Words from the Pastor

The word "epiphany" describes a moment of sudden insight or revelation. An experience of clarity, when deep truths snap into place, and you *know*. In the Christian tradition of course, Epiphany is celebrated when the wise men recognized Jesus as the Savior. That's their 'aha' moment. If there is some reason to celebrate Epiphany other than it being 'what we do,' it should be a reminder that we are seekers of deep truth, and an opportunity to celebrate our commitment to the quest.



Some epiphanies are gentle, poetic even. Those are certainly my favorite. Still, they can often float by us unnoticed and unappreciated. It could be a kind word from a colleague that invites you to see yourself in a kinder light. Unexpected generosity might spark a reminder to participate in the wider world. A beautiful sunrise can call us in through the majesty of God's artistry. These moments are all wondrous reminders: the divine is never far away. When we pause to appreciate these small wonders, we open our hearts to God's ongoing work in our lives. Other epiphanies are less delightful to experience. It is only human to want to turn away from them, and it is always Jesus-like to invite them in. We see the headlines. We read the Gospel. We are well aware that they are completely divergent. This chasm is why we need to seek epiphany. It is also where we must go searching.

The Gospel is a story of understanding history in order to see the present clearly and predict the future wisely. This search for revelation is at the core of who we are as people of faith, and as Methodists. Our quadrilateral tells us to examine everything we experience through scripture, reason, experience, and tradition. While it would be lovely to have epiphanies where the light bulb suddenly blazes above us, in truth, we must seek them out for all of the pieces to fit in place. We have to plug in the light of our understanding, as it were.

The temptation to despair is great, I know. Every week when we read the World News in Prayer, I feel exhausted. I want to offer good news in addition to the Good News. Yet every week, I am also reminded that the Gospel story tells us the only way to the capital letters in Good News is to go unflinchingly through the reasons for so much bad news. In other words, there is no hiding. And that is, I think, the first epiphany.

In the Christian calendar, Epiphany is the last day before ‘Ordinary Time.’ One year, I want to live in times that feel ordinary. By the time you read this, the liturgical season will have moved on, but if we hope to be ready for the wonder of resurrection, it will be because we decide that seeking epiphanies, the beautiful as well as the terrible, are the only sure path of getting there.

At New Connexions, we have so many ways to practice being epiphany people. The Grove has embraced No BS Bible Study, where we ask fearless questions, challenge our own assumptions, and deal with the text on its own historical terms. Our BLM Book Group continues to dig deep into our own history and how it impacts our lives together in the here and now. Our Fresh Squeezed Liturgy keeps us seeking by ensuring we cannot just let familiar words watch over us, and instead have to actively engage our faith. Wellness Connexions invites us into moments of gentler epiphany. HEARTS, Free Fresh Food, community dinners and other outreach are openings to hands on epiphanies of personal connection to the lives of others. And the list goes on.



Here's a final thought on epiphanies and actively searching for them: we so often undervalue the sense of rightness, connection, and relief even the hardest of epiphanies offer. A deep and Spirit filled sense of *knowing*, even if what is known is not what we want to be true, is a genuine gift from God. Some epiphanies will bring joy. Some will break our hearts open for love. Others will strengthen our resolve. All of them, if we are open to the teaching of the Gospel and the power of the Holy Spirit will bring us a sense of contentment in connection to the sacred and the vision of the kin-dom of heaven.

Epiphany is not just a day on the church calendar; it's a way of seeing. God is continually making zir self known to us through ordinary encounters, unexpected challenges, and even the worst current events. As we journey through life together, let's challenge one another, remaining open to moments of revelation, trusting that every day holds the potential for an epiphany that draws us closer to God and to one another. Who knows, you might even find a few as you keep reading here.

Christmas Eve Celebration at New Connexions UMC

New Connexions' first Christmas Eve service under the new name was as refreshing and thoughtful as the community that hosted it. From the start, members of The Grove, New Connexions' 20-40s adult group, planned a welcoming communal Christmas space that would smoothly bridge novelty and fun with time-honored traditions. With the goal of creating the ultimate "holiday hang," The Grove and appreciated volunteers at New Connexions organized an evening of Christmas crafts, snacks, laughter, and "Carol-oke," finished off by a reflective candlelit service led by Pastor Limina

The evening kicked off with a sense of play. Between the plates of holiday snacks and the craft tables, there was a constant hum of conversation. It was a joy to see different generations sitting together, hands busy with sparkly pipe cleaners and beads, Christmas origami, or simply enjoying each other's company over a cup of hot cocoa and cookies before the formal program began.

As crafts wrapped up, courageous souls took the stage and filled the room with laughter during Christmas-themed karaoke. Over the jubilant serenade of giggles, karaoke instrumentals, and singing, everyone was brought together amongst the pews and the couches and

chairs that epitomized the cozy atmosphere of the holiday hangout. I was honored to help host and sing along with the karaoke crew. Seeing the faces spread out amongst the chairs and pews felt more like singing karaoke with friends than a public performance, and the warm, casual vibes seemed to put everyone at similar ease.

As the "hang" transitioned into our service, that sense of togetherness remained. We moved from the high energy of karaoke into a space of reflection and peace. With a running worship theme "Do You Hear What I Hear?" Pastor Grace delivered a keen and relevant service that touched upon modern themes and threaded together the weeks of relating the nativity story to modern role models such as Maya Angelou and Malcolm X.



Amongst the poinsettias and gold ribbon that marked each aisle, bells and candles lay in wait for a glowing, magical “Silent Night,” followed by ringing in the birth of Christ with a joyous, bell-filled “Joy to the World.” It felt like the beating heart of a community united under a church that had exemplified its own name: a new connection being made, a bridge between tradition and innovation, between generations and forms of celebration and worship.

I remember the moment I looked out into the pews, hearing the jingling of bells and the chorus of voices



singing. The building seemed fuller than usual, and our voices filled the space as we sang. A sea of still-lit candles illuminated the faces of hope and joy, and I could see the vision behind our name and our goals into the new year. Everyone seemed loath to leave the almost sacred vibe at the end of service, as if leaving each other's presence in that unity would break the moment, but luckily the candle-lit warmth seemed to linger with each of us even as we went home that Christmas Eve.

We look forward to seeing new faces and hope you come out to explore all the exciting new things happening on the corner of Grove and Main Street in New Paltz at New Connexions UMC.

This year, all of us together donated enough to give a \$25.00 gift card to each family and staff member at ABCD: a total of 55 families--55 gift cards. In addition, donations provided 2 extra gift cards, which were used by the Supplemental Food Program to purchase food for the ABCD in January.

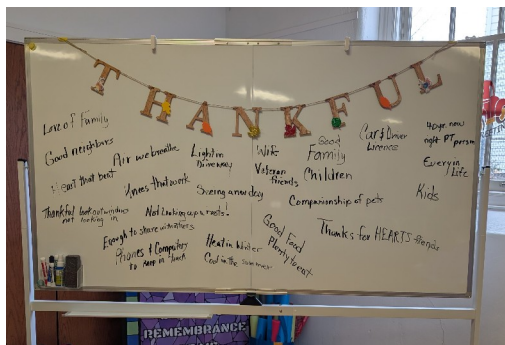

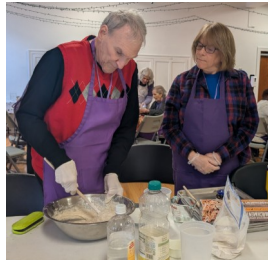

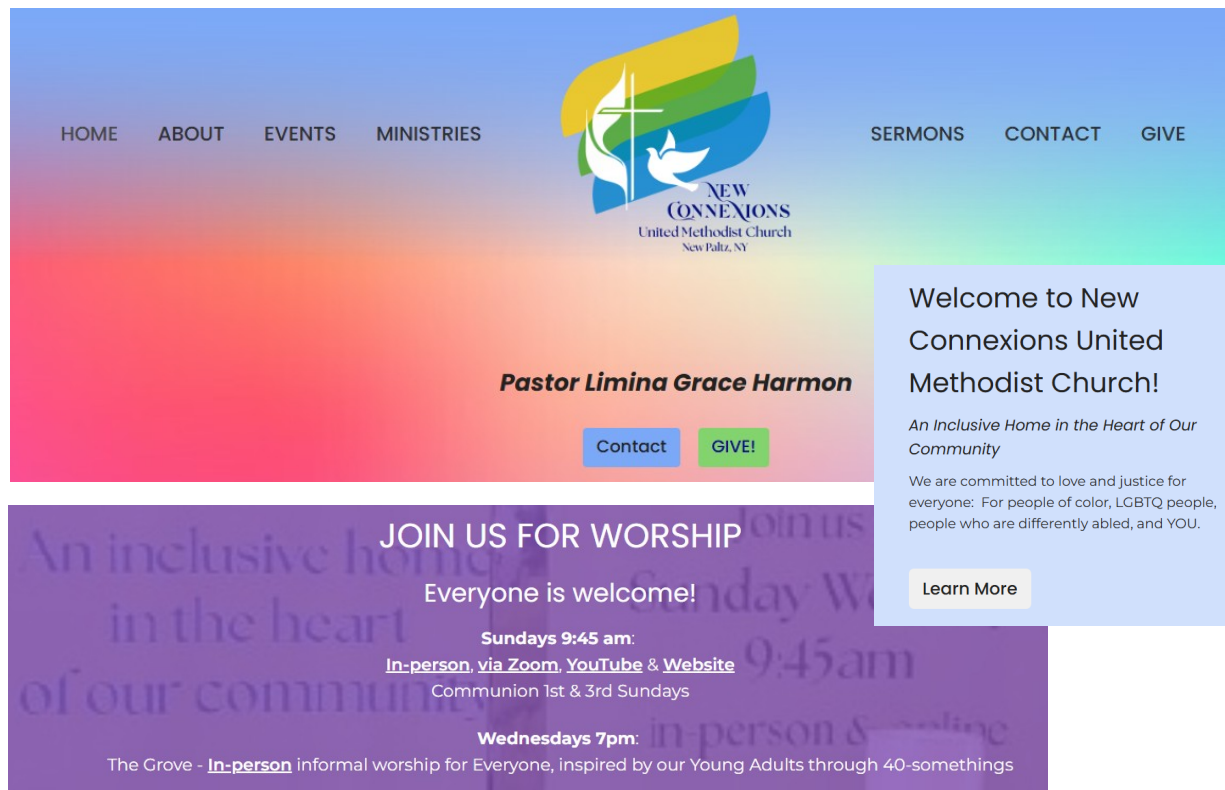
New website for New Connexions UMC

Planned Giving

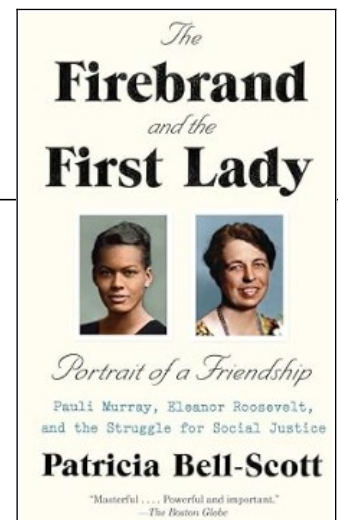
Just a reminder that the New Paltz UMC has a planned giving program. Will you join Jane and me as members of our Church's Now and Forever Givers by naming the New Connexions United Methodist Church in your estate planning. Just email the Church and your message will be forwarded to the Planned Giving Committee. Money received from prior planned gifts will be used in 2026 for the Supplemental Food Program for Senior Citizens, to replace the Parsonage roof, help pay the Pastor and other Church programs. Funds will also be used to install air conditioning in the Sanctuary.

The annual letter asking you for your financial commitment to the Church will be coming out soon. Remember if you give appreciated stock, you will get a tax deduction for the current value of the stock and not be taxed on the any appreciation since when you purchased it. Or, if you give a qualified donation from your IRA, you will not be taxed on the distribution and it will not be counted as income when determining income for medical expenses. Information can be found on the website. Click the Give tab and then More Ways to Give.

Also, starting in 2026 those who take the standard deduction will be able to take an additional "above-the-line" deduction of \$1,000 for individuals and \$2,000 for married couples filing jointly for gifts to qualified charities like the New Connexions UMC.

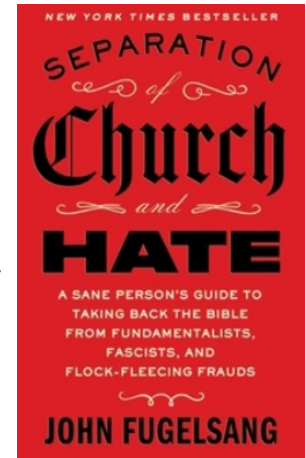
The Vi Cole Reading Group -- Close but not Closed

Financial News

Oh my goodness – Newsletter time again – am I last to submit? I find this Newsletter very informative – information about the church and its ministries – its missions – its growth as we have become New Connexions. And we always have to deal with finances. Money is always a struggle unless you have won the lottery and even then I am sure there are issues of how best to invest – donate - use the winnings. We at New Connexions who have to account for the money do worry and struggle and are also very good stewards of that which we receive.



It has been a bit more difficult this year with the merger with Modena to become the New Connexions community. I will say right here – we have ended the year 2025 in the black. It is good!

We were very concerned about Modena's Apportionments as none had been paid at the date of the merger. Paying Apportionments in full is an important part of who we are as a connectional ministry – we pay – we have opportunities. We did pay those Apportionments in full. We appealed for some assistance from our members – and almost half of what was needed was gifted to the cause. Thank you to those folks who made those contributions.

Going forward and until we sell the Modena campus there are certain expenses we need to pay – insurance for the site, utilities to keep the church safe and heated/lighted for showings, snow plowing, etc. The tenant living in the parsonage is moving out by the middle of January so we will not have that rental income to use for these expenses. We will manage. We will maintain the St Pauley's Clothes bin until we sell the property. If you have clothing items to give away, this is a good place to donate. The income varies from \$250 to \$400 per month.

We have yet to pay the lawyer for the merger documents – that invoice is \$3,000 plus. I will use the surplus from 2025 to pay. I hope the Operating Budget can get that money back once the property is sold. There is so much yet to do until we have only the New Paltz property.

The Finance Committee has drafted a 2026 Operating Budget for New Connexions and presented it to the Administrative Board. As I am sure you would understand, this budget does include the Modena Campus expenses. Your continued financial commitment is essential in keeping the finances of New Connexions fluid. The finances of a Methodist church are critical – however the ministries and mission, if they are in full operation, are the foundation and money becomes the necessary second. In the Methodist denomination, we are not subsidized by the greater church – we develop our own financial budget and work to maintain it. And, as Methodists we make a membership vow to serve our congregations through our prayers, presence, service, gifts and witness. I think we sometimes get so busy we forget these important vows/commitments we made – we need to acknowledge what and how we fulfill these – we do many automatically – let's do them all as a matter of recognizing what it means to be a United Methodist. I think we will be surprised that we are committed.

In the next two weeks you will receive your 2025 financial statement. Use that as a reminder to make a 2026 commitment to New Connexions. Let's celebrate and challenge ourselves to full commitment – I am! Let us see what surprises us.

As we saw in the last quarter of 2025, many new ministries are emerging – Wellness Connexions is an example. Based on the success of the 5 week session in Oct/November, Wellness Connexions is launching a year long every third Wednesday night event – and wow – they are all so different – come and be part of this. The Grove is finding its niche and now meets weekly. It is thanks to their ideas that some of our new ministries are emerging – Halloween on Grove Street was a huge success – Christmas Eve “Carol-oke” was fun – followed by a beautiful Christmas Eve worship. There is no limit to what we can do!

Our food ministries continue to feed those who are short of food. In addition to the monthly food supplement to the ABCD Center and Senior citizens, New Connexions gave a Shoprite gift card to every family and staff member at the ABCD Center (55 - \$25 gift cards) through The Angel Tree ministry. The money for the food supplement program comes from your gifts as

well as grants. Each year a percentage of the Endowment earnings goes to this project. Fresh Food Give-A-Way takes place each 4th Sunday and provides fresh food to families and students. The source of this food is so wide – grocery stores, local farmers and growers – often home made soups. These ministries reinforce our place in the community.

Look for information about Together @ the Table Free commUNITY meals – a Tuesday night weekly meal. We will be doing it for some weeks beginning January 20th.

I am repeating – and this time it is a test -

If you know your John Wesley history – you know that May 24, 1738, known as Aldersgate Day – at a prayer meeting on that day – Wesley felt his heart “strangely warmed” – he experienced an assurance of God’s love and went on to share that love with all. Want some Methodist history read more about John Wesley, I suggest *John Wesley Holiness of Heart and Life* by Charles Yrogoyen, Jr. Why do I share this – because much has happened to us at New Connexions – and although my heart still gets financially heavy – I do feel a warm spirit of potential growth and renewal – not to the past – rather to the future – we have much work to do to embrace our sustainability as a church, a parish, a district and a conference – we have opportunities - let’s grab hold – and with enthusiasm move forward with these ministries and missions.....doing good, doing no harm and staying in love with God.

The test is... did you read the book and/or do you want to read the book and do a one or two night book study to see what made John Wesley tick and help us be 21st century Wesley people?

The Council of Bishops and the Connectional Table of the United Methodist Church recently unveiled a new vision statement – “*love boldly, serve joyfully, and lead courageously*”. I look forward to the growth and love and sharing and fellowship and discipleship sharing that can emerge from our new *connexion*. Let’s continue to show signs for the future - Forward we move on the corner of Main and Grove out and about wherever we are called.
