water running under the bridge. And then there are two options: you can look in the direction where the water flows away from you, or you can look in the direction where the water comes to you. It can be this way in human life. We can often feel drawn to look back – to miss what was, to sigh over what was not, to be weighed down by neglect, failure and defeat, or simply to dwell on how time slipped away from us. But we can also turn in the other direction. See how time comes to us, how there are always new opportunities. We can lift up our heads, hope and look forward.

We can read Paul’s encouraging words to Titus as written also for us, who today have the task of spreading God’s Word and building the church as Paul once did. These words maintain a duality: they point back to the birth of Jesus as an event in salvation history, where God came very close to humanity. Yet they also point forward, reminding us that God’s salvation comes to us anew each Christmas, bringing hope for the present and future.

During a recent visit to the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land, I had a chance to visit the Church of the Nativity in Bethlehem. It was moving to visit this place, which is in itself a message of peace and hope in the midst of cruel realities, in the midst of uncertainty, oppression, and isolation. In this very place God’s light came to earth! Yet here, the darkness is most profound. The contrast could not be starker.

After our stay at the Church of the Nativity, we visited Dar El Kalima School, which is run by the Lutheran Church. Here we met several students. A young female student told us what it was like to be young in Bethlehem today. And she concluded: “It is difficult to see the light in circumstances that surround us. But if we cannot see the light – then we must be the light ourselves.”

What a strong, courageous and reconciling message this young Palestinian girl gave to us. In a world that seems increasingly divided, where words can be harsh, and where conflicts – both those out in the world and those lived out in small ways – are pulling us further apart, we need the message of Christmas. Because Christmas speaks about what unites us. It reminds us that hope does not come from ourselves – but to us.

In the midst of all that divides, the angel’s words still ring: “Fear not – for I bring you good news of great joy.” So let the Christmas light this year radiate justice and reconciliation. Let us, in the words of that young woman, be lights for each other, wherever we stand.
