

The Nicene Creed





Postlude A Fanfare

Kenneth Leighton (1929 - 1988)

Leighton was a chorister at Wakefield Cathedral, where his love of music was born singing the daily office of Evensong. He was a composer, pianist and academic, teaching at Leeds and Edinburgh University. He is best remembered for his huge contribution to church music, despite not being a church goer himself! His output however, spans a huge number of categories, from chamber music to opera. He was a teacher of composition at Edinburgh University where he was a huge influence on Scottish composer of prominence, James MacMillan.

His music was initially influenced by the English Pastoral style (think Vaughan-Williams) but after some study in Italy, he was moved by musical developments across Europe. His works are characterised by rhythmic impulse, lyricism, chromaticism, and contrapuntal music (He was a lifelong admirer of J.S. Bach).

The result is music that is fresh and edgy, lending new expressions to how we hear the liturgical words. The *Missa Brevis* that we heard today fizzes with energy. Written for the immense space of Liverpool Cathedral, we are forced by the nature of the music to hear the words with a new tension, and a sense of mercy: Be it the dance running through the 'Gloria in excelsis', or the torturous tension of the 'Agnus Dei', where the sacrifice of the Lamb of God is made vividly real.

His Fanfare for organ typifies Leighton's angular and edgy writing style. Leighton was writing for organs influenced by the continental style of organ building - brighter, lighter and with more percussive attack than the fat Victorian organ sound he would have known growing up.

One can hear in *Fanfare* the influence of both the lyrical folk song writing he encountered early in his career (albeit accompanied by jolty, angular chords in the left hand), placed against rising and descending fanfare lines, reminiscent of Copeland's *Fanfare for the Common Man* but hijacked by the haunting trumpet lines at the end of Stravinsky's *Petrushka*.

This is music of intelligence - it may not always have immediate appeal, but it bubbles with a raw energy that forces us to listen and often to re-consider the nature of faith. To quote a friend of mine, Professor Ted Tregear: "If Leighton's music demands that we confront the difficulties of faith - with its searching and suffering - it finds, in that concentrated meditation, a peace of its own".





