## Pastor's Message

Dear Saints, I am reading a book entitled, "Canoeing the Mountains: Christian Leadership in Uncharted Territory", by Tod Bolsinger, originally published in 2018. The jacket reads, "The culture is changing, the world is changing rapidly, and churches are facing change on an unprecedented scale...The cultural advantage we experienced during the seventeen centuries of Christendom has almost completely dissipated...But the church is also at an exciting crossroads. We are entering a new day, new terrain and a new adventure. We are not alone. The Spirit of God goes before us. The mission of Christ will not fail."

In May 1804 Merriweather Lewis and William Clark set out to find passage West to the Pacific Ocean. When the explorers started out, they had maps, resources, friendly guides, and rivers to navigate as they explored. Until they reached the Rocky Mountains. Then, they had almost nothing that sustained and guided them while they explored. Suddenly they were literally "off-the-map". Bolsinger uses this as an analogy for the Christian church.

Bolsinger shared a reflection about three pastor friends. "Their churches were stuck and declining, stuck clinging to the past, stuck lurching to quick fixes, trying to find an easy answer for what were clearly bigger challenges. What all three churches had in common was that they were mostly blaming the pastor for how bad it felt to be stuck. 'If only you could preach better', 'If only you were more pastoral and caring', 'If only our worship was more dynamic'. Please, pastor *do* something!"

- ◆ How do we lead a congregation or an organization to be faithful to the mission God has put before us when the world has changed so radically?
- ◆ What are the tools, the mental models, the wise actions and competing commitments that require navigation?
- ◆ And mostly, what transformation does it demand of those of us who have been called to lead?

Easter, and the celebration of the Resurrection of Christ, will be here soon. We are a people who proclaim the greatest transformation Christians can mention. Death is transformed to Life. The cross, a symbol of Roman terror, is transformed into a symbol of love. We have a message that starkly contrasts with the temptations Jesus faced in the wilderness.

As a congregation of faithful Christians, our baptismal calling leads us to see and work on the "bigger challenges" that have led the whole Church to seem/feel stuck. We don't yet have the tools because we don't yet fully understand what the bigger, adaptive challenges are.

"What got us here, won't get us there." Doing church, the way our parents, and their parents, and their parents did church, will only lead us to be stuck further. Someone once quipped, "if the 1950's ever return, we will be ready for it!"

I offer this reflection and commend this book to anyone and everyone who has an interest in the Church of Christ Jesus. Reading it won't offer any quick fixes. If there were quick fixes, we can be sure we would have already tried them.

But I have faith, as the body of Christ, led by the gifts of the Spirit, Christ's mission to share the unconditional love of God in Christ Jesus will emerge, for the sake of the whole world.

## The Power of a Rumor

Pope Francis once said, "You pray for the hungry. Then you feed them. That's how prayer works."

Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), and Border Patrol actions making headlines recently, have struck fear in many of our friends and neighbors in Longmont. Minneapolis, MN has been a witness to these kinds of actions, and the effect has rippled throughout immigrant communities across our country.

I hope and pray that we, as followers of Christ Jesus, can empathize and support our neighbors, regardless of our political persuasion. I am convinced that the values we hold in common, are pre-political. "Pre-political" refers to concepts, values, or conditions that exist before the establishment or introduction of political systems or structures. Our shared, common values are still a source of strength, *before* we are partisan.

Recently, I learned that many of our Longmont neighbors are greatly impacted, and afraid after ICE operations. So afraid, that even a *rumor* of ICE operations in our community, results in people of color just staying home. Even a *rumor* has the power to inflict hardship, fear, and even terror in many neighborhoods. Even a rumor keeps people away from work, school, groceries, and everyday activities. I believe, as followers of Christ Jesus, that we cannot stand-by, or be silent, while others in our community live with this fear.

There is no question this is a complex challenge. I could not in good conscience, pretend there are simple solutions. Clearly, our immigration and asylum laws and systems have needed reform for at least a generation. In other words, it's not as simple as, just follow the law, or not. Many people are in a catch-22, resulting in predominantly people of color, and low-income people suffering the consequences. These are our brothers and sisters in Christ, *pre-political*.

How about we start our own rumor: People of First Lutheran Church, Longmont, are deeply concerned about the fear, and potential impacts of ICE operations to our friends and neighbors. We hold such a deep empathy, that we will be prepared to help when this need arises. We can serve in this way, without fear, because our faith in Christ Jesus, and his teachings, will lead us in our efforts to reach out to and support our neighbors in time of need.

We pray for our neighbors in need. Then we serve them as Christ would. That's how prayer works.


