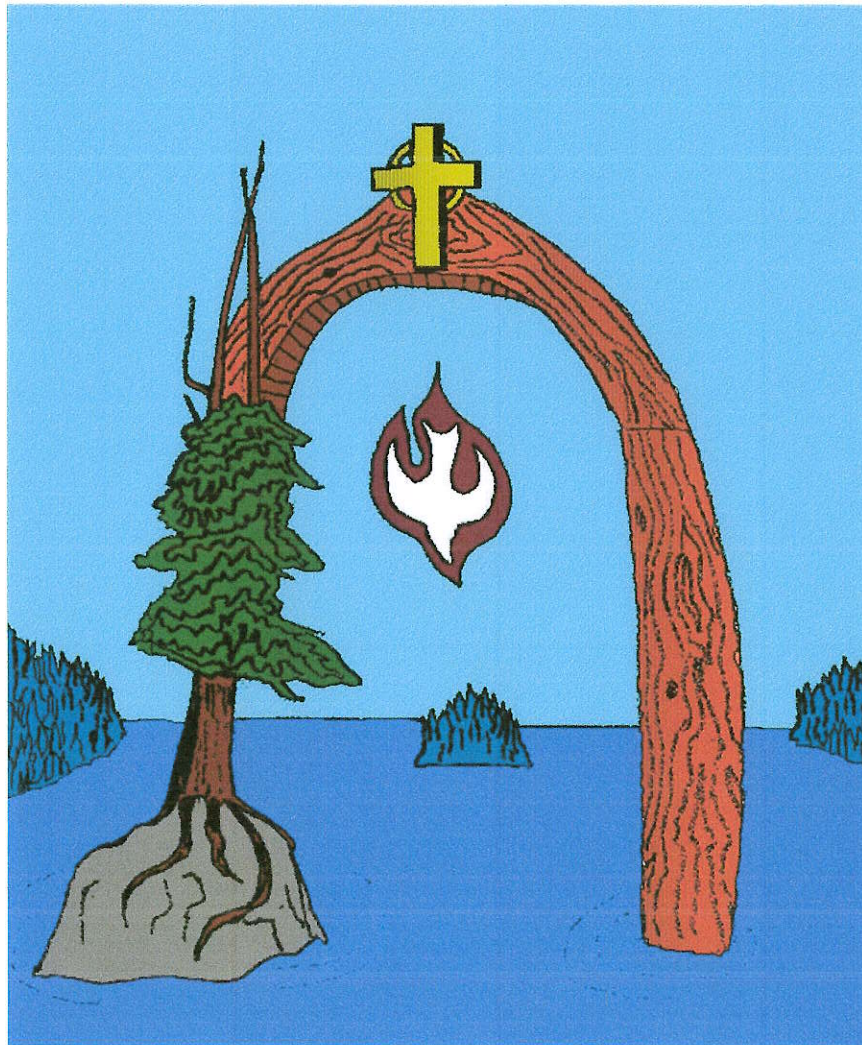

Gilakas'la New and Long-time Friends of St. Columba!

I am feeling really blessed to be here with you all. I have grown up here at St. Columba and to be a part of this shared ministry now as your Anglican priest, is a humble and wonderful joy - I have to pinch myself at times. Working with Rev. Bob and the council has felt like solid ground in a very full year. It is balm to pull into the driveway each time. Opening the doors and stepping over the threshold is a warm embrace from my mother and her friends, from good and formative memories, and all of you.

I continue to preside over one service a month, in the later afternoons at 3pm. This allows me to lead a service in the morning in Yalis/Alert Bay and navigate the commute.

For most of the year, I had time to open a morning a week at our Sanctuary. It was good to be back with our friends there and to see how the programme has grown for the needs of the people.

I provide communion and one-one-one pastoral care sessions in the office here, in homes, at Port Hardy Hospital and Eagle Ridge Manor.

With officiating seventeen funerals/memorials in our North Island Indigenous communities and the passing of my father in the Spring, this did not leave time for study. I pushed my graduation date yet again, one more year. I will finish my Master of Divinity at *Vancouver School of Theology* in May 2026. I will continue to stay connected to the Indigenous Studies Program Summer School and my mentor, the Rev. Dr. Ray Aldred. It has been such a rich and rewarding time with VST, another extended family.

This August, I attended the *National Indigenous Anglican Sacred Circle* gathering in Calgary, Alberta, with six Alert Bay parishioners. I was elected as one of three BC/Yukon representatives to the *Anglican Council of Indigenous Peoples (ACIP)* for the next triennium. We will work with Sacred Circle and the Presiding Elder, +Chris Harper, towards a Self-Determining Indigenous Church within the Anglican Church of Canada, a dream of our Anglican Elders.

Clergy meetings, and the biennial *We Together Conference* in November, have me down island and on Zoom, and staying connected to our Bishop and diocese.

At our 2023 Synod, Bishop Anna told us, "The Future is not going to look like the past – and the future is bright." This is a promise Christ made to us in the sharing of bread and wine, at meal, shoulder-to-shoulder, and in the sharing of his life. We have much to reconcile in our brokenness, a brokenness felt all too deeply with the People of the Land, our Indigenous families and friends. And you are committed to healing and restoration. We have much to fill us with joy in this life we have been given and the work we do.

I thank you wholeheartedly for your capacity, your depth, and your light. As an Indigenous woman, sister, daughter, friend and priest, I am witness to a vibrant and mighty force here at St. Columba. We may be a little congregation but that does not stop us from visioning and dreaming BIG. So be encouraged, and continue to encourage each other on this Good Road, this Jesus Road. Gilakas'la! Gilakas'la! Amen.

Rev. Bob Gilbert's Report 2025

As I was reflecting on this past year, two scripture verses came to mind. The first is from Mark 4:30-32:

Jesus also said, "With what can we compare the kingdom of God, or what parable will we use for it? It is like a mustard seed, which, when sown upon the ground, is the smallest of all the seeds on earth, yet when it is sown it grows up and becomes the greatest of all shrubs and puts forth large branches, so that the birds of the air can make nests in its shade."

The second is from Luke 17:20-21:

Once Jesus was asked by the Pharisees when the kingdom of God was coming, and he answered, "The kingdom of God is not coming with things that can be observed, nor will they say, 'Look, here it is!' or 'There it is!' For, in fact, the kingdom of God is among you. (or within you in some translations)

Jesus tells us that the kingdom of God is like a mustard seed; and the kingdom of God is among us or within us. That, to me, is an apt description of the life and work of St. John's and St. Columba's United-Anglican Churches. While few in numbers, and limited in resources, financial and otherwise; the small seeds of faith among you grow and spread to express that kingdom of God among us in varied and valuable ways.

Like the shrub that puts forth branches so that the birds of the air can make nests in its shade; our two communities of faith enable God's realm to grow within the church and the wider community providing nurture, care, and practical expressions of Christ-like love, so that many might 'rest in its shade'.

St. John's hosts and participates in a monthly food bank offered to the community. As well, every Wednesday morning folks gather in the church hall to enjoy coffee, tea, and refreshments as well as each other's company. The gathering is an opportunity for community folk and church folk to connect, to share what is happening in their lives, to offer care and concern as needed, and certainly to engage in much friendly banter and wholesome laughter. Congregational members reach out regularly to one another to offer support and care in times of illness or need. Members also reach out, regularly, to community folk in need.

St. Columba's provides a ministry of hospitality, daily, in its outreach to those needing a safe, welcoming and caring place to gather for fellowship and a nourishing meal. It raises funds throughout the year for a variety of good causes and is walking the road of Reconciliation and Right Relations in its assistance to, care of, and advocacy for the Indigenous population in Port Hardy. The folks of St. Columba's express practical care for one another in times of trouble and illness and both congregations warmly welcome newcomers in their midst.

These are some of the ways in which our two communities of faith live out the 'mustard seed' parable; putting faith into action. We are 'small but mighty'.

I serve ¼ time (10 hours a week). My primary area of responsibility is providing worship leadership twice a month at both churches. As St. John's only has Sunday worship twice a month, unlike St. Columba's which has weekly worship services, I decided, recently, to offer a Centering Prayer service, once a month, at St. John's which has been received favourably, even attracting some folks less disposed to attend a traditional service.

Another area of responsibility is some time devoted to community outreach. In this regard I lead an informal worship at Eagle Ridge Manor once a month, volunteer at the Food Bank at St. John's once a month; am the Royal Canadian Legion 'padre' in Port Alice (*which primarily involves participating in the Remembrance Day service*); and attend, as time allows, special community events.

Another area of responsibility is pastoral care. I have visited some folks in their home, in hospital, or at other mutually agreed upon locales. by phone, by email.

Finally, I am responsible to offer, as time permits, educational programs. I offer programs in the autumn and in the Season of Lent.

In addition to these responsibilities I do attend Council meetings, and from time to time, certain committee or ad hoc church gatherings.

I have been richly blessed to have served St. John's and St. Columba's this past year and look forward to continuing to serve you in the year ahead.

I have also been richly blessed in working with my esteemed colleague Rev. Sheila Cook, and with all the members of the Church Councils. A great big THANK YOU to our church leaders, and especially to Judy and Robert Fyles of St. Columba's, and to Doris Pepper of St. John's. Thanks as well to our musicians: Roldan Yuipco and Carol Nicholson who have been so gracious in their accompaniment of hymns, including the many new ones I have requested. I am grateful to all who give of their time, talent, and resources. You are the Church, and the mustard seeds of faith you plant, by God's grace, grow the goodness and love of God's kingdom in our churches, in our communities, and beyond.

May God continue to bless us, so as to be a blessing, in this new year 2026 and for years to come!

Indigenous Ministry Report 2025

Sanctuary: Nearly every morning the church is open from 7 AM to 9:30 AM. We provide a warm space, a listening ear, and open hearts to support anyone who comes. We serve coffee, tea and juice as well as light breakfasts, such as hot or cold cereal, hard boiled eggs and fresh fruit. Many of these friends are First Nations, some homeless, some marginalized. This year we had 4500 contacts averaging 13 per day. Included in this number were 88 new individuals. We noticed a sharp increase in the third quarter which continued into the fourth quarter. Overall the increase in users was 35% compared to 2024

Food Security: There are multiple branches to this ministry. Hot Sunday Lunches have been provided to approximately 50 people each week. Gwadzi Managed Alcohol Program (GMAP) is an Indigenous lead program who visit their clients daily. They pick up and deliver 36 meals on their Sunday rounds. The remaining 14 meals are distributed from our hall. The Blessing Box provides 6-8 items of mainly non-perishable food items daily to anyone who passes by. The St

Columba Sanctuary in addition to warmth and compassion provides beverages and food. Over 7800 meals have been served at our Sanctuary breakfast and Sunday lunch and recently take out sandwiches. About 4600 food and personal care items have been given out through the Blessing Box or hampers.

Loaves and Fishes: The Loaves and Fishes Food Bank allows partners/agencies to register to collect food for community food security programs. Agencies are allowed to select a time, up to once a day, 5 days a week, to select foodstuffs; items available vary widely and may include non-perishable grocery items (canned goods, cereal etc), frozen meat, bread and buns, and perishable dairy and deli items. St. Columba's routine for 2025 has been to do daily pick-ups. This supplies food for the morning breakfast sanctuary program (cereal, bread, muffins, peanut butter etc), for cooking the Sunday Lunch, items for food hamper requests and to stock the Blessing Box free food cupboard outside the church door. Often there are buns and deli meats available which are used to make about 2 dozen sandwich buns several times a week. These are offered to the morning breakfast clients to take with them or are put in the Blessing Box. The food bank also has daily "Fresh Eats" produce collection times for anyone in the community, so we pick up produce as needed for cooking the Sunday lunch, fruit for serving at breakfast and over-ripe bananas for baking muffins.

Accompaniment: In order to walk a good path with our First Nations brothers and sisters we try to be present in their lives and communities. Community events such as the March for Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls and the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation are important events that bring us in small steps towards healing and forgiveness. Church members and clergy participate as members of the public in these events and we raise funds to help defray the costs of the organizing committee. We also thank the Rev. Sheila Cook for expanding our impact in the First Nations communities. Our Community Partner, Cathie Wilson advises us on what we can do to help and how best we can accompany our First Nations friends.

Special services included: Ash Wednesday, World Day of Prayer, Good Friday, Easter Sunrise and Christmas Eve

Pacific Mountain Regional Council Report

I attended the Pacific Mountain Regional Council's 2025 AGM from May 29 – June 1, 2025, held in Nanaimo. The theme of the meeting was *"Cracked Open"*. At various points within the meeting, this theme was explored and discussed. The theme is based on the story, in the gospel according to Mark, of the woman who breaks the alabaster jar to anoint Jesus:

"As Jesus sat at the table, a woman came with an alabaster jar of very costly ointment of nard, and she broke open the jar and poured the ointment on his head."

Various speakers suggested that like the alabaster jar, the church is being 'cracked open'. Part of this being 'cracked open' refers to the decline in the number of persons attending church and the struggles of congregations, in terms of financial and human resources. Yet, from the fractures something fragrant and healing and holy is entering the world.

The theme times highlighted the present struggles of the United Church, but also it's potential to be a fragrant, healing balm to persons, communities, and the wider world.

The Rev. Canon Dr. Stephanie Spellers, a leading thinker of 21st century ministry and mission within the Episcopal Church in the United States projected that the United Church's decline will bottom out soon and things should stabilize. There is evidence that more young people are beginning to explore the Christian religion and that the United Church offers a form of faith that is palatable to many youth and young adults. She also pointed out that the Church can learn a lot from nonreligious young people – the 'Nones' and 'Dones' about the future of faith. It would be a good thing, she says, to listen to their stories and their wisdom. The United Church has much to offer them, as well, if we are bold to tell our story, one that is so different from the many versions of faith that many young people hear about and detest.

The work of the Pacific Mountain Regional Council executive, sub-councils, and staff is directed by the Mission and Vision of the Pacific Mountain Regional Council Executive:

"Healthy Communities of Faith and Ministries; Effective Leadership; Faithful Public Witness".

Part of the Regional Executive Accountability Report reads:

"The Region's future depends on its ability to balance tradition and innovation – to honour the values that have defined its identity while embracing new ways of being church in a changing world." -

To me, the AGM conveyed a clear view of the hard realities facing the church within a complex and troubled world. Yet, it also conveyed an uplifting hope for the future of the church as a means to witness in word and action the gospel of Christ in relevant and loving ways in our current contexts.

For me, personally, I left the AGM feeling challenged, yet uplifted, filled with hope for the church and encouragement for the church to be that holy vessel that breaks forth divine love to

a world that so much needs it. I was also uplifted by the many young persons at the meeting; children, youth, and young adults who took part in the proceedings. Many young persons I heard from, and some with whom I conversed within my table group, were so passionate about their faith and the life and work of their congregations.

Let me conclude quoting the Regional Council's Executive Minister, Treena Duncan:

"To be cracked open is to let go of certainty and control – and to discover, in the process, a deeper trust in the Spirit's guidance and the possibility of transformation.....Something holy is being released in this cracked open moment. And I see it – in communities of faith finding their voice, in youth discovering belonging, in leaders daring to rest, in ministries on the margins coming to life....May we also crack open the jars we've held too tightly. May we pour ourselves out for love. And may we discover again and again the sacred beauty that has been there all along."

May it be so! Thanks be to God!

Our regional minister the Rev. Gail Miller is still on leave and the Rev. Maggie Enwright continues to support the churches on Vancouver Island.

Mid North Island Regional Meeting Oct 4, 2025 at St. Peter's, Campbell River

This meeting brought together lay and clergy leaders from Port Hardy to Parksville. We worshiped together, discussed our local concerns and shared our commonalities. We found: members of other shared ministries; congregations with volunteer musicians; administrators who were given honoraria, congregations with fewer than 25 average Sunday attendance. It was good to see some diversity as well as similarities among our fellow Anglicans. Bishop Anna joined us after lunch and led a short workshop helping us to recognize church structures and lack of transparency which hinders our ministry. Our archdeacon, Elizabeth Northcott, has served the region well and we were sad that she retired in January 2026. She will be missed and we thanked her for her leadership, and hope that she enjoys her retirement.

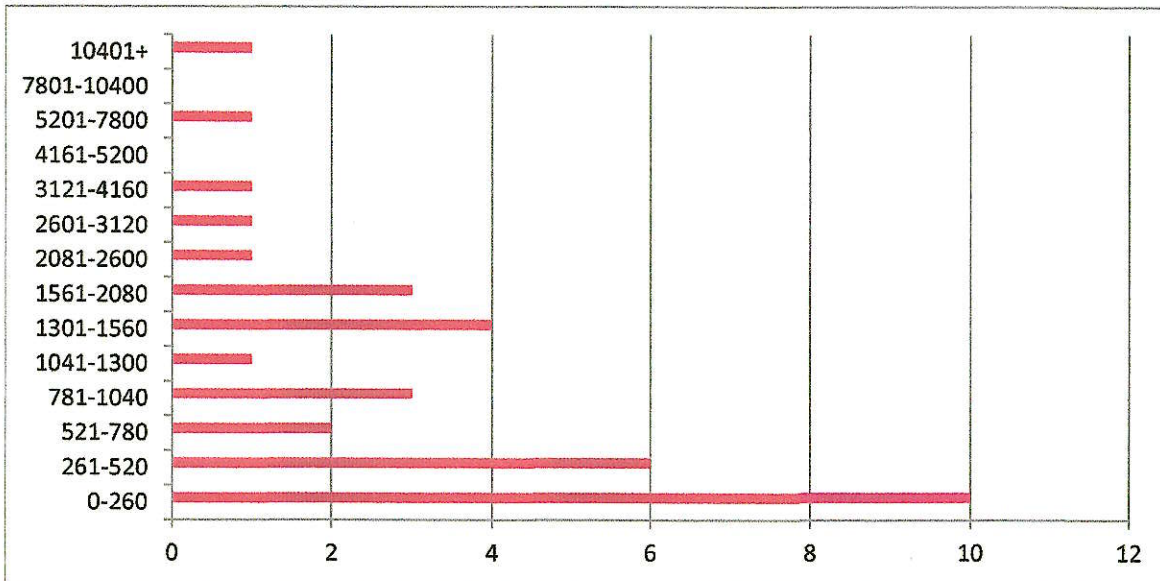

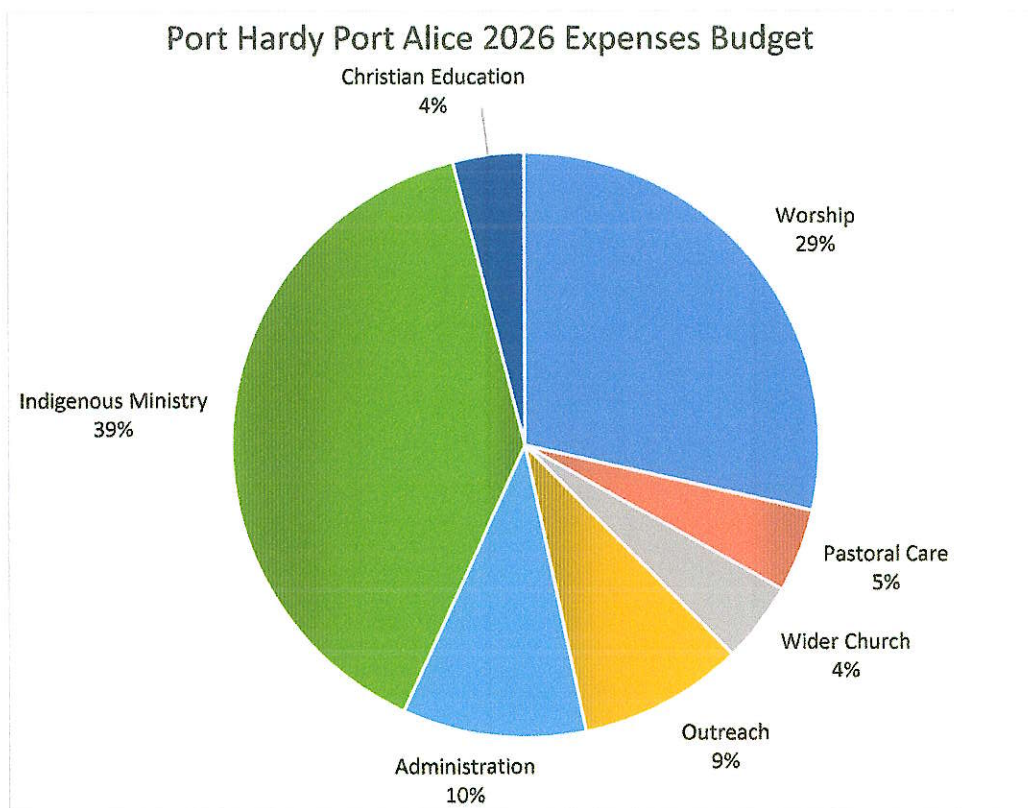
