AUMC February Newsletter



Scripture: "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness, on them light has shined." (Isaiah 9:2)

It seems whenever we turn to a news broadcast or article the world becomes a very dark place. Fear and division seem to cast such long shadows that we begin to lose hope that the light will ever return. Isaiah had those same feelings as he watched people stumbling in the dark and wondering if hope would ever shine again in their lives. For the people of Isaiah's time God spoke of a promise of hope that would shine a great light on the path forward. For us today that promise was fulfilled in Jesus.

Jesus revealed, in John 8:12 "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will not walk in darkness but will have the light of life". This was a light that revealed a new path to walk. A path that led to peace, understanding, and a "life in abundance". Throughout His ministry Jesus taught us by His example how to walk that path. He then instructed each of us to carry that same light into the world.

Romans 12 calls us to "live peaceably with all" with the understanding that peace isn't the absence of conflict, but the presence of Christlike calm in the midst of it. When we choose gentleness over retaliation, listening over shouting, and prayer over panic, each of us becomes a small candle in dark rooms. But when we all come together, we become a blazing light capable of removing the darkness forever.

As we reflect on the call to be lights in a dark world, following the example of Jesus who brought hope, peace, and guidance it's important to understand that peacemaking lies at the heart of living out this calling. The prophets remind us that God is not distant from our struggles: Isaiah proclaims that God "shatters the yoke of oppression", while Micah urges us to "do justice, love mercy, and walk humbly." True peacemaking is not a passive stance; it's an active, courageous expression of Christlike compassion. It means noticing the pain and injustice around us and choosing to respond with empathy and action. In this way, justice becomes the light that reveals brokenness, inviting God's healing and restoration to begin.

Paul calls us "ambassadors of reconciliation." Light doesn't just reveal what's wrong, it shows the path back to one another. Every apology offered, every conversation pursued, every act of kindness

extended becomes a sunrise moment in someone's life.

In Matthew 5:9 Jesus said: "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God". In many places Law Enforcement Officers are called "Peace Officers". And in Matthew 22:21 Jesus "said to them, "Give therefore to Caesar the things that are Caesar's and to God the things that are God's."

As Christians we don't get to pick and choose which of God's laws to follow and Law Enforcement officers don't get to pick and choose which laws they are to enforce. There is much darkness in places like Minneapolis, Chicago, and Portland. Law Enforcement officers are working to do their job of enforcing current laws and court orders. There are peaceful protesters that are doing their job of expressing their belief that some of those laws and/or court orders are wrong. The solution is for those peaceful protestors to lobby their lawmakers to change the laws. The solution is not to become rioters who interfere with and attack the law enforcement officers. The solution is not to attempt to order one branch of law enforcement to attack another. The solution is to follow the light of the world to a reasonable and peaceful solution.

In reflection, this message reminds us that even in times of darkness and division, the light of Christ offers hope, guidance, and a path toward peace. By following Jesus' teachings and embodying compassion, justice, and reconciliation, we are called to be peacemakers who actively shine God's light in our communities. Through unity, empathy, and faithful action, we can help dispel darkness and work together toward a more just and compassionate world.

Saints, among honorable people, there are no winners in violent conflict, only losers on both sides. Look to the Holy Spirit for guidance and not to the talking heads on the many news outlets.

LEADERSHIP TEAM NEWS FOR FEBRUARY 2026

As I write this newsletter article, I see from my window that the snow is swirling around with these sub-zero windy conditions. Prayers for all to find warm shelter! Last Friday, January 16th, many members of Amherst UMC attended the funeral service for long- time dedicated member Phyllis Fravel. Pastor Carney conducted a beautiful service in celebration of Phyllis's faithful service to her church and The Lord. Rest in peace our dear friend!

Your Leadership Team met on Monday, January 12th for our monthly meeting. The 2025 financial statements are being completed and will be mailed to each household. This year's Christmas donation yielded \$1,860.00. After much discussion, there was a motion to donate \$800.00 to the Amherst Schools backpack program, which provides a backpack of food for the weekend for those children in need. The remainder of the Christmas fund money is in the general fund account and can be given to additional organizations. If anyone has a suggestion, please let anyone on the Leadership Team know of your idea. Thank you to everyone for their donation! Our donation is another way that our congregation is fulfilling our goal of community outreach!

We learned from trustees that installation of an additional railing in the sanctuary is "on hold." Further discussion needs to occur. The railing should not block the view of the altar as seen via zoom nor be an obstacle rather than an aid. If you have ideas, please share them with Leadership Team members. Trustee chair, Bob Kinser, reported that the clothing shed is being emptied weekly. Last year our church profited \$4,321.46 from the clothing shed.

Judy Gutman, worship chair, thanked everyone who aided in taking down the Christmas decorations. Ash Wednesday is February 18th and more information will be forthcoming. Nurturing committee continues to make homebound visits and sending of cards. These are continued ways that our church is fulfilling our goal of reaching out to our homebound. Chris McCourt, chairing Raise Right, reported that since beginning the

Raise Right fundraiser our church has netted \$6,000.

Mission's chair, Polly Makinen reported that we still are collecting personal items for the Office of Aging and will continue into February.

Aleah announced that further details are being completed for The Ark trip scheduled for June 25-27, 2026. Hotel reservations are being made. No cancellation fees are charged. Personal vehicles will be used for the transportation. A March meeting will be scheduled for provision of details. Estimated cost of exhibit entrance and hotel is \$3,501.00. To date, approximately half of the cost has been raised for this trip. As Lay Leader, Aleah has been working with Joanne to complete an updated membership audit. Members of the Leadership Team were able to provide information to aid towards completion of the audit. Aleah shared a draft of the latest church directory. A thank you to Jennifer Clark for her service in photographing and compiling the information! Jennifer will gather information regarding printing charges.

Jill Keller, SPRC chair, provided our opening and closing prayers in the absence of Pastor Carney, who is recuperating after knee replacement surgery. Prayers for Pastor Joe as he travels this medical journey to recovery!

Our next Leadership Team meeting is scheduled for Monday, February 9th at 11am. All are welcome to attend!
