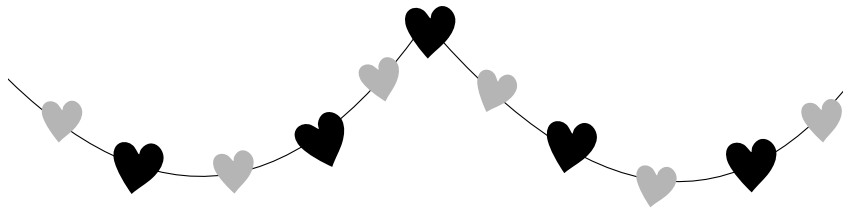

Pastoral Pondering ... A Recipe for Lent

All four of the Gospels have the story of Jesus feeding the 5000. The disciples had just returned from mission work and Jesus invites them to a time of rest, then the crowds arrive. So, Jesus teaches until it is evening and the disciples want to send everyone away to get food, but Jesus says, "You give them something to eat." All we have is five loaves of bread and two fish. It is enough. Jesus blesses and breaks the loaves and gives them to the disciples and the disciples give them to the people and everyone is fed. A simple supper, that leaves everyone with a full stomach and a full heart. This is a recipe for Lent.

One of my favorite Lent memories were the "Simple Suppers" at my home congregation, Holy Trinity Lutheran Church, in Lanse, Pennsylvania. This was part of our Wednesday evenings in Lent. There would be one or two home made soups and a loaf of bread, lovingly made and offered for all to share. We shared time around the tables in conversation and the warmth of meal together as a family of faith. As the weeks went on more people would be inspired to share, more soup would be offered, another loaf of bread. By the end of Lent the gathering was anything but simple, as multiple crockpots of soup and loaves of bread adorned the table, with plenty left over.

What began as a simple meal together became so much more to those who gathered. The generosity of a few inspired the generosity of others. The joy of food and conversations shared by a few inspired the invitations for others to join in this time of shared community. It wasn't complicated, soup, bread, and friends. That is the recipe for a hearty community of full bellies and full hearts. That's a recipe that I would like to share with you this Lent.

On Wednesday evenings, during Lent, I invite you to a Simple Supper of Soup, Bread, and Friends. We will gather at 6:30pm in the Community Room at the Dike Library. Together we will share a meal, conversations around the table.

I hope that together we can stir in some laughs, prayer, and reflections about following the way of Jesus, a recipe worth sharing with others. I hope generosity will inspire more and invitations will be extended to welcome more friends to feel the warmth of community.

Funeral Luncheons
February 2026

Now that I am retired, I have been taking my turn in helping out with the funeral luncheons at Fredsville. Providing hospitality and comfort to the family and the friends of the deceased is important so I thought that it would be good to share with you, how the funeral luncheons "work". I would like to thank Jean Loger for her input into this Q & A.

Q: How do you request a funeral luncheon for your family member?

A: Jean Loger will serve as your hospitality/luncheon contact person. The family can contact Jean (319-269-3236) or Jean will contact the family. The goal is to make the meal and all hospitality as easy as possible at a time of when there are many emotions and many decisions to be made.

Q: What happens next?

A: Jean will ask you if you want a traditional Fredsville funeral luncheon or something different such as a catered meal or special requests. A traditional Fredsville funeral luncheon consists of open-faced sandwiches (ham, turkey, cheese and egg salad), salads, potato chips and an assortment of homemade desserts.

We are flexible and hope to meet your needs/requests as efficiently and easily as possible. If families prefer to have a catered meal and/or something else, we can help coordinate, organize and serve that as well.

The family will be asked if they would like reserved seats in the fellowship hall for the luncheon. An estimated number of seats to be reserved for the family will be needed.

Q: Who orders the food? How do you know how much food needs to be ordered?

A: Jean will order the food. One of the questions she will ask you is "How many people do you think will stay for the funeral luncheon?" Based on your answer, she will order the amount of food needed.

Q: Who pays for the food?

A: The family pays for the food. All of the food except for the desserts are generally purchased at HyVee. Your food bill becomes part of your funeral expenses. The donated desserts are made with love by members of the Fredsville congregation.

Q: Who makes the sandwiches, serves the meal and cleans up?

A: Several members are on a list that Jean uses to find funeral help. The anticipated number of people staying for the lunch determines how many sandwiches need to be made, which determines the number of people that she needs for helping in the kitchen.

Q: Can anyone help with the making of the sandwiches, serving the meal and cleaning up?

A: Yes! If you would like to be on the list to help, please give Jean Loger a call at 319-269-3236. She would love to put your name on her list.

Q: Can men help with the funeral luncheons?

A: Yes! Whenever possible, a male is recruited to help load/unload the dish washer. The dishwasher trays are heavy and the steam really comes out. Thus, someone who can lift those heavy trays is the V.I.P. of the funeral luncheon help.

Q: Can anyone bake to donate bars, cake or cookies?

A: Yes! If you would like to contribute with homemade baked goods, please give Jean Loger a call at 319-269-3236 to be put on her list.

Q: What is the process for getting the funeral luncheon ready?

A: The funeral luncheon workers arrive two hours before the start of the funeral service. Some workers begin getting the fellowship hall ready. Are there enough seats? If not, more tables and chairs will be set up. Red paper placemats are set at each seat, along with a white napkin and silverware. Each table will have salt and pepper shakers along with coffee creamer and sugar. Meanwhile, other workers begin making the sandwiches. The food and beverages are prepared for serving.

Q: What are the various jobs for serving the funeral luncheon?

A: The workers decide who is going to pour the beverages, who is going to keep the food table full, who is going to be in the kitchen replenishing the sandwich and dessert trays, who is going to keep the salad bowls filled and who is going to be washing the dishes.

Q: Who is responsibility for putting away the leftover food and cleaning up?

A: The funeral luncheon workers take care of putting the leftover food away and washing up all the dishes.

Q: What happens to the leftover food?

A: The family can choose from several options regarding leftover food: take home, donate to the Salvation Army, donate to area friends in need, save to serve following a worship service or confirmation class. Jean will help with this process as needed.

For the last funeral luncheon, the family took home some of the leftover food, offered those attending Worship the next day leftover sandwiches and bars and then donated remainder of the leftover food to the Salvation Army. Due to the current remodeling of the Salvation Army Kitchen, they requested that our donated funeral food be packaged individually so it could be available for "Grab N Go". So, cottage cheese and sour cream containers were re-used to put the leftover broccoli and pasta salads in and bread bags were re-used to package up the leftover potato chips.

Both Kathy (the Cook) and Ellie (the Community Relations Director) were so pleased to receive this donated food! As they were busy with their jobs, I asked the two secretaries that helped me if they could share their favorite Bible verses with me. (My Q & As always include at least one Bible verse.) The secretaries were happy that I asked them and immediately had a verse to share with me.

Secretary Mary: **Jeremiah 29:11** "I alone know the plans I have for you, plans to bring you prosperity and not disaster, plans to bring about the future you hope for."

Secretary Patricia: **John 3:15** "So that everyone who believes in him may have eternal life."

A big thank-you goes to Jean Loger for her leadership as the Hospitality/Funeral Luncheon Chair and to all of the Fredsville members who bake and/or serve the Fredsville funeral luncheons. You are doing God's work in providing comfort to the grieving families and friends.

Council Meeting Minutes

Date: Sunday, January 25, 2026 11:00 am

Call to Order & Devotions

The meeting was called to order by Council President Brenda Cooper. Pastor led a brief devotion and opening prayer, giving thanks for laughter and community and asking for the Spirit's guidance in the council's conversation and decisions.

Attendance: Linda Nielsen, Roy Stefan, Keene Petersen; Wanda Nielsen, Tom Verhulst, Todd Mikkelsen, Tony Norton, Abby Brekke, Amy Camarata, Pastor Lee.

Guests:

- Dan Crotty (Property Committee / HVAC presentation)

New Business:

Property Committee – HVAC Proposal

Dan Crotty, on behalf of the Property Committee, presented a proposal for HVAC upgrades to the sanctuary and gathering space. Dan provided council with a handout that compared the bids received and discussed the project.

- One unit is unrepairable and the others are aging with repair issues.
- Likely funding sources: primarily the Memorial Fund for this major capital project, with Building fund available for smaller projects. Dan will check whether rebates are available through CFU or other sources; council noted commercial rebates are often more limited than residential.
- Due to the project size, congregational approval is required.
- The goal is to present this proposal for vote at the upcoming annual meeting Feb 15.

Motion: To accept the Property Committee's recommendation to proceed with the HVAC replacement project as proposed by Mike Fereday for a base cost of \$67,781, and to seek congregational approval at the annual meeting to spend up to \$75,000 total for this project (to cover incidental electrical work and other contingencies).

Motion to approve: Amy Camarata

Seconded by: Tony Norton

Vote: Motion carried unanimously.

Secretary's Report

Minutes from the previous council meeting were distributed by Abby via email.
Approved via email by majority.

Treasurer's / Financial Reports (Linda Nielsen-Treasurer)

General Fund: \$77,007.97

Building Fund: \$20,014.54

Memorial Fund: \$9,023.40

Synod/ELCA Benevolence

- Current budgeted benevolence is \$6,000.
- Council discussed the importance of benevolence giving.

Motion: To increase the annual synod/ELCA benevolence line in the 2026 budget from \$6,000 to \$7,000. Linda reminded everyone that once we commit to that amount. We need to honor our commitment, as the NEIA Synod will count on that number. Council understood.

Moved by: Tom Verhulst

Second by: Amy Camarata

Vote: Motion carried.

Constitutional & Bylaw Updates

- Pastor reported required updates from the ELCA and Synod, including:
 - Updated language (Word and Sacrament, Word and Service, deacons, etc.).
 - Minor spelling and wording corrections.
 - Ensuring all previously adopted updates were properly saved and incorporated.
 - A second vote is required on the previously adopted change regarding council spending authority:
 - Council may approve expenditures without congregational vote up to 10% of the last approved budget.
 - This allows the limit to scale with the size of the budget and congregation.
 - These items will be included on the annual meeting agenda.

Nominations & Committee Updates

- Outgoing members include Tom Verhulst, Brenda Cooper (President) and Todd Mikkelsen.
- New nominees:
 - Amanda Bakker
 - Gary Kohen
 - One additional council member is still being pursued.

Endowment Committee

- Melissa Loger and Loren Bakker have agreed to serve.

- Carl Nielsen has agreed to serve.
- Tom confirmed that the farm lease termination/renewal notice has already been sent for the next cycle.

Cemetery Committee

- Art, Jim, and Roy have agreed to continue serving.

Mutual Ministry Committee

- Meeting pending; no report this month.

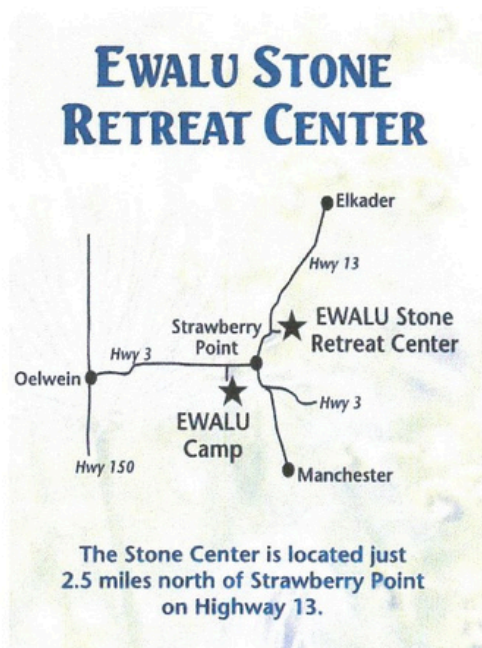

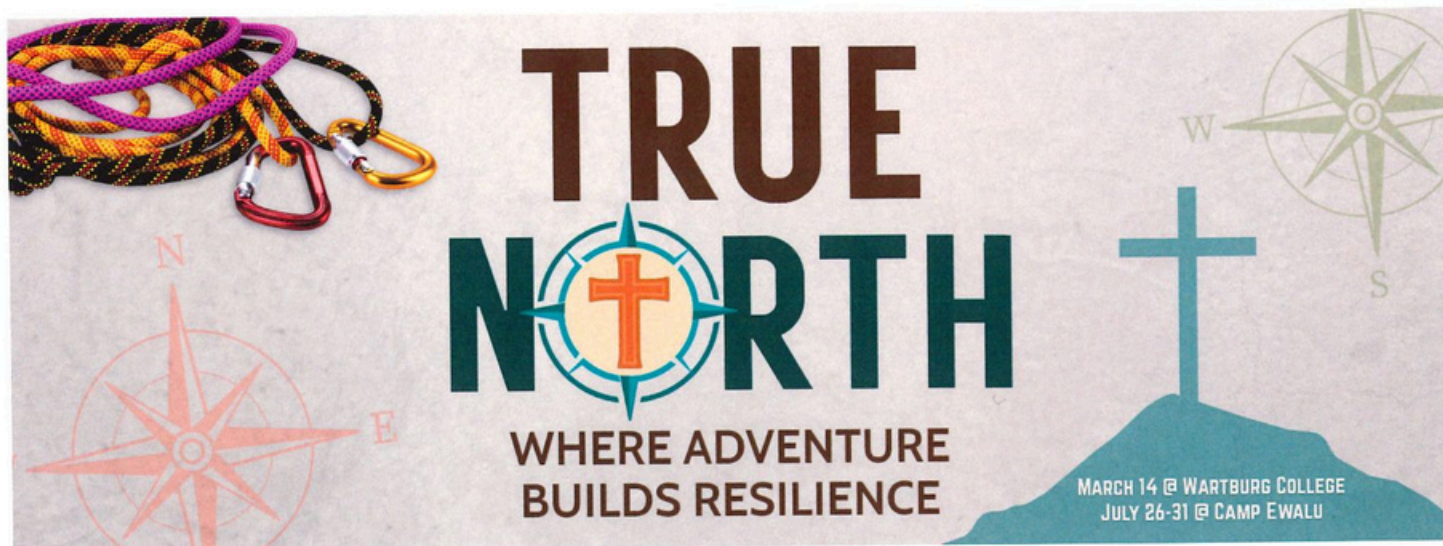

We are thrilled to announce the launch of **True North**—Ewalu's new **high-school immersive experience**—both as a single-day spring event at Wartburg College and a full-week summer camp beginning in 2026.

We would love to have your youth in grades 9-12 join us for the **True North Spring Event at Wartburg College in Waverly on Saturday, March 14**. This single-day event will be modeled after a reality TV game show—think a combination of “Survivor,” “The Amazing Race,” and “The Summit”—with youth working together in teams to achieve tasks, complete service projects, and grow in their faith along the way. *The True North program is tailor-made to build resilience, leadership, and community-mindedness in young people, growing them into people of faith and character.* (Poster enclosed!)

During the months of February and March, Fredsville will once again collect items for Lutheran World Relief Personal Care kits and assemble them on Palm Sunday.

Cleanliness may not actually be next to godliness, but it certainly helps a person feel more human. When families find their homes destroyed, or must flee for their safety, soap and a towel may not make the cut for what they can carry. Arriving in a refugee camp or other place of safety, they are scared, vulnerable and dirty from the travel. The simple items included in these kits provide much-needed self-care, critical germ fighting, and the chance to regain dignity amidst situations of fear and uncertainty. Join us in making a big difference in the lives of our brothers and sisters in Christ.

The following items go in each kit:

- **One - lightweight cotton or cotton blend bath size towel**
 - (20' x 40' to 27' x 52') dark colors recommended
- **Two or three - bath-size bars of soap equaling 8 to 9 oz.**
 - any brand, in original wrapping; no mini or hotel size bars
- **One - adult-size toothbrush in original packaging.**
 - Multi-packs can be broken down and individually sealed in business-size envelopes.
- **One - sturdy comb**
 - no picks or fine-toothed combs. Remove packaging.
- **One - metal nail clippers.**
 - Remove packaging.

Dear Pastor and Members,

Thank you for your recent grant of \$2,000 in support of Lutheran Services in Iowa (LSI)'s Early Childhood programming. This is a significant investment in the communities we serve that will prevent child abuse and neglect and enhance positive outcomes for children in Black Hawk County.

More than 25 years ago, LSI recognized the critical importance of providing early childhood services to at-risk families to prevent child abuse and create strong and stable families. Today, LSI serves families in 28 Iowa counties with Early Childhood Home Visitation services and parent education classes, including Healthy Families America (HFA)-HOPES, New Parent Programs, Parents as Teachers (PAT), NEST, and Parent Cafés. Each program focuses on supporting the entire family and provides parent education to support optimal child development, improve coping skills, and foster both nurturing family relationships and parenting skills.

According to the Adverse Childhood Experiences Study (ACES), only \$1 out of every \$50 spent to treat child abuse goes toward prevention. Investing in prevention, that is, parental support and education, is less expensive and more effective than trying to treat the post-traumatic effects of child abuse. And LSI's work is making a difference. In 2024, 97% of participating families remained free from abuse while in the program.

Because of your generous support, LSI can ensure that these services remain available to Iowans in need. LSI is thankful for your partnership in support of our mission and those we are privileged to serve.

Who are the blessed ones of God? For Micah, they are those who do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with God. For Paul, they are the ones who find wisdom in the weakness of the cross. For Jesus, they are the poor, the meek, the merciful, the pure in heart, the peacemakers, those who mourn, and those who hunger for righteousness. In baptism we find our blessed identity and calling in this countercultural way of living and serving.

Prayer of the Day

Holy God, you confound the world's wisdom in giving your kingdom to the lowly and the pure in heart. Give us such a hunger and thirst for justice, and perseverance in striving for peace, that in our words and deeds the world may see the life of your Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. Amen.

Through baptism we are sent into the world to shine with the light of Christ.

Today's festival is a bridge between the Advent-Christmas-Epiphany cycle that comes to a close today and the Lent-Easter cycle that begins in several days. On a high mountain Jesus is revealed as God's beloved Son, echoing the words at his baptism. This vision of glory sustains us as Jesus faces his impending death in Jerusalem. We turn this week to Ash Wednesday and our yearly baptismal journey from Lent to Easter. Some churches put aside the alleluia at the conclusion of today's liturgy. This word of joy will be omitted during the penitential season of Lent and will be sung again at Easter.

Prayer of the Day

O God, in the transfiguration of your Son you confirmed the mysteries of the faith by the witness of Moses and Elijah, and in the voice from the bright cloud declaring Jesus your beloved Son, you foreshadowed our adoption as your children. Make us heirs with Christ of your glory, and bring us to enjoy its fullness, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

Returning to our baptismal call, we more intentionally bear the fruits of mercy and justice in the world.

Prayer of the Day

Almighty and ever-living God, you hate nothing you have made, and you forgive the sins of all who are penitent. Create in us new and honest hearts, so that, truly repenting of our sins, we may receive from you, the God of all mercy, full pardon and forgiveness through your Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

From worship we are sent forth to proclaim God's love for all the world.

O God, our leader and guide, in the waters of baptism you bring us to new birth to live as your children. Strengthen our faith in your promises, that by your Spirit we may lift up your life to all the world through your Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.
