Board Report

I hope everyone is enjoying milder weather? I expect winter isn't quite finished with us yet however it is time for the Annual General Meeting. I hope all of you can make the meeting after service on the 1st, which of course will lead to a potluck lunch after that. The AGM will review the year just finished and elect a new Board of Directors for 2026. Your presence and input on topics that effect our community are welcomed.

The Call Committee continues to wait on responses from 12 Pastors in Minnesota cleared by their respective Bishops to consider a Call. Bishop Trish continues to work on 9 more identified as of interest to us.

You will recall last month I asked for your perspective and opinion on the offer the Board received from Pastor Bart Eriksson to be a 'supply' pastoral for 3 to 6 months. The Board heard from 22 members who took time to send their comments or provide an opinion to a Board member. In general, the vast majority were in favor of having him come to LCOS in a 'Supply Pastor' capacity... however, in light of the on-going application and evaluation process with Pastors from the ELCA, the Board decided to turn down Pastor Bart's offer for a March start. If we do not Call a Pastor by then or have exhausted our current list in August, perhaps the Board may revisit his offer at that time. Hopefully we will have a senior Pastor this year. Please keep praying!

February is filled with activities for our community.

Pastor Stan is here on the 1st with Pastor Margaret on the 8th and, Pastor Lee from the 15th to the 22nd which includes Shrove Tuesday (17th) & Ash Wednesday (18th). Many attend Pastor Lee's Bible Study and once again, after a pancake dinner on Shrove Tuesday, Pastor Lee will convene the group studying Ephesians in the Fireside Room at 7pm. So make sure to attend the Shrove Tuesday pancake dinner and the Ash Wednesday service! Both will be led by Pastor Lee.

The 'ongoing' Bible Studies held on Thursday evenings continue; the Revelation study with Brad continues in the Fireside Room at 7pm and the Discovery study with Bob on the Old Testament at 7pm is in the library. Call Committee Report

The Call Committee had a very active and stressful year as we continued our search for a pastor that matched Lutheran Church of Our Saviour's beliefs.

We have been providing updates monthly so to save the trees we will condense our report.

The Call Committee biggest disappointment in 2025 was that we were not able to convince Jesse to be our pastor. It was not: 1) that we did not leave the ELCIC; or 2) did not join the CALC. The Call Committee has always focused on the pastor and not the entity as all organizations have their pros and cons.

What we have not abandoned in our search is finding a pastor that shares our traditional Lutheran beliefs. With this in mind when we finished our evaluation of the 980 pastors that were in the Minnesota ELCA and narrowed the list to 26 candidates we attached the following letter for Bishop Trish to attach so that the ELCA Bishops and candidates would know what we believed in.

To: Bishops and Candidate Pastor

For some time, the community of Lutheran Church of Our Saviour has been experiencing significant theological misalignment between supply or interim pastors and a significant component of our community. To be transparent to potential candidates seeking a role as Senior Pastor at LCOS, the Call Committee would like to provide a summary of major elements our congregation has been taught and hold to. Our intent with this document is to ensure all interested candidates understand our position and assist them in determining whether their Christian theological framework aligns with our understanding of scripture and whether God is calling them to lead our community or not.

Our community began in 1962 and our congregational faith is anchored in traditional Lutheranism that follows the words of Martin Luther. In his Small Catechism on The Apostles Creed, he writes,

"I know and accept the Christ of the Bible as my personal Saviour and trust only in Him for my salvation".

We paraphrase this as 'Salvation is solely by grace through faith alone in Jesus Christ'.

This position is reflected in our Constitution which clearly states 'we "agree" with the Book of Concord of 1580 as witnesses to the way in which the Holy Scriptures are understood'.

We adhere to the Augsburg Confession and our tradition embraces these (and other) important articles:

Call Committee, continued

The Articles of Faith and Doctrine state, ‘there are three persons in the same one essence, equally eternal: God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit.’

Concerning Original Sin states, ‘since the fall of Adam, all human beings who are born in the natural way are conceived and born in sin. Rejected, then, are ... others who do not regard original sin as sin ... thus insulting the suffering and merit of Christ; a triune God, celebrate the Apostles’, the Nicene, and the Athanasian Creeds and that the Bible is the Word of God.’

Concerning the Son of God states, ‘He (“Christ”) will sanctify those who believe in him by sending into their hearts the Holy Spirit, who will rule, console, make them alive and defend them against the devil and the power of sin.”

We suspect little of this will be new nor surprising to potential candidates, as it reflects basic, historical Lutheran theology. Unfortunately, previous and current Call Committees of LCOS have found over the last two decades a number of potential candidates do not align with nor personally hold to these articles. Examples have included candidates who weren’t sure if Jesus was crucified or the Divine Son of God. Others were unsure about the Bible being the inspired Word of God and others who did not believe in Creation or sin. Our community rejects these expressions of belief and are striving to ensure potential candidates are aware of our history and desire to retain the historic and traditional tenets of Lutheranism. Currently, we are neither an affirming nor a non-affirming community and remain a welcoming community to all.

Our Vision: *To be a Christ-centered community that Equips Disciples to Make Disciples. For us, that means being a welcoming and inclusive community which ministers to all.*

Our Mission: *We are an inviting and growing Christian presence, with a passion for living and sharing Jesus Christ.*

Members of our community live out our faith in actions that broadly serve the larger community. Notable areas include assisting refugees, feeding and clothing the hungry and unhoused, assisting mothers and children in need and many others. We place a strong emphasis on education and although we have expanded our Sunday School facilities twice over the last 30 years, we currently have less than 10 younger folks in our Sunday School. We offer ongoing adult Bible study groups and a traditionally successful Vacation Bible School in the summer.

Ours is a busy place, every day of the week as we welcome and encourage other charities that align with our mission and vision to use our facility.

I am out of the country right now, but given that your meeting is this weekend, I wanted to respond to your email.

I don't have my worksheet with me (of all the contacts) but I can tell you that I have received a few more emails declining the invitation to consider a call. As a note of encouragement - a few said that they were very intrigued by the introduction provided, but just unable to consider a move at the present time.

I have not heard back from all of the possibilities you had given me and plan to give them a nudge when I am back in February.

In addition, I am working on a broader range of bishop contacts I have in the US - inquiring whether they know of any pastors looking for a change. I remain hopeful!

I continue to be prayerful for LCOS! Thank you for all that you are doing in support of ministry!

I would like to thank the Call Committee members for all of their dedication during this very difficult and complex call process. You have gone above and beyond to represent the congregation's best interest and to find a pastor that can be our "Shepherd". Members include: Carolyn Anderson; Brent Anderson; Kathy Gibson; Dale Mass; Terrylee McKay; Bob Montgomery; Keith Rude and Bonnie Swan (who left the committee in September).

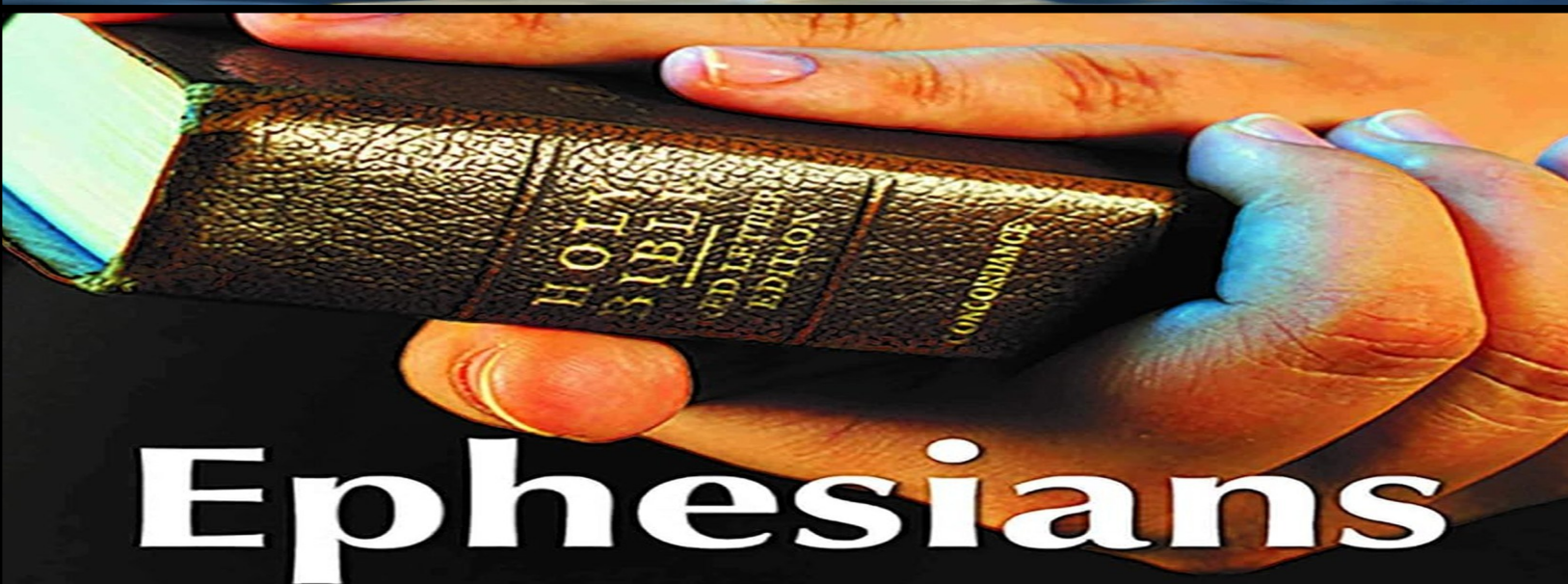

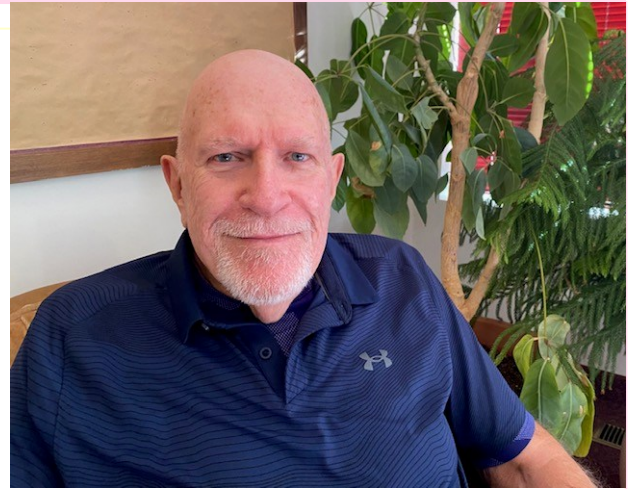

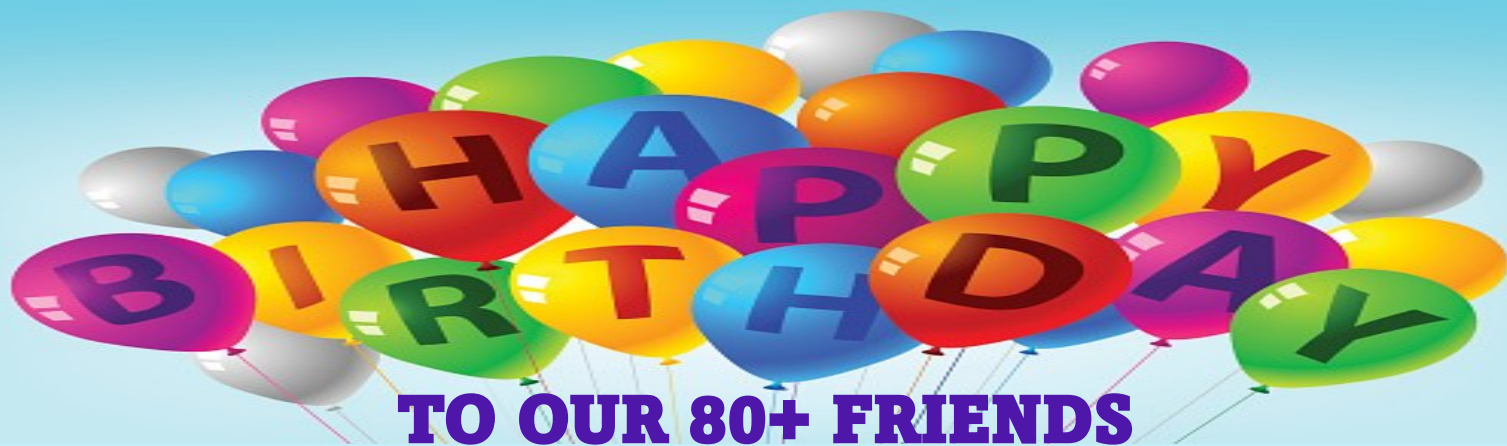

Feed the Hungry

On the third Friday of each month a group of LCOS volunteers serves food to those in need at the Chinook Transit Station.

Volunteers should meet at the church by 3:30 to load food into vehicles to take to the station.

We ask that hot food (stews, soups, casseroles) be packaged in advance in individual sealed containers. A supply of containers is available at the church.

Cold food items (fruit, snack bars, cookies, muffins) and drinks can be dropped off at the church during office hours on Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays from 10:00 am—2:00 pm and should be individually packaged.

A monthly sign up sheet for those wishing to volunteer is located in the Place of Welcome.

Along with food, clothing is accepted throughout the month, and can be dropped off in the Feed the Hungry boxes located by the east entrance of the church. These boxes are specifically labelled and we ask that items be placed in the appropriate box for ease of distribution. Items accepted includes hats, socks, footwear, mittens, blankets, coats, pants and sweaters.

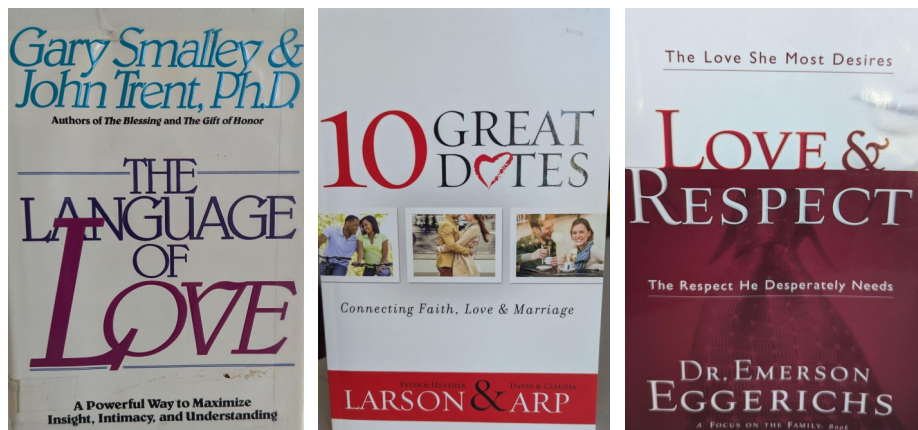
Library News

Time Capsule

“Ah-ke-am” Elizabeth McDougall would say to her children when things went wrong at home. It was one of the few Cree phrases she knew and it meant “Don’t worry” or “Never mind.”



Identified as 1886 in Toronto. Left to right: Elizabeth (Boyd) McDougall 1854-1941, Rev. John McDougall 1842-1914, child Morley born 18 July 1881, and John’s mother Elizabeth (Chantler) McDougall 1818-1903. John’s father Rev. George McDougall died in January 1876.

Elizabeth (Chantler) was born in England and received part of her education at a school supported by the Society of Friends (Quakers). She moved with her family to York (Toronto) Ontario in 1832. Her father operated a flour mill, later moved to the Meaford district where he had lands and orchards. She went to keep house for her brother who had a grist mill near Barrie and her experience there was helpful when they were able to grow their own barley.

Elizabeth met George in 1840 at a Methodist revival meeting and married in 1841. John was the first child in 1842, followed by David 1845, Moses 1847-49, Eliza 1849, Georgiana 1851-1870 who died of smallpox, Elizabeth 1852 called Libbie, Helen 1857, Flora 1859-1870 who died of smallpox, and George born in 1861 at Rosville Mission on Lake Winnipeg in Manitoba. Young George died of pneumonia about 1880 when he was on a cattle-buying trip to Montana. Adopted daughter Anna 1856-1870 died of smallpox at Victoria.

Time Capsule, continued

Elizabeth was frequently called upon to act as peacemaker when Rev. George was away and the Indians were restless. She also held informal religious services with daughter Georgiana acting as interpreter for Cree speaking people. On one occasion, John found his relatives dining on wild duck eggs. Tea, coffee and sugar had all been used up. They had little salt and no bread but learned to eat pemmican when there was nothing else. Rev. George McDougall was compelled to organize his own brigade of carts to bring provisions from Fort Garry. The trip took at least two months.

The McDougalls started to grow barley which was converted into meal. Elizabeth supervised the milling, moistened the barley and tied it up in leather sacks. Indian women placed sacks on hollowed logs and hammered them until the hulls came off the grain. It was dried and the children used coffee mills to grind it. Meal with dried Saskatoon berries was used for johnny cakes. A little sugar was used on special occasions. Wild fruit was dried in the sun. Blueberries and cranberries grew in abundance and would keep into the winter.

They used marrow fat and buffalo meat taken off the bones. Eventually a cow allowed Elizabeth to make some butter and cheese. John bought a few chickens from the Catholic mission at St. Albert in 1866. Cooking was done at an open fireplace. Later an oven of stones and clay was built outside. After the Hudson's Bay territory was ceded to the Canadian government in 1870, it was easier to get supplies such as sugar, bacon and canned goods from "outside" when more freighting was done. Most of the family garments were made by Elizabeth.

Travellers, explorers, prospectors, adventurers, missionaries of all denominations and Hudson's Bay officers visited the McDougall home. The daughters did not remember celebrating the Christmas of 1863 when they stayed in skin teepees, but they had visitors the next Christmas. Richard Hardisty, Malcolm Groat, Donald McDonald and Mr. Savage came from Fort Edmonton. Elizabeth cooked meat, vegetables from the garden, barley meal cake, stewed and dried fruits. After dinner, the young folk went on a sleigh ride. Visitors and family members were tenderly nursed. Several members of the immediate family died of smallpox at Victoria Settlement in 1870. John's first wife died in 1871.

Elizabeth applied for a homestead in December 1885, a lot north of the Bow River at Morley. In the 1891 and 1901 census years, Elizabeth was living with her granddaughter Augusta who was born in 1870 and worked as a teacher.

The story of Elizabeth Chantler McDougall was published by Ryerson Press in 1933 in a 48-page booklet by journalist Edna Kells. Edna was the women's editor at the Edmonton Journal 1910-1933. She retired to BC and died in 1947.

Dear friends in Christ.

To live among God's faithful people, hear the word of God and share in the Lord's supper, proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed, serve all people following the example of Jesus, and to strive for justice and peace in all the earth.

That's a recipe for a changed world and a clear answer to the question I first posed above.

May God bless you in living out or anticipating your baptism.
May you know Jesus is beside you in the journey of life.
May the Holy Spirit energize and encourage you to courageously stand firm in love.
