Adult Small Group Discussion Questions

1. Daniel prayed even after knowing God's promise would be fulfilled. Why do you think God still calls us to pray for things He has already promised?
2. Daniel 10 shows that spiritual resistance can delay visible answers. How does this passage change the way you interpret unanswered or delayed prayers in your own life?
3. The sermon mentioned Spirit-born intensity in prayer. What do you think is the difference between routine prayer and Spirit-led, burden-driven prayer?
4. God sometimes places dissatisfaction or holy discontent in our hearts. Can you share a time when discomfort or longing pushed you closer to God rather than away from Him?
5. Daniel responded to God's Word with fasting, humility, and confession (Daniel 9). Which of these responses is hardest for you personally, and why?
6. Daniel confessed corporate sin, not just personal sin. How can intercessory prayer for our families, church, or nation shape our spiritual maturity?
7. From the first day you prayed, you were heard. How would your prayer life change if you truly believed God hears you immediately?
8. In Daniel 9, Daniel appeals to God's character and mercy, not his own worthiness. How does this affect the way we approach God in prayer today?
9. What are some practical ways we can stay persistent in prayer when we don't see immediate results?
10. After hearing this message, what is one burden or area God may be inviting you to intercede for more intentionally in this season?
