### **Blessed in the Kingdom That Is Now**

When Jesus sits on the hillside in Matthew 5:1–12, He is not handing out impossible ideals or entrance requirements for God's favor. As Dallas Willard helps us see in *The Divine*

Conspiracy, the Beatitudes are announcements—descriptions of who is flourishing because God’s kingdom is already present and active.

“Blessed” does not mean lucky or merely future-happy. It means deeply well-off, living in the reality where God’s rule is available here and now. The poor in spirit are blessed because they know they cannot run their lives—and therefore they are perfectly positioned to receive God’s reign. Those who mourn are blessed because they are not numbing themselves to reality; they are open to God’s comfort. The meek, far from being weak, are free from the need to dominate, and so they can truly receive the earth as God’s gift.

Jesus is not praising suffering itself. He is revealing that even in conditions the world calls failures—loss, hunger for righteousness, mercy that risks rejection, peacemaking that costs, persecution for faithfulness—God’s life is fully available. The Beatitudes invite us into a new vision of reality: a life apprenticed to Jesus, where transformation comes not by trying harder, but by trusting deeper and living daily in the presence of the King.

The kingdom of heaven is not distant. It is among us.

## **Practicing the Prayer of Examen: Noticing God's Kingdom at Work**

The Prayer of Examen is a simple, daily spiritual practice that helps us become more aware of God's presence and activity in our ordinary lives. Rooted in the Christian tradition, the Examen is not about self-criticism or moral scorekeeping. Instead, it is a prayerful review of the day that trains our hearts to notice where God has been near, where we have been responsive, and where we may be invited into deeper trust and transformation.

A simple way to begin the Prayer of Examen takes just a few minutes:

Become still and give thanks. Quiet yourself and thank God for the gift of this day, asking for light to see it as God sees it.

Review the day. Slowly walk back through the day's moments—conversations, tasks, emotions—without judgment. Notice your responses. Where did you experience peace, joy, compassion, or clarity? Where did you feel resistance, sadness, anxiety, or withdrawal?

Respond to God. Offer gratitude for moments of grace, and gently place moments of struggle into God's care. Look ahead. Ask for grace for tomorrow, trusting God's presence in what lies ahead.

Practiced regularly, the Prayer of Examen gently shapes our awareness, helping us live more attentively, more humbly, and more fully in God's gracious presence—right where we are.
