



Sermon Notes: "Worthy or Dusty"

Matthew 10:5-15

2.8.26

HIS SHEEP:

- Being sent to the Jews first was not about exclusion but rather giving Abraham's descendants every chance to respond.
- God doesn't look for ability. He looks for availability.
 - Path 1: The "Unqualified"
 - Path 2: The "Qualified"

EMPOWERED:

- Miracles don't make the gospel true; they validate its truth.

Pastoral Note:

We have no evidence that miraculous authority is universally common, however, there is nothing to say it has been permanently withdrawn.

- Whatever Jesus asks you to do, He gives you the power to do it.
 - We need dependence on God.
 - We need to incorporate others into the mission.

So What?

What kind of "house" are we?

A "Worthy" Question: *How is our openness to the gospel of Christ revealing our surrender and mission?*

A "Dusty" Question: *In what way am I resisting the gospel's transformation — and how is that hindering my ability to be sent?*

For Study, Reflection, Discussion During the Week:

Life Group ICEBREAKER: Have you ever had someone unexpectedly open their home to you when you really needed it — or been the one to open yours? What made that moment meaningful?

REVIEW:

Review the sermon notes from Sunday. Was there a particular point that stuck with you? What was it and why did it resonate with you?

READ: Matthew 10:5-8

- Jesus told the disciples to go ONLY to "the lost sheep of Israel" — God's own people who already had the Torah, the temple, and the prophets. Why do you think Jesus started there instead of the Gentiles?
- Darin connected this to Ezekiel 34, where God rebuked the shepherds who "fed themselves instead of the flock." Do you see a correlation with people today who have been failed by religion — burned by the church or given a distorted version of God?

READ: Matthew 10:9-10

- Jesus told them to take no money, no bag, no extra clothes. Why would He strip away their safety nets?
- Darin outlined two layers of this: **dependence on God, incorporating others into the mission, and traveling light.** Which of these is hardest for you personally?

READ: Matthew 10:11-15

- A "worthy" house wasn't about being good enough — it was about being **open enough** to receive the gospel and partner in the mission. What does it look like to be an "open" household today?
- The "dusty" towns weren't godless — they were religious. They had the synagogue, the traditions, the rituals — but when the gospel knocked, they refused to answer. How can someone be religious but not receptive?

DEPLOY: Two Questions to Sit With:

1. **A "Worthy" Question:** How is my openness to the gospel of Christ revealing my **surrender** and mission? (example: in my money, my comfort, my ego, my relationships, etc.)
2. **A "Dusty" Question:** In what way am I resisting the gospel's **transformation** — and how is that hindering my ability to be sent?
