As members of a parish in the Diocese of New Westminster, we acknowledge that we are gathered from a variety of locations within the traditional and unceded ancestral territory of the Coast Salish people, including but not limited to, the halq’-emylém speaking Kwantlen, Kwikwetlem, Musqueam, Tseil-watuth, and Tsawwassen nations.

The Preparation

Officiant

Born into enslavement in 1746 in Delaware, Absalom Jones was eventually granted a manumission (a legal document granting him freedom) and began worshipping at St. George's Methodist Episcopal Church where he met Richard Allen who had been engaged to preach at St. George's and the two became lifelong friends. In 1781 they founded the Free African Society, a mutual aid benevolent organization, the first of its kind for black people. At St. George's, Absalom and Richard served as lay ministers for the black membership. When the church leadership decided to segregate the black worshippers in an upstairs gallery without notifying them, a dispute arose over the seats black members had been instructed to take in the gallery and most of the black members indignantly walked out in protest. In 1792 the Free African Society began to build the African Church of Philadelphia. The church membership took a vote and decided to affiliate with the Episcopal Church. Absalom Jones was asked to provide pastoral leadership and after prayer and reflection he accepted the call. The African Church was dedicated on July 17, 1794. Soon thereafter the congregation applied

for membership in the Episcopal Diocese of Pennsylvania on the following conditions: 1) that they be received as an organized body; 2) that they have control over their own local affairs; 3) that Absalom Jones be licensed as lay reader, and, if qualified, be ordained as a priest. In October 1794 it was admitted as the African Episcopal Church of St. Thomas. Bishop William White ordained Jones as deacon in 1795 and as priest on September 21, 1802. Jones was an earnest preacher. He denounced slavery, and warned the oppressors to “clean their hands of slaves.” To him, God always acted on “behalf of the oppressed and distressed.” St. Thomas Church grew to over 500 members during its first year. Known as “the Black Bishop of the Episcopal Church,” Jones was an example of persistent faith in God and in the Church as God’s instrument. Jones died on February 13, 1818.
