Have you not known? Have you not heard? The Lord is the everlasting God, the Creator of the ends of the earth. He does not faint or grow weary; his understanding is unsearchable. He gives power to the faint and strengthens the powerless.

Even youths will faint and be weary, and the young will fall exhausted, but those who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings like eagles; they shall run and not be weary; they shall walk and not faint.

Last year at the Annual Vestry Meeting, I invited the people of St. Dunstan's into a **Year of Re-gathering**, acknowledging the effects of the pandemic and leadership transition had on the mission and life of the parish. Among the seven areas of the focus presented, the Parish Council decided to prioritize on two in 2025:

#3 Get to know our neighbours (old & new) in the growing municipalities where we live and work to discover common grounds and longings

- We are developing an intentional relationship with the Dhillon family, St. Dunstan's immediate neighbour by exploring ways to mutually support each other.
- We renew & re-consolidated our relationship with the Aldergrove Rotary Club, Aldergrove Food Bank, Aldergrove United Church, Langley Meals on Wheels, Langley Hospice Society, New Directions (ESL classes), and Trinity Western University's Fraser River Counselling program.
- We had a sit-down Thursday Meal around Christmas time with the support from Langley Meals on Wheels volunteers

#6 Revamp Newcomer Ministry & formation opportunities (Anglican 101, Confirmation / Reception classes)

- We developed new leadership for the Centre for Spiritual Renewal and began offering a full range of formation opportunities in collaboration with the Inter-parish Centre.
- A four-week stewardship focus was launched in the fall. 18 individuals/families returned the "My Response to God's Mission" form, resulting in a total pledge of over \$64,000 for 2026.
- Anglican 101 launched in 2026 was well subscribed.
- A Newcomers' Tea is in the work for 2026.

In case you might be wondering what are the areas of responsibilities of the Rector, below is a helpful primer excerpted from my Letter of Agreement with the parish and the Bishop:

1. Senior Leadership – To work collaboratively with Church Wardens, Trustees, Parish Council, and other Clergy and Lay Staff of the Parish in the leadership of the liturgical, social service, educational and pastoral ministries.
2. Parish Liturgies – To be the lead in the liturgical life of the Parish
3. Pastoral Care and Community Development – To oversee, lead and participate in the ministry of pastoral care for members of the Parish
4. Faith Formation and Education – In collaboration with the Parish’s lay leadership, to develop, implement, and coordinate, and coordinate an annual calendar of faith formation opportunities for all ages
5. Children, Youth, and Families – In collaboration with the Parish’s lay leadership, to develop and offer support, guidance, and leadership for ministry with children, youth, young adults and family ministries
6. Community Engagement – To engage with other organizations – faith-based, civic, and business – to build fruitful relationships and provide moral leadership

I had tremendous joy collaborating and sharing ministries with the dedicated and passionate people of St. Dunstan’s this past year. Thank you for all your personal support to me and Dave.

Liturgical Arts

The Liturgical Arts Committee is a small, but mighty group that supports and works alongside the Worship Team, to create an environment that is reverent, hospitable and full of joy! We do this primarily through décor, arranging the church space and aligning with the liturgical colours, seasons, themes and special events at the church.

2025 was a full year for our team! During the season of Lent, our team brought out the button tree (in the church entranceway) that had been lovingly made in 2009, and parishioners were invited to sew a button on. The button tree was then hung in the sanctuary, for Holy Week and for many coming weeks. Additionally, a Lenten Reflections Display encouraged personal contemplation through self-reflection questions. Throughout Holy Week, the team was busy changing out the curtain colours, adding a garden display, hanging stations of the cross and wall hangings. For Pentecost, the hoop hanging was hung, which received positive feedback! In keeping with a theme of “re-gathering,” a tree outline was added to the sanctuary wall, and during the Season of Creation, parishioners contributed weekly reflections (on different shapes) that were placed on the tree. This was well received! Following Thanksgiving, the team prepared for Advent. This included changing the curtains, adding the candle hangings & moving the star each week in the Sanctuary, adding décor to the Entranceway and putting up the Christmas tree in the sanctuary and ensuring ornaments were ready to hang on the 3rd Sunday of Advent.

Our current team is Patricia O’Connor, Marisa Farr, Lin Neifert, and Ginny Sawatsky, with support from Jacqui Pesek. In 2026, we are excited for Erica Grimm and Amber Eves to join the team! We look forward to the year ahead and continue to look for inspiration to create an environment that fosters a meaningful worship experience.

Eucharistic Assistants

The Eucharist Assistant team at St. Dunstan’s includes 8 dedicated volunteers. Our team has the privilege and joy of supporting the Sunday service as well as special services during the church year. Starting with reviewing the list of Sunday volunteers and ending with extinguishing the candles at the end of the service, we make sure that all is in place. I think everyone on our team will tell you that the most remarkable part of the service is participating in the Eucharist; in gratitude we offer ourselves to God and St. Dunstan’s church family in this beautiful sanctuary.

Altar Guild

Healing Prayer

Healing Prayer takes place every Sunday morning at the celebration of the Holy Eucharist. Two (or more if necessary) Healing Prayer ministers are available to intercede the parishioners needs to God.

The parishioner might need to pray for themselves, for others, or to receive a blessing. If they are not able to share, just to be still and be present in the arms of God. Whatever their needs, we will pray with all who come to the prayer table.

In January 2025 the Healing Prayer ministers gather together with the Rev. Clarence Li to review St Dunstan's Healing Prayer manual which includes reflecting on the Theological Foundation, reviewing the Rites for our Ministry to the sick and renewing our Healing Prayer Covenant.

There were 11 dedicated compassionate individuals on the Healing Prayer team. Joe Baker, Jim Hober, Kerry Pope, Lois Curtis, Patricia O'Connor, Donelle Clarke, Kathleen Wiens, Marisa Farr, Lesley Wieler along with myself.

In February 2025 these lay ministers were invited to be "Licensed Ministers to the Sick Practitioners " and the team was introduced at our annual vestry meeting.

The attendance for Healing Prayer was stable in 2025. We are committed in encouraging more of our church family to come forward to receive Healing Prayer or simply receive the Anointing of Oil. New blessed oils were presented on the "Trinity Sunday "service in June 2025 and these new oils were offered individually to the whole congregation following communion. The response from the congregation was inspiring and very spiritual.

Later in June 2025, the Diocese formalized the Licensing of a number of lay ministries which included the Lay Healing ministry. All Lay Healing ministers are now required to complete the training and to obtain a Police Record Check with the Vulnerable sector.

At the Longest Night service held in December 2025 there were two Healing Prayer stations present between the two services.

With Gods help, we will continue to administer Healing Prayer and the Anointing of Oil at St Dunstan's on Sunday mornings. We pray that the Holy Spirit will stir people's hearts, direct them to us so they can feel their burdens being lifted and find some peace within.

Listening Prayer

Listening Prayer is the spiritual practice of listening to what God is making known to our hearts. It takes the form of coming into silence, prayerfully asking God questions, and tuning into our hearts to be aware of what God is making known to us.

The ministry of listening prayer is a facilitated prayer session where recipients are supported as they tune in to God for intimacy, healing, and transformation. The listening prayer ministry continues to be offered through in person or Zoom opportunities. Coordination of the Listening Prayer Ministry is facilitated by Lesley Wieler.

In October 2025 a listening prayer facilitator training was scheduled but was cancelled. No new dates are planned at this time.

Deep gratitude is extended to all who facilitate listening prayer and who generously give of their time and gifts to serve others to encounter God's Presence.

Contemplative Ministries

This past year the ongoing group **Contemplative Practice and Fellowship** continues to be offered the second Saturday of each month at 9:30 - noon. Due to competing contemplative options, we did break for the months of June, July and September. A feature of this very quiet time is a full hour of private unstructured contemplative time during which participants have access to the whole church and grounds. This group typically consists of 3-8 participants. It is always open to all who might like to explore and experience an intense but relatively brief dive into a half hour Centering Prayer sit, 15 minutes of Lectio Divina without comments, the hour of private time, concluding with about 10 minutes of shared prayers at midday. No registration fee but we appreciate sign up in order to arrange seating and handouts. This is always announced in St Dunstan newsletter and in the Centre for Spiritual Renewal calendar.

This past year we also hosted a shared session 9:30 - 3:00 October 11 with Contemplative Outreach of Greater Vancouver for a session of what they title **A Taste of Silence**. This featured several Centering Prayer sits, prayers at midday followed by a shared soup and bagged lunch, Lectio Divina and individual time. For this enjoyable day we were joined by many new faces to St Dunstan's with about 25 participants in total. Leadership was shared among Contemplative Outreach and Elaine and Joe with great thanks to Doug for his hospitality through the day.

Centering Prayer & Lectio Divina

Elaine Chatwin & Joe Baker, coordinators

Friday **Centering Prayer & Lectio Divina** continues to gather a long-dedicated group of 4-10 participants, both in person in the nave of the church, as well as via Zoom. It consists of a twenty-minute Centering Prayer sit followed by about 20 - 30 minutes common lectionary based Lectio Divina; offering opportunity for participant sharing of impact but without discussion or analysis. Leadership is provided by Elaine, Joe and Jim. All are welcome, no fee or registration required. Listed in the St Dunstan newsletter and CSR calendar.

The final offering which falls within the contemplative umbrella, is the Zoom only weekly offering of the ancient **Service of Compline or Night Prayer**. Joe, Elaine and Helen alternately provide the leader voice of this liturgy. Typically, 6-12 people join at 9:30 pm every Wednesday for about twenty minutes. All are welcome to join, no fee, just contact Joe to be included for a copy of the service. This service too, is listed in the St Dunstan newsletter and now in CSR calendar.

Intercessions

The Intercessions group consists of 6 people who prepare the prayers for church each Sunday, as well as additional services at Christmas and Easter.

They are a dedicated group who trust in God to guide them (as well as using resources online for inspiration). It is not everybody's idea of fun to stand before a group and lead prayers, but if you are able to pray to God, you could help others to do the same, by speaking from your heart the words you trust that God is wanting you to say at that moment, in that space.

Believe me, the trusting is the hard part, as we are not always too good handing over the reins to someone else to lead us. Let go; Let God is a phrase all of us try to adopt.

We would love to have more of you join us. Try your own leap of faith and come talk to some of us!!

Worship Technology

The Worship Technology Team consists of Peter Wolfe, Jeremy Wiebe, and Leon Schroeder. Thank you to each of them for their hard work and ongoing commitment. This past year has been a welcome period of stability for our technology systems, including the church sound system and support for those who join worship services via Zoom, typically between two and six participants.

One ongoing challenge over the past few years has been low audio volume for Zoom attendees, despite the Zoom output being set to maximum within our sound system. Recently, we discovered a Zoom setting that appears to resolve this issue for spoken portions of the service, though it negatively affects the music. At present, we are manually toggling this setting during the service to provide the best possible experience for those joining online. Our overall goal is for worship services to run smoothly and without incident, so that our work goes largely unnoticed—even as we remain an active, behind-the-scenes part of the worship team. We also extend our thanks to Lois and other choir members who assist by advancing the projector slides, helping everyone participate fully by seeing the words for singing and speaking.

- **Lectio Divina** – Friday mornings at 12:00pm, in-person & online
- **Contemplative Eucharist** – Friday mornings at 12:30pm, in-person

- **Contemplative Fellowship & Spiritual Practice** – second Saturday of each month, 9:30am – noon, in-person

Other Offerings

- **Feasting into Fasting – March 4, 2025.** A Shrove Tuesday celebration with delicious pancakes, community around tables, and a time to connect with God as we prepared our hearts for the season of Lent. Led by Rev. Helen Tervo and Rev. Clarence Li.
- **Touched by the Land – September 6, 2025.** A guided walk on Yewstone Gardens, a 7-acre healing garden created by Suzanne Robinson and her husband Mike, in Aldergrove. Participants learned about Camino Divina (Path of Divine Encounter), the plants and trees of the gardens, how to listen to the land with your whole body & experienced walking on the sensory labyrinth.
- **Spirituality & Chronic Pain – May 24 / October 4 / November 30, 2025.** A conversation facilitated by Rev. Helen Tervo, Rev. Jeanne Forte and Rev. Clarence Li. This included discussing the journey of chronic pain (including physical, mental, emotional & spiritual) – not as a problem to solve, but as a space to encounter God.
- **Taste of Silence Retreat – October 11, 2025.** A partnership with the Centre at St. Dunstan's & Contemplative Outreach of Greater Vancouver. This day included Centering Prayer in community, Lectio Divina, Personal Retreat Time & Space and Liturgy of the Hours.
- **The Role of Mutuality – October 22, 2025.** A conversation between guests, Ray Sawatsky & Deborah Garcia (Mexico) discussing how historically church-based charities have used an approach where recipients are treated as objects of benevolence / pity. The discussion interacted with participants to reflect on the role of mutuality in Christian service.
- **The Cross and the Olive Tree Book Launch – October 25, 2025.** An evening with Shadia Qubti, a Palestinian lived theologian, discussing the book release of *The Cross and the Olive Tree: Cultivating Palestinian Theology amid Gaza*.

- **Time with Mary Advent Retreat – December 6, 2025.** A retreat morning facilitated by Rev. Lorie Martin. The group participated in the life and heart of Mary through art and image, with the spiritual practice of Visio Divina, and the sacred practice of gazing. This included a time of silence, sharing and creative stations.
- **The Longest Night – December 21, 2025.** A simple service for Hope & Healing offered at 4:30pm and 6:30pm, with a drop-in quiet time between services. Led by Rev. Paul Guiton.

The Centre at St. Dunstan’s has an engaged and active leadership team. The team includes Rev. Clarence Li (Director), Elaine Chatwin, Joe Baker, Helen Tervo, Marisa Farr, Kathi Renaud, Darlene Daniels. Ginny Sawatsky took on the role of Volunteer Program Coordinator in September of 2025.

Outreach

Thursday Meal

Garden to Table began as an offering from the community garden in the backyard grounds of the Parish in 2010. Today it has grown exponentially and offers food security to many needy families.

We now refer to the meal program as Thursday Community Meal. We have recently attracted new cook teams from the community outside of the parish congregation.

We currently have 7 volunteer cooking teams on a rotating schedule that prepare and serve upwards to 80 meals every Thursday evening. Those in our community that need a warm meal are invited to come into the hall to enjoy some soup while hot

meals are assembled and distributed to them in compostable take-out containers. We are licenced by Fraser Board of Health which involves regular inspections regarding codified regulations on cooking and food practices

Given the increase in food costs, we gratefully receive support from the diocese by way of a 3-year Parish Development Grant. We also have received donations from the Rotary club of Aldergrove, neighbouring businesses, and members of the parish. A fundraising gala was held in September 2025 where \$11,500 was raised. From some of the recent initiatives to raise funds outside of our congregation, we have been able to replace some of our aged cooking equipment and budget for the repair and maintenance of our kitchen.

Each week, Tannis Percival secures a variety of free products from bread to desserts, and even fresh fruit, to name a few. These items are offered over and above the soup and take out meal. Together with Noreen Jones they write down names and make check lists with the necessary contact information. If some people don’t show, Noreen and Tannis

and occasionally a couple others will deliver a hot meal to them. Janice DeRuiter has become quite involved and serves a hot cup of soup for those coming in to warm up and share some fellowship

Looking ahead, our goals are to further promote the community meal garnering steady financial and food support from local businesses and to secure additional teams as some of our volunteers are aging out. Langley Meals on Wheels has recently offered to provide volunteers, share donated food items and has offered to host an in-house, sit-down buffet style dinner, like we always did prior to COVID 19 when we changed to a take out meal.

To-date the program continues to grow and expand. Managing it has been a group effort and we're thankful for all the willing workers who faithfully step up and support the hungry needs of our community.

Aldergrove Food Bank Soup Kitchen

There is a bi-monthly rotation of soup makers between two churches. Every other week 2 of St. Dunstan's soup makers arrive at the food bank with a large pot of soup each. It's lovely for the clients to have a choice. This is a wonderful service for our clients and we, the volunteers, greatly appreciate the goodness a warm bowl of soup brings to them. Held on Saturday, September 27, 2025, the event welcomed 120 guests who enjoyed a full turkey dinner prepared by Larry McGuinness and Doug Tindall, with delicious desserts generously provided by Janice De Ruiter. Alongside the ever-popular silent auction, donation cards were placed at each table, inviting guests to contribute beyond their auction bids — a new approach that was warmly received.

As of October 15, 2025, the gala has raised more than \$14,000 through ticket sales, beverage sales, donation cards, 50/50 tickets, and silent auction items — a wonderful testament to the generosity and spirit of our community.

Annual Art Show & Sale

Parish Building & Grounds Report

Our goals regarding the maintenance of our building are as follows: to keep on top of all regular maintenance, to promptly deal with issues as they arise and to be aware of and plan for longer term major repair items.

Ongoing maintenance: Items typically dealt with are as follows:

- Repair to gyprock as required
- Painting of interior walls as required
- Replacement of broken floor tiles
- Cleaning of carpets and chairs
- Weeding, cutting and trimming of grass and shrubs

Issues which arose or are likely to need attention:

- Significant trees and shrubs in our parking lot have been lost due to excessive heat and drought. Replacements should be planned for 2026
- Our lawn has sustained extensive damage due to predators going after the Chafer Beetles. A multi-pronged approach with work parties and new products will be required with no guarantees of success. Along with various interventions to replace the many damaged areas we will also initiate proactive lawn care measures to improve the health of any existing grass.
- Our labyrinth has been made unusable, and an informed group of users will need to make decisions regarding repair; seed, turf or gravel
- Parking lot lines were painted and cracks filled. The one remaining area adjacent to the hall will require our attention.

Longer Term:

- Replacement of South and West facing windows in which the seals have deteriorated
- Ongoing repair or replacement of HVAC units as required
- Initiating an informed preventative maintenance program for the care of our roof.

Financials

Envelope Secretary

Thank you to everyone who has continued to give faithfully in this year and. All of the contributions received throughout the year have allowed St. Dunstan's to continue to be a thriving house of worship and community. This past year we had 91 identified donors, up slightly from 88 identified donors in 2024. Online donations through CanadaHelps were consistent from last year. Our PAD (Personal Automatic Donation) donors this year was up slightly from last year going from 31 to 34 active contributors at the end of the year. The overall dollar amount of contributions was up this year. This increase was in part, due to the plea from the treasurer, Peter Wolfe, to reduce the predicted year end deficit.

There are a variety of ways to make your monthly contributions. PAD is a convenient way to make donations, especially when people are not able to attend church in person. Your donation is debited from your bank account, or credit card, on the 15th of each month. If you are not already using PAD, this may be something you would like to consider. If you would like to use PAD please talk to Sherry for information. If you prefer, you are now able to make donations through e-transfer using our email address office@st-dunstan.ca. Any contributions sent via e-transfer are automatically deposited into our bank account. CanadaHelps donations can be made online through our website. As we approach Vestry (AGM), please, prayerfully consider what you can give back to God, be it financially and/or through giving of your time and talents.

Treasurer's Report

Peter Wolfe, treasurer

I am pleased to report that the parish ended the 2025 year with a deficit of \$(3,832), smaller than our budgeted deficit of \$(7,356). This is a great outcome considering where we were at the end of summer. Thank you for your continued generosity.

Key items that contributed to the operations are:

- Fundraisers and events provided additional funding throughout the year.
- Our income includes a transfer of around \$10,000 from a Thursday meal fund.
- Janitorial caretaking services were greatly reduced due to the generosity of individuals providing services for free or significantly reduced costs.
- The Parish this year supported the cost of a full time Rector.
- Property insurance and our diocesan assessment continue to be significant expenses.

The Garden of Remembrance project has a loan from the Anglican Foundation requiring monthly payments of \$316.32. Presently the balance owing to the Anglican Foundation is \$30,958.

As of December 31, 2025, St. Dunstan's had the following bank balances:

- General Fund \$79,300
- Contingency Fund \$50,668

Regarding the 2025 budget, parish council has approved the budget based on previous years actual operating costs and slightly increased revenues.

Other key items in the 2025 Budget are:

- Additional donations of \$8,000 from Parishioners
- Losing rental income from a partner as of April
- Revenue from community business owners to support Weekly Community Meals of \$5,000.
- Awarded a \$7,000 grant from the Diocese to support Weekly Community Meals.
- Spending inline with 2025 actuals except for 2% salary increases and 5% tax increases.

This results in a significant 2025 Budget Shortfall of \$(21,645). We will need to focus on our financial performance this coming year to avoid a significant shortfall.

Thanks again to Sherry Wright for all her hard work that makes my job as Treasurer much easier. I continue to rely on her a lot.

Clergy Discretionary Fund Report

The Rev. Clarence Li, Rector

According to the Letter of Agreement when the Rector was called in November 2024:

A Clergy Discretionary Fund is established and will be funded by designated gifts and from honoraria given to the Fund. The Fund is under the Rector's sole control and must not to be used for personal benefit of the Clergy. To preserve confidentiality, the Rector shall present an accounting by category to the Annual Vestry. Use of the Fund shall be reviewed with the Rector annually by the Regional Archdeacon.

Policy C21 of the Diocesan Policy Manual provides further guidance for the Fund:

Clergy Discretionary Funds should be primarily used for the relief of poverty, distress and need. Payments for food, rent, utilities and other basic necessities are among appropriate uses of the fund. In addition to this, a clergy person may use discretionary funds for other purposes that benefit the parish (underwriting training fees, buying some materials that are not covered by the parish's budget but that are nonetheless needed to support a program or effort, etc.) The Fund should not be used for the personal benefit of parish clergy.

For transparency purposes, the Rector is pleased to report:

Between November 1, 2024 (start date of the current Rector) and December 31, 2025, a total of \$6,228.73 designated gifts was received. The 2025 budget also provides an additional \$1,000 to the Fund. A total \$6,263.73 was disbursed for the following causes:

- \$5,988.73 travel assistance for a parishioner's participation in the Peace Train Mission
- \$200 emergency relief to a local individual
- \$75 phone & grocery gift cards for one local couple

The running balance, taking into consideration of the 2025 budget provision is \$965. Moving forward, the Rector recommends creating a designated line on the balance sheet to keep track of the balance of the Fund.
