St. Bede's Annual Parish Meeting Minutes – February 2, 2025

Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 11:45 am by the The Very Rev'd S. Chadwick Vaughn.

Opening Prayer

The Rev'd Raymond Walker, III, Priest Associate, led the opening prayer.

Appointment of Clerk for the Annual Meeting

Cathe Echterhoff was appointed as recording clerk of the Annual Parish Meeting.

Approval of Minutes from 2024 Annual Parish Meeting

Minutes of the 2024 Annual Parish Meeting were reviewed and approved as written.

Presentation and Election of New Vestry Members

Chad shared that the Vestry amended the bylaws regarding the number of Vestry members. There are currently 9 Vestry members. The Vestry Slate for 2025 was presented. The candidates are: Gwen Heaton, Shane Hunziker, and Martha Robert. The 2025 Vestry slate was approved.

Comments from the Senior Warden

Orisha Parsons, the Senior Warden, celebrated that the improvements that have been worked on for a long time are coming to fruition, including landscaping and roofing. She has been very involved in the 1:30 service and the ESOL program. The ESOL program was strong in the fall but the spring has seen decreased participation. Orisha shared that this past year has been a sad one for her with the loss of her mother and the illness of her grandmother. She appreciates all the love and support she has received.

Recognition of Off-Going Vestry Members

Chad recognized the off-going Vestry members – Fred Murphy, Jennie Couture, and Orisha.

Stewardship Update

Chad recognized the Stewardship Chairs, Steve Hadler and Claudia Fedarko, who set the theme, launched the campaign and oversaw the campaign. The pledge goal for 2024 is \$440,000. Currently over \$400,000 has been received in pledges from 77 people.

Report from the Treasurer

Nigel Poland provided the Treasurer's Report. Nigel first recognized Orisha Parsons for all she does. The current budget deficit is \$6,280. Non-pledged income was 25% below the budgeted amount. Expenses were controlled to within .03% of the budget. Facilities expenses were over. Nigel stated that our mortgage loan is being refinanced through the Diocese to include the outstanding balance of the existing loan plus the money owed from the roofing project. He emphasized that we need to be good stewards of the funds received as well as the investments and facilities and plan ahead for what might happen.

Rector's Comments and Recognitions

- Chad looked back over the past year as we said goodbye to Mimi Guerra our associate rector, Ashley Brown our bookkeeper, and Bill McLemore our priest associate. We welcomed Ellen Hopkins our bookkeeper and Raymond Walker our priest for Pastoral Care and for Hispanic Ministries.
- Chad recognized leadership transitions: for ESOL, farewell to Claudia Fedarko and Connie Coralli and welcome to Orisha Parsons and Judah Sali; for Endowment Committee, farewell to Pat Pickett as chairman and welcome to Rob Townes; for Stewardship, farewell to Cheryl and Fred Murphy and welcome to Claudia Fedarko and Steve Hadler.
- Other great changes include the time change of our afternoon worship in Spanish to 1:30 pm to allow for shared meals and celebrations between the services and the new Ann Copperthwaite welcome sculpture donated by Nancy Bruce in memory of Jim Barton.
- Looking forward, the new roof on the Commons, kitchen, and Parish Hall will start on Tuesday. Thanks to Jeff Swoope and Jim Helms for getting bids, vetting bidders, and getting a signed contract. For the grounds, we have weekly maintenance and in the Spring we will put a planting system in place. Thanks to Matt Johnson for providing expertise in that area.
- Chad encouraged us to read the Annual Parish/A Celebration of Ministries Report.
- He recognized the ministries by clusters including Christian Formation; Pastoral Care; Outreach and Social Justice; Building, Grounds and Interiors; Music and Worship; Stewardship, Resource Development and Endowment; Finance and Ministries of Money; Ministries of Welcome, Hospitality and Parish Life.
- Chad recognized the off-going Vestry including Kim Padgett. He recognized the existing Vestry and stated that Connie Coralli will be the new Senior Warden.
- He recognized the Treasurer, Nigel Poland, the Chancellor, George Shingler, and the Clerks, Cathe Echterhoff and Nancy Ward.
- Chad recognized the Clergy: Lynnsay Buehler (longest serving), Raymond Walker, Iñaki Guevara, and Claiborne Jones.
- He recognized the Staff: Laura Pittman, John Whitt, Beth Cannon, Molly Graves, Ellen Hopkins, Jerry Simmons, and the office volunteers.
- He recognized the Diocesan Council representatives: John Branan, Junior Abraham, Judah Sali, and Molly Graves.
- He recognized the Worship Streaming Ministry.
- Chad closed by stating that this is his 13th year of ministry at St. Bede's and he wants to thank all for being the best ambassadors of God's love.

The meeting adjourned at 12:39 pm.

Recap of 2025 Financials

We ended 2025 with a \$370 budget surplus.

Revenue Section Highlights:

- We collected over 99% of pledges - \$435,000 of \$438,000 budgeted.
- **Non-Pledged income was over \$50,000** against a budget of \$36,000, a 37% uplift largely due to your generosity as part of the **1,2,3,4 Campaign for Ministry – Thank You!**
- **The 1,2,3,4 Campaign for Ministry brought in over \$23,000.**
- Christmas and Easter Offerings (Special Offerings) were very close to budgeted amounts.
- Building use income was \$1,550 less than budgeted due to the cancellation of an event.

Expense section Highlights:

- **Overall expenses were \$15,950 under budget** which represents about 4% of the total.
- **Most all ministry and operational areas were at or under budget for 2025.** Those areas that were slightly over budget were generally related to higher operating and administrative costs.
- Utilities were 13% over budget driven by the cost of water and sanitation.
- This controlling of costs is a reflection of how the staff and vestry are such good stewards of the funds we are entrusting with through our pledges and other monetary contributions.

Balance Sheet and Funds Highlights:

- **Diocesan Loan** – In January 2016 we borrowed \$275,000 from the Diocesan Foundation to pay off the mortgage loan from United Community Bank. The Diocesan Foundation Loan was a 15-year loan and that was to be paid off no later than December of 2030. In January 2025, we rolled the balance of the 2016 loan into a new 15-year Diocesan Foundation Loan of \$200,000 to pay for the cost of replacing the roofs on the Commons, Kitchen, and Parish Hall. This loan was viewed as a “bridge loan” until we can launch a Capital Campaign to pay for this project and eliminate the debt on the original Nave construction.
The current total balance on the new loan is \$191,000.
Of that total balance, the balance on the original loan debt (Nave) is \$65,000 (was \$74,000 on 12/31/2024).
This refinancing reduced the amount of debt service hitting our annual budget by \$4,428.
- **Bentley Loan** - In January 2016 we also borrowed \$30,000 from ourselves (the Bentley Fund) to pay off the mortgage from UCB. **The balance on this loan to ourselves is \$2,677.**
- **The balance of the Capital Improvement & Replacement Fund is \$23,000.**
- **The balance of the Annual Surplus/Loss Fund is \$22,320.** From time to time the Vestry may decide to fund projects using this fund or elect to keep it to absorb potential year-end losses.
- **The balance of the Bentley Fund is \$83,340.**
- **The balance of the Organ Maintenance Fund is \$9,600.** These are funds reserved for anticipation of future major maintenance on the organ.
- **The balance of the St. Bede’s Endowment Fund was \$263,926** on 12/31/2025 (was \$225,475 on 12/31/2024). A significant legacy gift was received in 2025 from the estate of Kay Howington that will be added to the endowment – increasing its value to \$378,537.

Ministry Reports

✠ Committees of the Vestry

Endowment

On Sunday, May 4, 2025, the Endowment Committee met for an important orientation meeting. Members of the Endowment Committee are: Rob Townes, Chair, Muriel Diguette, Laura Martin, Nigel Poland, and Paul Werner. Ex officio members are Connie Coralli, Senior Warden, Jim Hansfield, Junior Warden, and Chad Vaughn, Rector.

An eleven-item agenda was distributed to those present.

An investment report generated by the Episcopal Church Foundation was shared showing that St. Bede's held in its endowment a market value of \$227,933.56. Some "expectancies" from deceased parishioners were referenced and, when they are realized, the dollar total of the endowment will increase. (In ECF's December 31, 2025 market report, the endowment balance totaled \$263,926.39.)

Rob recommended that the name of the committee be changed from the Endowment Committee to the *Legacy Giving and Endowment Committee* which expands the intention of the committee from "banking" and stewarding endowment funds, to promoting a plan for increasing the number of gifts from parishioners that are directed to the endowment either before or at their deathtime.

A Legacy Gifts Program Plan was drafted by Rob and presented to the committee for their consideration. Also, an Endowment Policies and Procedures document, and a Gift Acceptance Policy, and a Spending Policy were presented to the committee. Those documents will require further discussion before a motion is made for their formal acceptance by the Vestry.

Persons who make a Legacy Gift to the parish will be recognized as a member of the Morningstar Society. To date, 17 parishioners have either made a death-time transfer of charitable support to the parish, or have made plans that, at their death, a transfer of charitable support will be made to the church.

An intentional effort to increase the number of legacy gift "expectancies" was not undertaken in 2025. However, plans are being considered to undertake a comprehensive campaign in 2026 which would involve the solicitation of annual gifts (for budget year 2027), capital gifts/pledges for the strategic priorities of the parish, and legacy gifts, 90% of which derive from deathtime financial transfers from church members to the parish.

Facilities and Property

In 2025, the Building and Grounds group accomplished several activities regarding improvements and maintenance at St. Bede's. The major activity in 2025 was the replacement of roofing over the Parish Hall, Kitchen, Commons Area, Offices and Mechanical Room. This project replaced roofing that was over 25 years old and in poor condition. The work represents an investment of roughly \$120,000 in the church facility and should last for the next 25 to 30 years! The Commons Area was repainted, new wall hanging rails were installed and the ceiling tiles were replaced, all providing a new fresh appearance. Facility signage on Henderson Mill and Midvale Roads was updated, as well as the signage at the Mission Wing and over the front entrance doorway, to provide a more welcoming appearance. Other maintenance included various HVAC, fire protection and plumbing tasks. The vestry, led by Paul Martin, investigated the feasibility of solar panel installation. That work continues currently with Georgia Interfaith Power and Light to discern steps forward. Parishioner Matt Johnson of Fox Hollow Gardens LLC continues to develop and implement a landscaping plan and provides routine maintenance of the grounds. Kelly Landscapes continues to provide grass cutting and leaf cleanup. Finally, Jerry Simmons, our Sexton, continues to provide twice a week services to clean and maintain our interior spaces.

Lectors, Eucharistic Ministers, & Acolytes

The St. Bede's Liturgical Ministry supports St. Bede's Liturgy and the Eucharist. This lay ministry fulfills many of the typically non-clergy rolls of the Liturgy:

- Crucifer
- Eucharistic Minister
- Lector
- Intercessor
- Torch Bearer (when needed)

At St. Bede's the Liturgical Ministry's guiding principles are:
Holy and Simple, Reverent, and Uncomplicated

The Ministry is divided into four teams. Each team is responsible for liturgical support for one of the four Sundays in a typical month. For those months which have a 5th Sunday or for special services, liturgical support is on a volunteer basis from the entire ministry.

At the end of 2025 and into the beginning of 2026, youth members have started to return to the roll of Acholyte as readers, crucifers, and torch bearers. We welcome their participation and look forward to integrating them more fully into the ministry. The acolytes have been trained for their rolls by Judah Sali and Beth Cannon.

Music continues to play an active and important role in the liturgical life of St. Bede's, and I am grateful for a singing congregation that is appreciative and supportive of good music.

Those who participate in the music program and offer their musical gifts contribute greatly to the life of a healthy parish, as does the network of moral support from the families of those who share their gifts.

Choir rehearses each week on Wednesday evenings from 7:30 to 9:00 and sings every Sunday and major feast day throughout the “academic year,” September through May usually (post-Labor Day through Pentecost or Trinity Sunday).

I repeat my annual appeal for more participation in musical opportunities at St. Bede’s. The choir is open to anyone at any time and is in great need of new membership. All musicians and those with an interest in music are welcome, regardless of previous experience. Just speak to John Whitt or any choir member about becoming part of our music program.

Age needn’t be a limiting factor either. We especially could use an infusion of younger singers. As we’re not quite strong enough to support a full children’s choir program, membership is open to anyone able to make rehearsals – so middle and high schoolers are welcome, too!

We are a supportive community within a community and have a good and rewarding time together preparing for worship at St. Bede’s. If you have instrumental experience but haven’t sung, you may be a better singer than you think. If you’ve ever sung in a choir, in school or church, consider joining ours. We want to get to know you and welcome you into our community. If you’re not a singer, but perhaps play an instrument, make yourself known. We don’t know who you are if you don’t tell us!

Musical participation at St. Bede’s offers many benefits:

- It is a way to experience a caring community within the larger community
- Choir explores the history and function of the music we sing, which helps to deepen its meaning and
- significance of its place in worship
- Choir provides an opportunity for leadership and participation in worship life and the opportunity to deepen
- the meaning of worship for others
- It’s leadership and service rolled into one package
- It’s fun. We enjoy each other’s company and laugh a lot.
- And now and then, we sing things.

Concerts and Musical Outreach

We were fortunate to have a relationship with the Amethyst Baroque Ensemble, a local early music group who present two to three concerts during the year and will continue to make St. Bede’s its Atlanta home. Unfortunately, some members of Amethyst have relocated and the group is not currently active. We hope that they will have a renaissance and may return to us in the future. The Amethyst gap has lately been filled by concerts organized by Brian Bishop, friend of our music department and occasional choir singer and organist. His

creative programming and superb ensemble performances have greatly enhanced St. Bede's musical profile. The next program will be on Saturday, March 21st.

English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL)

The English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) program began in January 2013 and is now in its 13th year. We began fall of 2025 with 80 students registering. We filled five levels (Basic, Levels 1, 2, 3, and Super Conversation). We are bursting at the seams so to speak! Our winter fiesta was well attended with over 80 students and family members and many from St. Bede's who support this ministry.

We continued to staff our nursery with two bilingual staff members (both related to family members who attend our Spanish language services) and others from our parish who volunteer to support this ministry. This wonderful service is invaluable in allowing many parents and families to attend ESOL.

ESOL functions with a large staff of volunteer teachers and coordinators with members of St. Bede's and other community volunteers assisting in this program. Of note, over the past 13 years over 70 have taught in our ESOL program.

We continue to enjoy the updated classroom space in the Mission Wing made possible in part by a 2018 Episcopal Community Foundation Grant. This renovation has made teaching easier and the classrooms much more inviting and conducive to learning. These classrooms are multifunctional, allowing everyone using the Mission Wing to enjoy and benefit from this renovation.

Our program has been blessed with volunteers and financial support from within and outside of our St. Bede's community. Donations, large and small, combined with budgeted funds from the church make this work possible.

Pastoral Care Ministries

Much like the expression of the church itself, pastoral care at St. Bede's is an intergenerational, ever-present, waterfall of love and deep care for the minds, bodies, and spirits of our members and community. You can witness a member of our youth group checking in on someone from our welcome committee almost as easily as you see our deacon carrying eucharist to a community friend. We care for each other as the needs arise through prayer, phone and email check-ins, and visits to homes, hospitals, and more. We walk with each other, celebrating and grieving, through deaths, graduations, moves, injuries, retirements, illnesses and all sorts of personal evolutions. Tangibly our efforts offer to meet the needs for food, comfort, prayer, eucharist, prayer shawls, rides, flowers, and love.

We are working to actively reinvigorate our direct pastoral care ministries and we welcome your involvement in any of the following:

Share the Care: a ministry of providing a meal to a parishioner in a time of need,

Prayer Shawls: a ministry of creating and blessing prayer shawls, either in one's home or at the group gatherings, to support parishioners through transitions.

The First Monday Prayer Shawl Group met each first Monday (moved for holidays) and knitted and crocheted shawls, hats, blankets, and anything else anyone wanted to do. Many people were blessed by receiving shawls, whether for illness, bereavement, joyful occasions, thank yous, or leave taking. Many let us know how much it meant to receive one. Adult Christian Formation

Adult Formation takes many forms at St. Bede's – from various book and bible study groups to Popcorn Theology to Quiet Days to the Adult Sunday Forum classes.

Our 2025 Sunday Adult Formation offerings began with an Episcopal 101 Class led by Chad Vaughn and others. This class allowed for newcomers and long-timers to explore together what it means to be a Christian of the Episcopal variety. During Lent, we joined with Episcopalians around the Diocese of Atlanta as we were led through a series of meditations by Bishop Wright on the topic – “Growing Up”. Various parishioners paired up to lead conversations on Bishop Wright's video meditations. In Eastertide, Lynnsay Buehler offered a class on new scholarship on Mary Magdalene (which paired with a prior Popcorn Theology offering on the film *Mary Magdalene*). We also welcomed outreach partner leaders Kenya Thompson, Vicar of the Church of the Common Ground and Anton Flores-Maisonet, Executive Director of Casa Alternativa to learn more about these St. Bede's ministry partners.

This Fall, as we kicked off the program year, we explored the fundamentals of faith with an exploration of the “Outline of the Faith” (commonly called the Catechism from the *Book of Common Prayer*) in a class called Credo: We Give Our Hearts. We then had some fun learning about the Hymnal with John Whitt and “Hymns from a Hat”. In October, we learned a bit about the “Gather, Transform, Send” model of Congregational Vitality from our group that had attended the College for Congregational Development and we had a potluck luncheon focused on how our parishioners are experiencing transformation in the lives. In November, we welcomed Fahed Abu-Akel who offered history and insight into the history of Palestine and Israel and offered us insight into the current state of affairs in Gaza. Deacon Iñaki kicked off Advent with a class on Marian appropriation traditions from around the world. We wrapped up the Christian Formation with a visit from Catherine Meeks, Director of the Turquoise and Lavender Institute, who led us in conversations about racial healing and how to improve conversations across barriers of difference.

In the year ahead, we plan to offer many other opportunities to enrich our understanding of our faith. Please join us for a class, small group, quiet day, or a book or film discussion. Your voice and the sharing of your faith journey always enriches these conversations and offerings!

Social Justice – Healing Our Racism & Healing Our Divided Country

It has been an important year for social justice, and the political events surrounding our country in 2025 produced more enthusiasm for avenues of activism.

The Healing Our Racism book group, which was formed in 2020 in response to the racial injustice that erupted that summer with the murder of George Floyd, met for four years once a month on zoom. We read, studied, and discussed many books [mostly non-fiction] to try to understand the reasons for the continuing racial injustice in our country. This was always a small group, but it attracted some members from other Episcopal churches, and that was enriching to our discussions and to our connections with each other. The group disbanded in the Fall of 2024. It seemed there were more pressing issues to attend to with the re-election of our current President.

In November of 2024, immediately following the Presidential election, it was discerned that a support group might be needed to help people understand [once again] the path our country was taking. This group became Healing Our Divided Country. Our Rector, Chad, gave his full support in the forming of this group, and weekly announcements began to appear in our e-newsletter.

The Healing Our Divided Country support group met on Zoom for the first time on Monday, January 6th. It had been decided that we would meet on the first Monday of each month from 6:30-8:00pm. By the end of January we were meeting every Monday night, as people were requesting a forum in which to discuss honestly the actions of this new Administration, and to find the hope and healing provided by prayers and meditations. This group has met every single Monday night since January 6 th , and we have a core group of about a dozen people, some St. Bede's members and also not. Since we meet on Zoom we are able to offer this group to people in other locales [we have one member from New Orleans]. This group is co-facilitated by Muriel Diguette and Molly Graves.

A few members of St. Bede's asked for an in-person Healing Our Divided Country group. And so in March an in-person group was formed and began meeting every Thursday morning at Mint Coffee House on Lawrenceville Hwy. from 9 -10:30 am. We started as a very small group, but we have grown and now we have as many non-St. Bede's members as members. This group has taken on an activist spirit. We've protested together in local marches, and written postcards to encourage people to vote in elections near and far. In December we hosted one of our Georgia state senators, Kim Jackson, who is also The Rev. Kim Jackson! We are planning to invite other local politicians to inspire and inform us, and to get more involved in local politics. This group is co-facilitated by Muriel Diguette and Karen Werner.

St. Bede's is at the forefront in our Diocese of being active in social justice areas, from our superb Outreach to Adult Formation offerings, and now with these support groups. Everyone

is welcome to join us! We will meet every Monday and every Thursday as long as people feel they need this support.

Children & Family Ministries

In 2025, we offered two formation opportunities each Sunday for children ages 3 years old through 5 th grade: a "pull-out" formation time for children during the 10:00 am service and a longer class time from 11:45am-1:00pm between the services when adult formation classes and youth group were also meeting.

For attendees at the "pull-out" time during 10 am worship, children begin the worship time with their families and then process out early in the Liturgy of the Word, returning at the Peace, in time to celebrate the Eucharist. This allows about 20-30 minutes for a Godly Play story and some "wondering" time.

The children's formation time between the two services is open to all children ages 3 years old through 5 th grade but has mostly been attended by children whose families attend the 1:30 Spanish language service. This class is taught in English. Using Godly Play storytelling, books, and other resources, we focus on learning about what we do in church – the liturgy and the sacraments – in addition to experiencing stories about the people of God, stories about Jesus, and stories told by Jesus. In late May 2025, six children in this class participated in a celebratory communion service to acknowledge their growing in faith.

During worship time, our "Prayground" offers families with young children an inviting space to participate in worship, and we also invite them to use the unstaffed nursery room if they need an alternate space for either a quiet break or for louder play.

Other events, celebrations and resources offered in 2025 included:

- Illustrated Ministry micro-practices and prayers mailed weekly in the e-news and

- coloring pages and scripture story booklets in the Playground,
- Evening Bilingual VBS for families with approximately 30-50 participants each night
- enjoying dinner, storytelling, music and crafts with an outreach project of collecting
- breakfast bars and small toys for Casa Alterna to distribute to families in line waiting for
- Immigration hearings,
- Advent Wreath-making Workshop offered in the morning and afternoon with a home
- worship booklet available in English or Spanish to help families observe a holy Advent
- and prepare for Christmas,
- Las Posadas and Christmas Tree Decorating,
- Christmas Eve Pageant with young children, teens, and adults who donned costumes and offered readings to help tell the Nativity story.

I am grateful for the entire St. Bede's community for supporting our ministry to families with young children through your prayers, financial support, hospitality, time, energy, and presence. Many thanks go to the awesome team of VBS volunteers who enabled us to have a wonderful week of fellowship, good food and fun this summer as we celebrated God's love for us! And finally, a special shout-out to Junior Abraham for being a faithful Godly Play co-teacher with me for many years.

Youth & Family Ministries

2025 brought great growth and opportunity for the youth program here at St. Bede's, and that momentum continued throughout the year. We have remained committed to our "bridge-building" efforts, bringing all members of the church together by creating a youth program that includes not only fun group activities, but also Episcopal faith-based conversations, Confirmation instruction, meaningful outreach projects, and regular participation in Diocesan events.

To give you a clearer picture of life in the St. Bede's Youth Program, we...

- Created and distributed **327 Bede's Bags** to individuals in need of a meal;
- We pooled our collective financial resources and, with three teams of three young people each, spent **\$163.86** to create **27 Emmaus House Thanksgiving bags**;
- A number of our Youth attended Diocesan Youth Events at Camp Mikell and around the Diocese:
 - **New Beginnings** (for middle schoolers) in Spring and Fall

- **Happening** (for high schoolers) in the Spring
- Honored our graduating seniors as they joined other high school graduates from across the Diocese of Atlanta at the **Diocesan 2025 Graduation Celebration**
- **Summer Camp** at Mikell
- Sent a team of **16 youth and adults** to participate in the **Atlanta Food Bank Hunger Walk**
- Our youth help lead worship and represent St. Bede's at the **Annual Diocesan Council** in October.
- **Winter Camp** at Mikell

AND we also managed to squeeze in...

- our first **Pancake Luncheon** on the Sunday before Lent began
- stuffing over **175 plastic eggs** for our annual Easter egg hunt
- reading the **Passion Narrative** on Palm Sunday
- a spring **grounds clean-up**
- possibly the most **AMAZING bowling game ever** at Midtown Bowl
- presenting **eight candidates for Confirmation**
- surviving one **EPIC lock-in**
- hosting our first **Karaoke Christmas Party** (during the *real* Christmas season)
- learning how to cook for ourselves!

And last, but certainly not least, none of what we do as a community would be possible without the adults that regularly show up for our young people. Both **Katelyn Vaquero** and **Orisha Parsons**, who regularly join us in our group shenanigans, always bring laughter, wisdom, questions and unconditional love. St. Bede's Ministries in Spanish

Dios bendiga. Greetings friends, in the name of Christ, our Lord. I am humbled and grateful to have been serving as priest here at St. Bede's with the Ministries in Spanish for another year. I am grateful for the leadership partner I have in Deacon Iñaki who is instrumental in coordinating worship and events and caring deeply for the concerns of our community. Iñaki and I are further supported by the leading efforts of Judah, Molly, Beth, Orisha and a host of members who step forward to serve as needs arise.

2025 was a complex year that took our ministries through an array of emotions, spanning all the experiences of life. While we began the year with an average of about 70 people in attendance for Sunday afternoon worship, by the end of January our attendance abruptly shifted to an average of about 12 for much of the year. The sociopolitical climate felt by our faithful worshippers did not feel conducive to traveling to attend regular worship services. The feeling remains for some of them today. Please join us as we continue to pray for life in a community that feels safe for all to gather, worship God and return home, not in the fear of harm, intimidation, detainment or death, but instead buoyed by the grace, peace and love of God.

Through the year, families have intermittently attended worship in larger groups for celebrations and memorials. In grief and love we walked our sister Carmen home to God and celebrated her life with her family in July, expressing deep appreciation for her faithfulness to St. Bede's and the love she put into our ministries over the years. In all the ways we continue to gather and honor God, through joys, sorrows, fear and faith, I am encouraged by our faithful attendees who continue to come and invite friends and family to worship with us! Most recently, our Sunday afternoon worship attendance has grown to about an average of 25. We continue to invite God into our midst and stream online to reach folks who still cannot attend. Even with our challenges, here is how we have gathered and given glory to God over the year:

Baptisms: About 4 young people were baptized and their families welcomed into our community.

Presentations: There are two Hispanic traditions of presentation: at 40 days, recalling the presentation of Jesus in the temple; and at 3 years, to give thanks to God and the Virgin Mary for the life of the child. We presented about 4 children.

Confirmation: We celebrated the confirmation of about 9 youths.

Primera Comunión: We celebrated with 11 youth as they received Eucharist for the first time following the completion of their participation in community learning of our faith through experience and with deepened knowledge, understanding, and desire.

Quinceañeras: We celebrated about 5 quinceañeras praying with them as they move into this new season of life with God's help and the Virgin Mary's guidance.

Memorial Services: While I served in 3 funeral services, we had about 2 services in memory.

Day of the Dead: As a parish we remembered those who we love that are with us no longer, sharing in remembrance with pictures, writings, and tokens of our loved one's lives on an Ofrenda (Altar of Remembrance.) This year's Ofrenda was erected primarily by the youth, in Carmen's spirit and memory.
