DEAR PASTORS AND CHURCHES;

By God's grace, we greet you in the love that unites us in Christ in this last cycle of the year 2025. What a joy it is to communicate with you through this letter to share about the work of our great God on the missionary field! We hope you feel truly joyful to be a part of what we do. Please understand that we deeply appreciate the support provided through your prayers and the always faithful financial support throughout our first years on the field. Thank you for your faith, for your investment in the eternal, and for believing in this young missionary couple!

September - Over the past few months, we have carried out several significant activities in our church to raise funds for what was our long-awaited missionary trip with the young people of our church.

Missionary trip to the Peruvian jungle 2025- From September 14-20, we had our missionary trip to the city of Pucallpa, 25 hours from the capital. From the first day we arrived in the city, we had the opportunity to participate in the preaching of the Word at the Baptist church in that city, where we spent a good time with the brothers and sisters of the church. On Monday, we set off by boat very early in the morning and arrived at the first community at 6:00 pm. That day was unforgettable because, due to the low river level, our boat, the "Evangelist," could not reach the shore and the entrance to that tribe, so we had to walk for about two hours through the jungle, both there and back. Upon arriving, we learned that the brothers and sisters of that congregation had been waiting for us since three in the afternoon, and knowing that touched our hearts so much, how those brothers and sisters longed to hear the Word of God through us, to the point that they waited many hours for us to arrive. So many times in the city, we arrive late to the service, or many believers fall asleep during the sermon. I was able to preach the Word of God that night, and the entire service was a tremendous blessing. The following day we returned to the community to do two activities with the children. We sang and played with them and finally presented the Gospel through a play called "The Colors of Salvation." Around 70 children in that community heard the Word of God. At the end of each event, we met with 5-10 children to explain the Gospel in more detail in a more personalized way. We also took advantage of these moments to learn their language, the Shipibo dialect. This helped us to gradually reach their hearts more effectively with the Word of God, using some Shipibo terms.

On the second day, we visited the community of Vista Alegre, where we worked with about 100 children in the morning, conducting evangelistic programs just as we had done in the previous community. That day, in addition to the program with the children, we also worked with pastors from other communities who had traveled with us on the boat. In each community we visited, they had separate classes led by a teacher from our church. There were also classes for women and young ladies throughout the day, and we concluded the day with an open-air evangelistic campaign in the evening. On the third day, we were in the community of Dos Unidos, where we walked, but this time only for 30 minutes, and that was practically the case in all the communities we visited, except for the first one. There, we did the same work in the morning with children and pastors, and in the evening with the adults of the community.

On the fourth day, we were in the community of "Flor de Ucayali," which, like the first community, consists of tribes that are difficult to access.

Therefore, there is a greater material and even spiritual need, since the shamans (witch doctors) are the "doctors" of those places, whom the population respects. Medicine and pills have not reached these places, so their main point of reference and the people they turn to in a difficult situation are the shamans.

On the other hand, the brothers and sisters of this community, unlike the other tribes, did not have a place to meet, so they usually gather in the empty lot of a church member, and there, in the open air, we carried out the activities with the children and adults all day. We also experienced a tremendous downpour; however, that did not stop us from continuing with the program, nor did it stop the brothers and sisters from coming to church despite the weather. It is worth noting that none of these communities had electricity, running water, medical centers, or hospitals. I ask for your prayers because this week I received the news that the daughter of the pastor of the Vista Alegre community died at the age of 14 from a fever and sore throat. The pastor's name is Agustín. The 22 brothers and sisters, both young people and adults, who traveled with us, were tremendously challenged by the Lord. Some young people have surrendered to the Lord to serve Him full-time. Some of them are: Daniel, Pedro, Carolina, and Damaris. Please help me by praying for them. A week later, with the same evangelistic group, we held an evangelistic campaign at the church, inviting all the children from the neighborhood for "Children's Day." It was very nice to be able to do the same thing we did in the jungle of our country, but this time in our own Jerusalem

October - October is a very special month for us because in this month we celebrate, and will continue to celebrate for many years, the birthday of our firstborn, Adaiah. On October 7th, our little Adaiah turned one year old, and we were able to have a small gathering with some children from the church thanks to a family who gave us a cake and some sweets for Adaiah's birthday. Please pray that the Lord will continue to give us wisdom to raise our daughter. The second week we had the opportunity to go to a nursing home where we were able to share the Gospel with them through a play titled: "This Is For You," an evangelistic play that conveys the Word of God in a very practical way. We took the opportunity to accompany one of our young women who was going to teach some psychology classes at this place, and together we brought them the most important thing: "THE GOSPEL OF SALVATION." And finally, we ended the month of October with the activity "Celebrating Life," where for the first time we marched throughout our neighborhood saying "yes" to life and "no" to death. This is because in our countries Halloween is openly celebrated, worshipping Satan. About 70 people participated, including children and adults. Thank God many parents brought their children to church to go out into the streets with our banners instead of allowing them to go to events at their schools where they celebrate death. Please pray for our Children's Ministry.

November - This month we began with a visit from a Colombian missionary to our church, supporting us and visiting other churches at the same time. We continued with a Youth Conference with sister churches in a rural setting; among all the activities, the most outstanding was the exposition of the Bible, challenging us all to live in shalom and holiness in the different relationships of life. In the second week, I was able to travel to visit one of our missionaries sent to the field, in the city of Chiclayo. It was three days of seeing the work and working together so that those around us would hear and know Christ the Lord. At the local church, we continued our Bible study classes two days a week, held youth meetings, and also had the joy of celebrating Thanksgiving together during the last week of the month; during those four weeks, we offered thanks in every service, and in the special Thanksgiving service, we shared food and praised the name of God the Father for all His blessings, for His Son, and for the Holy Spirit He has given us.

December - Starting the month with the Christmas season, we had our annual mission trip to the city of Ica. We embarked on the journey with a first group from the church that took the lead starting on Thursday, and on the main day, Saturday, the second group joined us very early in the morning. Everyone shared the same spirit of bringing the message of the true Nativity to this low-income area where Berea Baptist Bible Church is being established. The total group consisted of 75 people, and we managed to divide ourselves into groups and announce the good news throughout the area. We finished the afternoon with a children's show about the true meaning of the season, Jesus.

We also shared gifts, hot chocolate, and panettone with 200 people, including children and parents. During the last two weeks of the month, at the local church, we had the closing of the institute and the end-of-year celebration with the servants of each ministry, and we enjoyed a special lunch and raffled food baskets for the brothers and sisters who faithfully worked throughout the year. Finally, we concluded the month's activities with our big Christmas hot chocolate event at our church facilities; there we gathered different groups of mothers and children belonging to a government assistance program, and we had the great privilege of filling them with smiles with a special program and play, but above all, bringing them the message of salvation through the preaching of Christ. Everyone received gifts and food; what great joy to provide earthly bread and share about the Bread of eternal life. Glory to the Lord for this privilege!

We praise the Lord for allowing us to complete this first year with His good hand in our work on the mission field and especially in our home, and for the joy of seeing our daughter Adaiah grow during these 14 months of life, for the health and development that the Lord grants her to this day, and we are joyful to have the opportunity to raise her and mold her life in the fear of the Lord through our work as parents. Thank you for praying for the three of us! Finally, we want to say that we sincerely appreciate the time you take to pray for missionaries! And we ask that you remain faithful in interceding for all of us who are involved in the Lord's work; your prayers sustain us. Thank the Lord, who always takes special care of us. Your fervent prayer imparts encouragement to our daily work, spiritual strength, and God's provision! Finally, I would like to ask for your support, brothers and sisters, that you continue to remember these specific requests in your prayers during this new stage that God is giving us:
