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Several weeks ago, I sat with a man named Edward and prayed for him as he was preparing the next day for a long bus trip down to San Antonio, Texas. He had apprehensions about going, but he said it would be his first opportunity to see his mother in over 8 years. I met Edward about a month before through the work of our Benevolence Fund. We supported Edward with a few hotel stays and cards for food as he tried to find a job in the Beaver Dam area, before he finally made the decision to travel back home. If you can, please say a prayer for Edward that God would be opening providential doors for him and a good welcome home.

In the early days of the church, as the apostles began traveling far and wide with the good news of Jesus Christ, one of the other important tasks they continued to remind each other of was, *“Remember the poor”* (Gal.2:10). Just as Jesus’ preaching about the Kingdom of God came with tangible experiences (healings and miracles), Christians, as Jesus’ followers, must always seek by the Holy Spirit’s power that others would *feel* the gospel as well as *hear* it. This means, as individual Christians and as a church, we ask for attentiveness to where God may use us to help alleviate the burden of poverty, even in small ways.

At FRC, our Benevolence Fund sees plenty of activity as it receives and sends out support for our Mission-of-the-Month offerings, the Thanksgiving offering and our regular pledges to missionaries, but as the Deacon Board has begun discussing this year, we’d like to connect the church more to the work of our “Local Needs” fund within our Benevolence. Last year, our Local Needs giving totaled \$4,412, including hotel stays, gas and food cards, rent assistance, and contributions to families with sudden emergencies. For the first time, the Deacon Board has set itself a goal for Local Needs giving – to increase giving 20% in 2026 to \$5,300. This means that in addition to people coming to us with needs, the Deacon Board wants to prayerfully keep eyes open over this year for perhaps a few more places where the Spirit is calling us to show Christ’s compassion.

Even though Benevolence requires confidentiality, we are also seeking ways of keeping the church more up-to-date broadly on our ministry of addressing local needs – both needs within our church and in the community. After all, *“the poor”* is not just a group of unfortunate people *over there* but an experience that comes to many of us in different forms and at different times. For those who give to our Benevolence Fund, thank you, and we look forward to letting the church know more about how Benevolence work is going. And if you have any specific thoughts or ideas, please feel free to share them with one of our deacons.

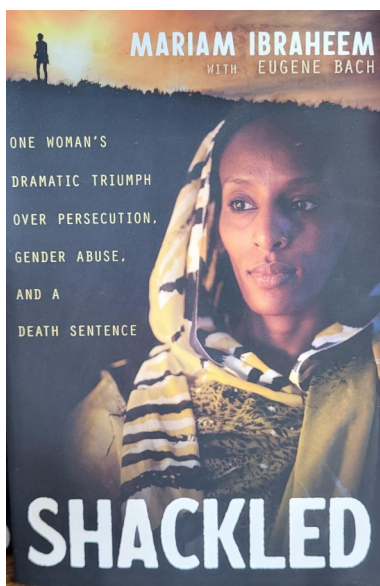

To hear Mariam's Story on Sunday, April 12 at 10:30am at The Gathering Place



Mariam Ibraheem was born in a Sudanese refugee camp and raised Christian after her Muslim father died in 2013, Sudanese authorities declared she was legally Muslim because of her father's background and accused her of breaking the law by marrying a Christian man. She was ordered to abandon her faith, her marriage, and her child — or face punishment. Mariam refused every demand to deny Jesus. A Sharia court sentenced her to 100 lashes and death by hanging.

Shackled tells the remarkable true story of Mariam Ibraheem, a brave young mother who risked her life rather than renounce her beliefs. She advocated for women facing gender-based mistreatment and for those enduring religious persecution.

Come and be encouraged as Mariam testifies to God's faithfulness in the midst of persecution. Her story is a powerful reminder that Christ sustains His people through every trial, and her courage will challenge and strengthen your own walk with Him.

Next, we assembled our gardens in pie plates. As each item was added, we talked about its symbolism and what it represents at Easter:

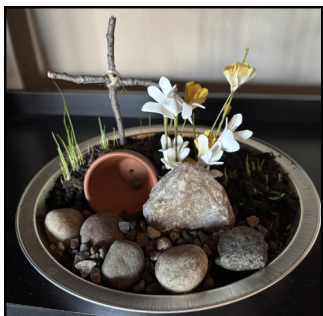
Dirt — Reminds us that we are formed from dust and will return to dust- Ash Wednesday

Flower pot — Represents the tomb where Jesus was buried.

Grass seed — Symbolizes new life.

Large stone — Stands for the stone rolled away from the tomb, signifying Jesus' resurrection.

Cross — Represents Jesus dying on Good Friday for our sins.

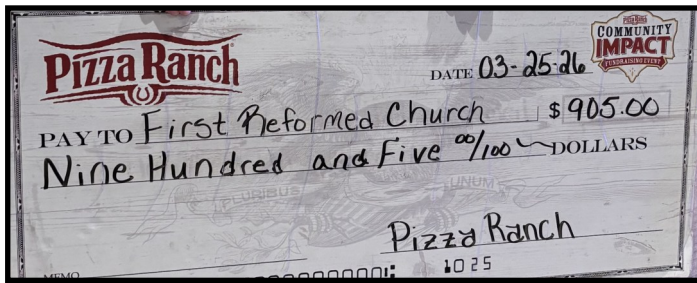

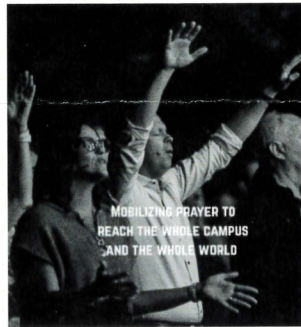

What a joy it was for **the Prayer Catalyst Team**, including Colleen, to attend the live **Collegiate Day of Prayer event at Liberty University** with 7,000 students and over 120 national and international campus ministry leaders! To hear these students worshipping wholeheartedly, confessing humbly and praying passionately for the world was a beautiful hum throughout Vines Auditorium. Tom enjoyed watching the livestream and worshipping and praying along with everyone.

Colleen has been representing Cru as she serves on the Collegiate Day of Prayer (CDOP) Ops Team. In 2025, our Ops Team sensed the Holy Spirit leading us to not only call multiple generations and denominations to pray for the US campuses but for the whole world! **That is 30,000 campuses!**

We love the way God works. Colleen's Cru prayer team had recently sensed God calling them to this vision: **"Mobilizing prayer to reach the whole campus and the whole world."**



On the last Thursday in February every year, we ask believers to adopt campuses to pray for on that day. In 2025 we had over 6,000 campuses adopted. This year we had over 8,000 campuses adopted in prayer. Praise God He is growing our coverage! Oh, for the day when every campus across this wide world will be prayed for by a believer, a small group, or a church. What might God do as we cover these campuses in prayer? He is already doing amazing things!

A Liberty student commented: *CDOP was one of the most incredible events I have ever seen in my life... I know how much work and prayer and fasting and time were put into CDOP... The Lord undoubtedly moved last night through our campus. The honesty, repentance, submission and joy that I saw last night from myself and others in my groups was incredible... Last night was a life changing event that I will talk about for years and years. Thank you.*

There was more behind the scenes. The students gathered in prayer for 2 hours for the livestream event. Then the students were moved to the chapel where they continued to worship and pray for another 2 hours. It was so packed, they had to wait in line outside to get into the prayer time! Have you ever waited in line for a prayer meeting? God is doing something extraordinary in this generation!

The international leaders who attended (from Kenya, the Philippines, India, Argentina, Brazil and Colombia) met to discuss how their countries might run a Collegiate Day of Prayer in their regions of the world! Already they have several CDOP Summits tentatively scheduled in their part of the world to further explore what CDOP might look like for them.
