# Notes From the Director of Music



## The Beauty of the Sanctus: A Glimpse into Our Worship

As members of our Lutheran church community, we gather each week not only to hear the Word of God but also to express our faith through song. One of the most profound moments in our liturgical worship is the singing of the Sanctus. This ancient hymn, derived from the Latin word for "holy," is an integral part of our worship service and carries with it a rich history and deep significance.

### What is the Sanctus?

The Sanctus is a hymn that is traditionally sung during the Eucharistic prayer, often just before the consecration of the elements. Its text, originating from Isaiah 6:3 and Revelation 4:8, proclaims the holiness of God with the words: "Holy, holy, holy, Lord God of hosts; heaven and earth are full of Your glory." This declaration not only acknowledges God's majesty but also invites us into a communal recognition of His divine presence among us.

### The Historical Significance

## Reformation Day – October 31

*We are justified by His grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus.*  
Romans 3:24

Reformation is the day we remember Martin Luther's posting of the Ninety-Five Theses. Luther didn't intend for these to be translated, printed and spread to others. He was wanting to debate with theologians of the church. There were many happenings in the church at the time that were contrary to Scripture. One of those was about how justification was taught. Our reading from Romans reminds us that we are justified by grace. This grace is a gift from God through Jesus Christ. There is nothing we can do to earn this grace or save ourselves. We do not need to buy indulgences to free us or our loved ones from purgatory. Martin Luther is a blessing from God. He was not a perfect man, but one to be thankful for. The rich educational practice found in the church is rooted in Luther's passion for all to hear and learn God's work. We daily use his writing to enrich our devotional life. Our hymnody is full and theologically sound due to inspirations from Luther. His teachings point us to the Word and Sacraments, the wonderful gifts of grace from God.
