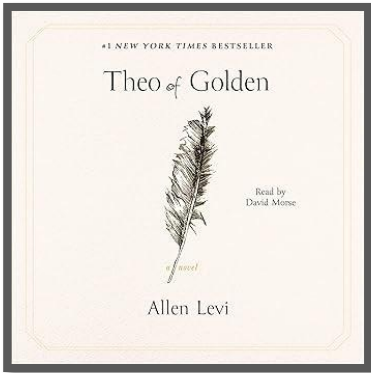
How do you know who to believe, which story is accurate, who has a hidden agenda, which news source is biased and which way?

“Active Justice”: Beth Donahoe

“He has shown you, O mortal, what is good. And what does the LORD require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God.” Micah 6:8

It was one of my mother’s favorite passages. Pastor Lara often repeats it during Sunday services. And it is one of the foundational elements of *Faith and Civic Life: Seeking the Well-being of All*—the social statement adopted by the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America last summer. Simply put, it is a call to action seeking greater awareness of, thoughtful civic engagement in, and concrete action by Lutherans in our congregation, our community and our country against the injustices and cruelty on display in our nation.

The statement was adopted by a more-than-two-thirds majority of the 17th Churchwide Assembly on August 1, 2025, in Phoenix, AZ. While a central theme in the statement is an appropriate Christian response to the abhorrent treatment of immigrants and people perceived to be “undocumented” in our society, it is not the only point they are making. Instead, this nearly 100-page document outlines – with scriptural and historical backing – the responsibilities we Christians, and particularly Lutherans, have for **all** of God’s creation – humankind, the animal kingdom, and the environment. It is a timely and urgent reminder that it is our duty to, “...act in civic life for the benefit of the neighbor, especially our marginalized or oppressed neighbors.” (p. 4). It is incumbent upon us as Christians to not just pray for the oppressed, but to serve them: to protect them, lift them up, and put them on a path toward wholeness in all segments of our community. Overall, I feel our congregation excels at this. We are a Reconciling in Christ congregation that has ministries which feed, house, and clothe “the least among us.” We have literally sold a portion of the church’s property so that others may have a place to live and thrive. And still, sadly, in the climate we face, it is not enough.

I understand that some of you reading this may be concerned about “the church playing politics.” But I am here to assure you, this document is NOT partisan. It is not anti-republican or anti-democrat: **it is pro-humanity**. As the document states in Article 18, “‘Politics,’ properly understood, means negotiating how benefits, burdens, rights, and responsibilities of living in a society are shared. Politics and ethics are necessarily related. Ethics discerns; politics implements.” Our responsibility as Christians is to be the ethical voice in a world necessarily ruled, and oftentimes misruled, by politics.

Your Council and the JEDI committee are both reading and studying this document in our times together. We plan to host discussion sessions in Adult Forums soon, so that we can better discern what this means for us as a congregation and as individuals.

Some may feel emboldened to take to the streets in protest; some may run for office; some may write letters to those unlawfully incarcerated or provide food for their struggling families. The point is, we all can and should contribute something.

For it is far too easy to retreat into our comfortable lives and shield ourselves from the pain just outside our doors. Doing so is – more than color, education, or economic advantages – the epitome of “privilege.” But with this social statement, the ELCA is appealing to us to bear witness and respond to the inhumanity and immorality on vivid display all around us. We were taught on day one of Sunday school the parable of the Good Samaritan, of caring for those the world has abused and ignored. It should come as no surprise then, that during a time of tremendous abuse and neglect by those in power in this country, that the ELCA is calling us back to class.

Most Generous God, we thank you for all that you provide to meet the needs of all your people. We thank you for the resources provided, by Imagine Housing, to people struggling to afford a safe place to live. We thank you for the staff and volunteers at Imagine Housing working to see that people in our community have a safe place to call home. Bless and sustain their work. Strengthen our partnership with Imagine Housing to support their mission. And watch over and protect the people in our neighborhoods that turn to Imagine Housing for a safe, healthy, affordable home. In Jesus' name we pray, Amen.

Some Background on Imagine Housing:

In 1987, a small group of highly passionate people at Saint Andrew's saw a clear need for more affordable housing in East King County. They soon formed Saint Andrew's Housing Group as an independent non-profit organization focused entirely on creating affordable apartment homes in the region.

In 1992, Saint Andrew's Housing Group (SAHG) opened its first housing development, Andrew's Arms, offering 14 units of affordable housing in Issaquah, Washington.

In 2011 Saint Andrew's Housing Group was renamed Imagine Housing, to more broadly reflect our mission to build and operate permanent affordable rental communities and provide support within those communities.

Imagine Housing owns and operates 16 properties across East King County and partners with two other housing developments (Capella at Esterra and Ardea) to provide resident services on-site. Between IH-owned properties and the two partner developments, Imagine Housing supports 908 apartment homes.

Imagine Housing's residential services are designed to help residents not just secure housing but *thrive* within it. At the core of their residential services is **direct, ongoing support** that strengthens stability, well-being, and community connection.

Key elements of Imagine Housing's residential services

- **Resident Support & Case Management:** Staff provide thousands of hours of individualized support each year, helping residents navigate benefits, employment, education, and personal goals.
- **Basic Needs Assistance:** Residents receive essential items such as food, clothing, household supplies, and children's necessities – critical support for individuals and families starting from scratch or recovering from instability.

- **Community Engagement & Programming:** Hundreds of community events and partnerships bring services directly to residents, including wellness programs, youth activities, financial literacy, and social connection opportunities.
- **Supportive Housing Approach:** Many communities include supportive services for seniors, veterans, and families, ensuring long-term housing stability and access to resources that prevent homelessness.

The latest news from Imagine Housing:

- Imagine Housing's 18 communities are home to 1600 people with diverse backgrounds, stories, and goals.
- Imagine Housing's newest property, Samma, will be opening in Bothell this spring, serving individuals 55+.
- Saint Andrew's has joined with Imagine Housing to develop 100 units of affordable housing on the East side of Saint Andrew's parking lot. The plans for the project are in permit review. Construction is planned to start in late spring 2027 with occupancy in early 2029.
- In addition to Imagine Housing's newest development with Saint Andrew's, two more developments are on the horizon. Imagine Housing will be partnering with St. Peter's United Methodist Church on a multi-family housing development in Bellevue. Imagine Housing is also partnering with Habitat for Humanity on a multifamily project in Kenmore that combines rental and home ownership opportunities.
- Imagine Housing's annual signature fundraising event is coming up on May 15th. This is a great opportunity to learn about Imagine Housing and support the work that Imagine Housing does through a high-energy social event. 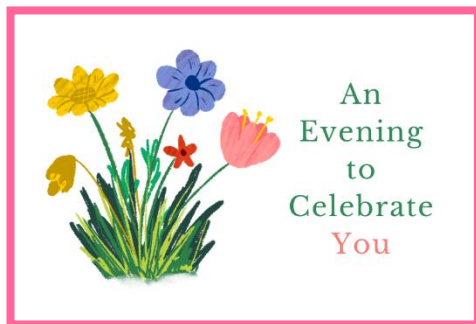

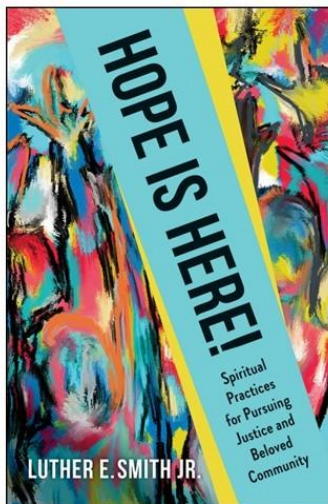

	<p>With the tenth anniversary of the Robert Wech Opus 10 organ at Queen Anne Lutheran Church missed due to the pandemic, the season finale concert celebrates fifteen years of the instrument—one of only two full-sized examples in the United States by the German organ builder.</p> <p>Joseph Adam has been Cathedral Organist at Seattle's St. James Cathedral since 1993 and Director of Music since 2018. As Resident Organist at Benaroya Hall, he performs regularly with the Seattle Symphony. He received First Prize at the 1991 St. Albans International Organ Competition, the most recent American to take top honors in this prestigious competition. He was one of three organists invited to perform on the new Rosales/Glatzer-Götz organ at Disney Hall in Los Angeles as part of the 2004 National Convention of the American Guild of Organists, and his performance was featured on the nationally-syndicated radio program <i>Pipe Dreams</i>.
