Beloved siblings in Christ,

“You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hid.” — Matthew 5:14 (NRSVUE)

I want you to notice something specific in the verse, specifically the fact that Jesus does not say, “You are the light of the church.” He says, “You are the light of the world.” From the very beginning, our calling has been outward facing. The church exists not for its own preservation, comfort, or reputation, but for the sake of the world God so deeply loves. It can be tempting to think of church as a refuge from the world's trouble, a safe harbor where we gather with those who think, believe, and worship as we do. And yes, the church is a place of shelter, healing, and belonging. But it is never meant to be a cul-de-sac of comfort. It is a launching pad.

When we gather around Word and Sacrament, we are not escaping the world; we are being nourished for the sake of it. In baptism, we are joined to Christ's life for the life of the world. At the table, we receive bread broken and wine poured out—signs of a love that is always self-giving. Week after week, we are shaped by a Savior who does not cling to privilege but pours himself out in mercy.

To be “church for the sake of the world” means that our worship flows into witness. It means our prayers stretch beyond our walls to include neighbors near and far. It means our faith shows up in tangible acts of compassion: feeding the hungry, advocating for justice, comforting the grieving, welcoming the stranger. This is not about striving to be impressive. It is about participating in what God is already doing. The Holy Spirit is at work in our neighborhoods, schools, workplaces, and homes. We are invited to join that work—to be signs of hope in anxious times, agents of reconciliation in divided spaces, and bearers of dignity in a culture quick to discard. Being church for the sake of the world also reshapes how we see one another. We are not simply members of an institution; we are ambassadors of Christ's reconciling love. Each conversation, each act of kindness, each moment of courage becomes a small but real testimony to the kingdom of God breaking in.

In a world marked by isolation and fear, the church can embody community and trust. In a world that often prizes power over compassion, we can model humility and service. In a world weary from injustice, we can stand in solidarity with those whose voices are silenced. This calling may feel large, even daunting. But remember: the light Jesus speaks of is not self-generated. It is his light, reflected through ordinary people like us. We do not create the flame; we simply refuse to hide it. So, as we gather this month—in worship, in service, in fellowship—may we do so with open doors and open hearts. May we be renewed by grace and sent out in love. And may everything we do bear witness to this simple, transformative truth: we are church, for the sake of the world.

Last month I outlined the reason the council made the decision to move forward with the **Free Our Future to Serve** campaign to reduce or totally eliminate our church mortgage in 5 years (subsequently the committee has shortened the campaign name to **Freedom to Serve**). This month I will feature some of the upcoming activities of the campaign.

On Sunday, March 15th at 5 PM, there will be a kickoff dinner with a tailgating theme. Food will include hamburgers, hotdogs & chili, chips, salads, ice cream, cookies, and root beer floats along with various drink choices. The program will have games, prizes, an auction for a trip, information on the campaign and an opportunity for you to pledge to the campaign. You are encouraged to wear your Agnus Dei gear if you have some.

In April and May house meetings will be conducted. The meetings will be modeled after the **Above and Beyond** campaign that was conducted in the past. The campaign committee is looking for hosts that can support up to 10 people in the meetings. Please let any of the campaign members listed below know if you can host a meeting. Hosts will need to provide light refreshments for the meetings. Once hosts are identified, sign-up sheets will be posted in the narthex for you to sign up for the meeting you would like to attend. The campaign committee members will facilitate the discussions at the meetings.

The committee will keep everyone up to date on how the campaign is progressing with a visual display in the narthex along with announcements. Additionally, every \$100,000 raised will have milestone celebrations. The initial goal of the campaign is to raise \$100,000 or more by August 2026. August is the month where we will be in discussions to refinance our 7-year variable interest loan. Interest rates have risen considerably since our last refinance so the more we can paydown the loan the lower our monthly payment will be with the new loan even with interest rates increasing.

On Sunday, February 22nd I discussed in the temple talk how you could access ADLC's *Gift Policy* under the **Give Tab** on our website. Please review the policy as you consider how you can give to the campaign. As I mentioned last month and will emphasize again, **the Council wants to convey to everyone that our giving to our regular budget cannot be sacrificed because of this campaign. Only give to this campaign if you have discretionary funds to donate.** I want to thank everyone who so graciously gives of their time and resources to make ADLC's ministries thrive. You are making a difference in peoples' lives.




Grief Thoughts for March

A Crafter's Wisdom with Grief – Part 2

In the February newsletter, I wrote about my friend who was struggling to finish a quilt her mother had been working on when she passed away. In that post, my friend chose to ask a long arm quilter to finish the quilt for her. My friend talked about how hard it was to surrender the quilt to another person who had never known her mother. Two weeks later there was an update on the Facebook post. The expert long arm quilter suggested my friend take out her mother's hand stitching so the quilt wouldn't pucker under the long arm quilting machine. Suddenly, my friend found she couldn't do it. It wasn't about perfection. It was about honoring her mother and the memories. Removing the hand stitches her mother had done, meant removing the last gift her mother had given her. She canceled the order and decided to finish the quilt with her own imperfect hand stitching. She realized she was honoring her mother best by letting the imperfections of hand stitching happen. Her mother understood imperfection. She understood the tyranny of perfection. It was far more authentic to honor her mother by doing the work herself, even if it wasn't as perfect as the person she had hired to do the machine stitching.

Have you ever wondered if you were making the "right decisions" about your grief process? Have friends and/or family been frustrated because you say you want things to be handled one way and then you change your mind and go a different direction? It's a normal process of grief. I remind myself that I had very clear reasons for why I chose to do certain things during my own seasons of loss. In retrospect, I might choose to do things differently the next time I experience loss. It wasn't a wrong choice. It simply means I am a different person now than I was then. How you handle your grief is intensely personal – don't add a layer of guilt or shame second guessing the decisions you made.

I don't think my friend made a wrong decision. It was very personal and she didn't know how she would feel until another decision was required of her. I respect her willingness to drop the expectations of perfection and do what she now saw was the best reflection of her mother's relationship with her. At the end of the day, it's all that any of us can ask for.

ACB was the Krumps' Christian family away from home from the late 1980's through the early 1990's. It is a family, even today, with at least 20 different denominations and 30 different nationalities, many of whom are refugees or asylum seekers. Yes, they lived behind the Iron Curtain and were there when it came down. What an exciting time that was! As members of the US-based American & Foreign Christian Union board, the Krumps continue to support ACB and two other churches in western Europe & visit at least annually. Come listen to their stories!

NEWS FROM OUR SERVICE COMMITTEE: GOD'S WORK, OUR HANDS

March Outreach Project: Phone Cards for AIDNW and Palm Sunday Coat Drive

This month we will connect with the folks who are being detained at the ICE facility in Tacoma through AIDNW (Advocates For Immigrants in Detention Northwest), specifically by providing phone cards.

By the 5th of each month AIDNW runs out of money to provide phone calls for people being detained, this means people are on waitlists to talk to their family and lawyers. Their budget for phone cards is \$6000; each phone card is \$20.00 and there are 1,500 people being detained so you can see why help is needed to provide much needed funds.

Additionally, this month, we will collect warm jackets and coats to line our Palm Sunday processional on March 29. The coats will be distributed to our neighbors in need and some of the coats will be sent to AIDNW for the detainees being discharged.


