

# 5 Day Devotional

## Day 1: The Call to Be Different

### Reading: Romans 12:1-2

In a world that constantly pressures us to conform, God calls us to transformation. The Christian life isn't about blending in—it's about standing out as witnesses to a different kingdom. Just as immigrants carry the customs of their homeland, we carry the values of heaven into earthly spaces. This distinctiveness isn't about superiority but about authenticity. When we refuse to let culture squeeze us into its mold, we create space for the Holy Spirit to reshape us from the inside out. Today, consider one area where cultural pressure tempts you to compromise. What would it look like to resist that pull and instead reflect Christ's character? Transformation begins when we offer ourselves fully to God's renewing work.

## Day 2: Guarding Against Greed

### Reading: Luke 12:13-21

Jesus warns us to "watch out" and "be on guard" against greed—not because He wants to restrict our joy, but because He loves us and knows greed destroys abundant life. The culture whispers that security comes through accumulation, that identity is found in possessions, that happiness requires more. But Jesus offers a radically different vision: life doesn't consist in abundance of things. Greed wears many masks—control, status, pride, fear. It promises satisfaction but delivers slavery. The rich fool in Jesus' parable had everything except what mattered most: a right relationship with God. Today, examine your heart honestly. What form does greed take in your life? Where have you sought security apart from God? Confess it, and experience the freedom of His grace.

## **Day 3: Seeking First the Kingdom**

### **Reading: Matthew 6:25-34**

"Seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well." This isn't a formula for prosperity but an invitation to trust. Jesus contrasts two ways of living: the anxious scrambling of those who don't know God's love, and the peaceful confidence of those who do. Your Heavenly Father knows what you need. He clothes the flowers and feeds the birds—how much more will He care for you? Seeking God's kingdom first means ordering your priorities around His will, trusting His provision, and using your resources to advance His purposes. It means putting God before possessions, generosity before accumulation, trust before control. Today, what worry are you holding that reveals misplaced trust? Surrender it to your loving Father.

## **Day 4: The Practice of Generosity**

### **Reading: 2 Corinthians 9:6-15**

Generosity is spiritual warfare against greed. When we give, we declare that God—not money—is our security. We testify that we live in a world of abundance, not scarcity. We resist the culture's grip and align ourselves with God's kingdom. The Corinthians' generosity didn't impoverish them; it enriched them spiritually and overflowed in thanksgiving to God. Giving isn't about obligation but opportunity—the chance to participate in God's work, to break free from money's enslaving power, to experience the joy of trusting God. Whether you've been generous for years or are taking your first steps, God meets you with grace. Today, prayerfully consider: What percentage of your income reflects God's first place in your life? Take one concrete step toward greater generosity.

## **Day 5: Turning Upstream**

### **Reading: Psalm 51:10-17**

Perhaps you've realized you've drifted downstream, carried by cultural currents away from God's design for your finances and generosity. There's no condemnation here—only invitation. The moment you recognize the drift and turn around, Jesus is there with His arm around you, saying, "I'm with you." Repentance isn't about shame; it's about changing direction. Yes, paddling upstream is hard. Yes, you may have floated far. But every stroke toward God is a victory. David's psalm reminds us that God doesn't despise a broken and contrite heart. He delights in restoration. Today, if you need to turn around, simply tell God honestly where you are. Accept His grace. Take one step in a new direction. Trust that He who began a good work in you will be faithful to complete it.
