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## Pastor's Page

On January 15, I shared this infographic from the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) of Minnesota page on my personal Facebook page.

Along with the graphic, I wrote these words: *"Things are scary and overwhelming right now no matter what age you are. Talking about it can help - especially when we do so in ways that remind us we aren't alone or helpless in the chaos. The voices demanding uniformity and complete obedience to their whims want us afraid because that makes us easier to control. Fear tries to keep us alone and apart."*

*Listen instead for the voices speaking the truth with courage and encouraging others in love. Listen for the voices reminding us that we are strongest when we - in all our glorious diversity - are together.*

*God's voice sounds like that. Jesus calls us into community in unity, not uniformity. The Spirit is full of compassion and does not seek to control us through violence and fear."*

In John's gospel, Jesus says to his disciples, *"Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid."* (14:27) This is part of a long conversation with them during their final meal together before Jesus' death. The disciples have every reason to feel troubled and afraid. Rome's power is terrifyingly close and Jesus has been telling them about his impending death at the hands of those who are threatened by his message and mission.

## HOW TO TALK TO KIDS ABOUT ICE

**WHY THESE CONVERSATIONS MATTER**  
Kids hear things. Without guidance, they feel anxious. Be present and honest.

**WHAT NOT TO SAY**

- Don't worry about it. (Feels dismissive)
- That won't happen to us. (Create false security)
- Constant News/Replays (Increases anxiety)

**WHAT TO SAY INSTEAD**  
Focus on safety and validation.

- You aren't alone. Look for the helpers—I am one of them.
- It's okay to feel scared. Let's talk about it together.

**AGES 3-6**

- Focus on comfort
- Stick to routines and offer extra hugs.
- What to say: Some families aren't being treated nicely because of where they were born.
- Reassure them: Remind them they are safe and loved.

**AGES 7 TO 11**

- Explain the situation: Some families are being separated because of how they came here. That isn't right.
- Open dialogue: Let them ask questions.
- Safety first: Remind them to only discuss this with trusted adults.

**AGES 12-18**

- Be direct: It is unfair that people are treated differently based on where they are from.
- Listen: Encourage them to share their feelings.
- Empower them: Support them if they want to take positive action

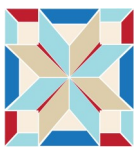

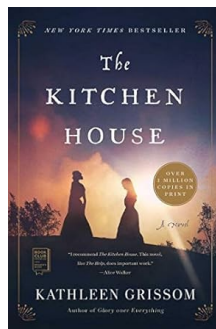

In that chaos, to them in their fear, Jesus gives his own peace. He promises to send the Holy Spirit, the advocate and comforter, to be with them. He promises that the ruler of this world has no power over him, for Jesus' power comes from God.

Fellow disciples, Jesus' peace and that promise are also for us at this time, when chaos and fear are close at hand. Powerful people are misusing their power to abuse, intimidate, and sow fear and division among us. It is OK to feel scared because these things *are* scary. When you feel afraid or alone, remember Christ's promise and the promises of baptism – you are a beloved child of God, part of the family of faith that is called to proclaim the good news of God in Christ Jesus through word and deed; to serve all people, following the example of Jesus; and to strive for justice and peace in all the earth. You are not alone in your grief, your fear, or your faith.

While we don't all have the same resources, abilities, or approaches to this work of caring for our neighbors and working for justice and peace in our world – we *are* doing the work together. This kind of work needs all the different resources, abilities, and approaches we can bring to it.

Maybe you've got the time to contact your government representatives every day asking for specific legislative changes or the physical ability to march in a protest or the opportunity to comfort children who are worried about what they see on the news. Whenever your words and actions proclaim God's love for all people, you are living your faith. You are following Jesus' example.

So whatever trouble your hearts may be feeling in these difficult days, place it in God's hands and receive Christ's peace in return, that you may be encouraged and strengthened to continue living, serving, and loving faithfully alongside your siblings in Christ for the sake of the whole world.

### **Faith & Finances (2/1, 2/8, 2/15)**

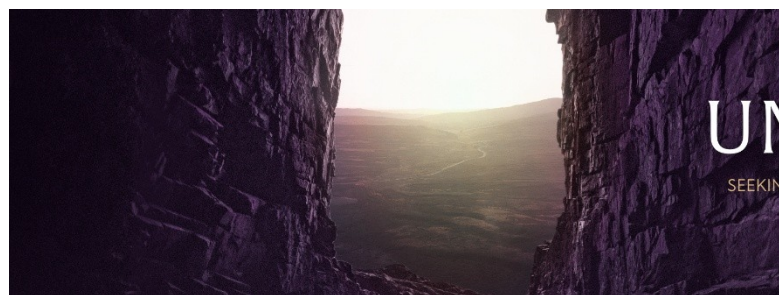
How does faith shape the way we think about money, generosity, and responsibility for our neighbors? Join us in discussions of finance, led by trusted community partners and members of Prince of Peace.
