## Deuterocanonical Bible Study

The Bible Study will finish Paul's Epistle to the Galatians on Wednesday, February 25<sup>th</sup>. On the Wednesdays following, we will be studying some of the Deuterocanonical texts. Deuterocanonical means "second canon". They are books the Anglican Communion has decided are worth reading in church and studying, but we do not base doctrine on them. What is clear to scholars is that the New Testament writers alluded to them and quoted from them revealing they held no such distinction. Many of these stories were very familiar to earlier Christians but are less so today. Some are a little strange, some are entertaining, and there is some fine poetry present. The Deuterocanonical books were written at different times by different people, but they tend to focus on the period from the building of the second temple to the birth of Christ. If you have always wondered what those funny books in the middle of your Bible are, come and see on Wednesdays at 12:30 pm during Lent. Sessions will be in-person and through Zoom.
