Pastor's Message

Dear Saints,

I was listening to a devotion recently that focused on the word, "Wonder". Wonder, as in, how in the world did this come to be. Or, how blessed are the flowers, the forests, and the trees, they shout and sing wonder, to those with ears to hear.

I'll confess (and lament), that sometimes, in the busyness, deadlines, and ordinary demands, taking a moment to notice the wonder of the universe, slips past.

But, in other times, the wonder of our Creator, and the wonder of the known universe, stand in our way; we couldn't miss it if we tried.

I was driving to church, early on a very frosty morning, and I could see the Flatirons in the foothills in the distance. They were shimmering, as the snow reflected the early sunshine, and a misty, foggy blanket obscured the areas around them. Wonder! O, Lord, Wonder!

As if on cue, the wonder of the season of Lent will begin this month. The theme is borrowed from Matthew 25, "Lord, when did we see you?" I wonder if the question is a reply from folks going about their regular lives, whose busyness, has obscured the face of Christ Jesus.

We will spend time reflecting on the question, and the circumstances when we might ask the same question. "Lord, when did we see you?"

I hope you will join the midweek worship services at 5:30 p.m., once again singing the familiar, "Holden Evening Prayer" service, and sharing a light supper afterwards. Everyone is invited to take an hour out of our busy week to focus on the wonder of God's presence, and the questions that prompt us to see.

The question, "Lord, when did we see you", may very well lead us to proclaim, Lord, I do see you! I see you, lord, in my sisters and my brothers, in the guest in worship, and in the ones who come seeking some long-lost Wonder. Perhaps that is an invitation for us all.

Lord, help us to see you, when your presence is obscured.

Deacon Korra's Reflections

Youth need to belong before they believe- When you think of Gen Z and Gen Alpha, what are the first words that come to mind? Maybe words such as technology, social media, or digital native? Most of us would not think of the single biggest issue facing young people today: *loneliness*. Gen Z is the loneliest generation ever. How can a generation be simultaneously connected to the entire world all the time and experience record levels of loneliness? What sociologists have been uncovering in recent years is an intense form of retreatism. People build up walls, letting in others that they already know and trust deeply.

As written in the book, "Faithful Futures" by Josh Packard, "When it comes to loneliness, the role of spiritual and religious well-being is of vital importance. The good news is that studies show that *individuals who have a strong sense of religious practices tend to experience lower levels of loneliness, because these communities provide a sense of meaning, purpose, and belonging*. Spiritual and religious beliefs can also help young people make sense of their experiences, find purpose in adversity, and cultivate a sense of interconnectedness with others around the world and around them. They say that when individuals feel a sense of belonging to a group, they are more likely to adopt the group's beliefs and norms."

Sociologists and psychiatrists have confirmed for years that, "youth need to belong before they believe". Do our young people feel they "belong" at First Lutheran? Do other generations and ages feel they truly belong and feel accepted? This year we will focus on building relationships with each other among all generations. To create a sense of belonging that can lead to believing, we need to engage young people as individuals and use low-trust tools around relationships. We will work towards a sense of purpose and spiritual identity.

Consider introducing yourself to a teenager and get to know them over time. Introduce yourself to one of our many young families and express a genuine interest in their life. Thank you for your continued partnership in helping our young people feel a sense of belonging and helping them grow in their Christian Faith.

Deacon Korra will be leading classes for children and parents about Holy Communion during the season of Lent. These will take place on Wednesday

evenings after the Lenten worship service for five consecutive weeks starting February 25 through March 25. Typically, these classes are for children grades 2-5 but depending on your child, it can be for anyone interested and eager to participate. Families are invited to enjoy the Lenten soup supper in addition to the class instruction. Kids will enjoy hands-on activities as well as videos that are engaging and informative. Shrove Tuesday

Shrove Tuesday is the day before Ash Wednesday and marks the final day before the season of Lent begins. The word "shrove" comes from "shrive," meaning to confess and receive forgiveness. Christians traditionally used this day to prepare their hearts for Lent through reflection, repentance, and prayer.

Because Lent was historically a time of fasting, households would use up rich foods like eggs, butter, and sugar on this day—giving rise to familiar traditions such as pancake suppers and community gatherings.

As we approach Lent, Shrove Tuesday invites us to pause, seek God's grace, and ready ourselves for a season of renewal and deeper discipleship.

2026 is going to be an exciting busy year for the women of First Lutheran Church. Our calendar is filling up quickly!




