Board Report

As we recover from 'too many late snowfalls', many of us need to focus on 'what lies ahead'. Your Board has been busy, working on 'what lies ahead'. We have advertised, interviewed and now hired a second part-time Administrative Assistant who will report to Judy. Please welcome **Marilee Manz** to our staff! Marilee grew up in LCOS with her parents (Lloyd and Earlene) and brother (Greg). Judy is overseeing her training for the next few weeks. She is a welcome addition to the church office and will keep regular office hours. I encourage each of you to stop by, introduce yourself and make her feel welcome.

More good news! **Sophia Della Rosa** (daughter of Donna and Frank) has agreed to join the Board. Her presence will assist us in decisions involving youth ministry and, because she is a practicing lawyer, provide sage advice as we need it.

Still further, we are actively looking for a Youth Leader. We are continuing to advertise for a part-time Youth Leader and are confident the right person will be identified very soon. I am thankful for the assistance of **Sophia** and **Charley in this process**. Please pray for us as we work to fill this important role to enhance youth presence at LCOS.

As an update, our Call Committee continues to correspond with the Bishop. In short, there are no candidates being referred to us. The good news however, is there are plans being made by the National church to equip lay leaders to complete communion and conversations with interested candidates from Africa being held. Of course, we are managing well with **Pastors Lee, Margaret and Stan**, however, **Lee** will be away until October. This underlines our obvious need for a Senior Pastor. The Board is currently discussing other options and will keep you posted as we progress.

We have awarded a contract to fix the west parking lot! A committee of the Board has reviewed the quotations received and the vendor will begin work to remove, repair and install new asphalt on May 11th.

The quotes for enhancing the west entry doors have been slow but this work will also occur during the summer period. Hopefully that will mean less 'call-outs'. Finally, work on repairing the flat roof area over the library is being completed and will hopefully stop the leak in the library.

Please continue to keep all members of your Board in your prayers as we manage the affairs of LCOS.

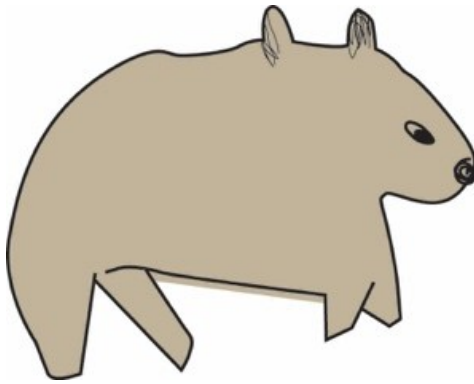

How long has the preschool been open? This is our 10th year. We first opened our doors to families in September 2016.

Why Painted Wombat Fine Arts Preschool? I knew I wanted to incorporate two things: art and my love & connection with Australia, as both my kids were born there. “Painted” reflected the art aspect and “Wombat” represented an Australian animal not as well-known as a kangaroo or koala. Did you know a group of wombats is called a WISDOM?

FUN FACT: My daughter Neveah drew the logo for the preschool. She was 7 years old at the time.

Favourite memories from over the years:

Art shows are my favourite, hands down. It is a time to celebrate the children, to showcase their artwork to their families and a place for everyone to socialize and connect.

Silly day, kid’s painting their own faces, hatching ducks, having parents and grandparents join us in the classroom, putting eye balls on everything like artist’s Jon Burgerman and Charlotte Love, using unconventional materials to apply paint like Charlie French, dressing up as favourite book characters, and our annual trunk-or-treat event.

The best part of being a preschool teacher is seeing kids’ faces light up with excitement and pride over something discovered or created, watching friendships form, and hearing their laughter.

What's Been Happening at LCOS



SWARM (Southwest Area Refugee Mission)

Appeal Letter

As you may be aware, SWARM (Southwest Area Refugee Mission), has helped over 550 families over the past 4 years through supply of furniture and living supplies, and we continue to support a number of families with essential needs such as housing costs and food insecurity. We are helping a young university student from Somalia sponsor his sisters to come to Canada. We are assisting a Ukrainian student with some of his post secondary study application costs. We bring new families together with a picnic in the park so that they can meet and build friendships. We continue to respond to what God puts before us.

Here is a special situation that needs greater funding:

We are currently assisting a single mom (from Ukraine) and her three-and-a-half-year-old son. She is hard working and resourceful and her son has recently been diagnosed with a severe speech delay and autism. It's a difficult road to navigate and she is doing it alone. We are hoping to raise significant funds to assist her for the next 6 months with rental subsidy (\$500/month), daycare costs (\$330/month) and private therapy (\$600/month) for her son. By September, we hope he will be able to access special assistance at his daycare and special schooling in the afternoons. Mom faces the same issues that all Ukrainian evacuees are facing to iron out their future status in Canada. Until then, SWARM will assist this young single mother with these costs and continue to help with the sea of applications and paperwork that goes with their situation.

Any donations will go a long way toward helping this little family – and others - to become self-sufficient and confident in their future.

Feed the Hungry

On the third Friday of each month a group of LCOS volunteers serves food to those in need at the Chinook Transit Station.

Volunteers should meet at the church by 3:30 to load food into vehicles to take to the station.

We ask that hot food (stews, soups, casseroles) be packaged in advance in individual sealed containers. A supply of containers is available at the church.

Cold food items (fruit, snack bars, cookies, muffins) and drinks can be dropped off at the church during office hours and should be individually packaged.

A monthly sign up sheet for those wishing to volunteer is located in the Place of Welcome.

Along with food, clothing is accepted throughout the month, and can be dropped off in the Feed the Hungry boxes located by the east entrance of the church. These boxes are specifically labelled and we ask that items be placed in the appropriate box for ease of distribution. Items accepted includes hats, socks, footwear, mittens, blankets, coats, pants and sweaters.

Library News

Spring has sprung! Or has it? It seems that this year spring and winter have flip-flopped faster than a puck during the Stanley Cup Finals. Weather forecast apps differ from site to site; which one do we trust? News reports are everywhere on the internet; which ones are real and which are fake? From phishing e-mails to scammers and everything in between, how do we know who to trust?

As Christians, we trust in God. But because we're human we can also have doubts. If you've ever wondered how God could possibly love someone like you or me, where do you go for the answers? Where do we turn for help? Where do we find the evidence of God's love?

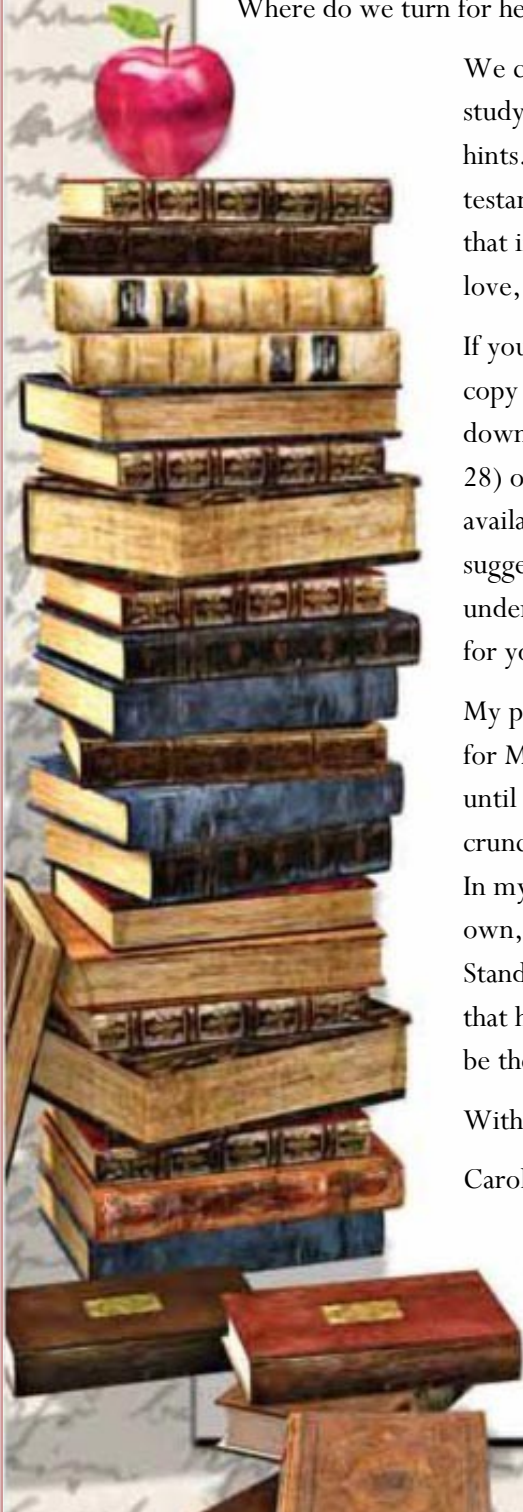
We can look deeper into His words to find clues; that's why it's called "Bible study". It takes time, patience, and perseverance to ferret out the clues and hints. There are people that spend their entire lives studying the old and new testaments, letters and books. I'm not saying we need to become scholars, only that if we need reassurance, affirmation, or examples of God's steadfastness and love, we should make the effort to search out the answers for ourselves.

If you don't have a bible it's pretty easy to get hold of one. You can buy a hard copy from a bookstore or online. There are electronic versions that you can download. You're welcome to borrow one from the Browsing Library (Section 28) or the Fireside Room. Our library even has audio and video versions available. Which version you choose is entirely up to you, although I would suggest selecting one that you feel most comfortable with. If you struggle to understand "thy, thine, thou", the King James version may not be the ideal fit for you.

My parents kept a King James version beside their bed, as well as a Good News for Modern Man edition. I don't think the King James version was even opened until my siblings and I were enrolled in Confirmation classes. The spine made crunchy noises as the glue crackled in protest when the book was being opened. In my teens, after I experienced my "God Moment", I felt I needed a bible of my own, one that would make comprehension easier; I chose a New Revised Standard. Some people may have noticed that Pastor Lee has several versions that he uses when he shares his time with us. Whichever one you choose, let it be the one that lets God speak clearly to you.

An update from Rachael Unger, Pat & Ken Farn's granddaughter,
who is doing a six-month mission experience with YWAM.

Bula friends and family,

What a privilege to be writing you guys from Fiji!

Previously I have been in the Northland of New Zealand finishing up the lecture phase, and finally I am beginning my outreach phase! I will spend 5-ish weeks in Fiji and then fly to Tonga for 3-ish weeks.

For now let me give you a recap of my time in New Zealand.

My Ring of Fire DTS was combined into the Northland DTS with a unique welcoming ceremony called Powhidi. Powhidi is a very intimate Maori greeting where two people hold hands, press foreheads and breathe each other's breath. It signifies peace between the two parties. And honestly it was a perfect representation of the relation between our two schools. We all were very unified, peaceful and immensely blessed by each other. I made so many incredible friends and was always very entertained by all the combined cultures.

We spent a week in Paihia learning about the history of the missionaries, settlers, English crown, and the Maori people. Some historical locations we went to were the Marsden Cross, the Waitangi treaty grounds, the Flagpole on Russel Islands, and the oldest church in New Zealand. The following weeks focused on: Relationships, Lordship, Spiritual Authority, and Social Spheres. Some takeaways included:

-As humans we are made in His image and born into relation with Him and all creation. It is a reality to our being that cannot be changed. We can choose to live in alignment to that reality and bear healthy fruit in our relations to ourselves, others, and God. Or we can live in friction and neglect our call to love and be loved in relation to everything.

God is Lord of our life whether we 'let Him' or not. It is actual freedom when He is in control. For Jesus, leadership never looks like manipulation and coercion, but instead like loving sacrifice and invitation.

Humans are the only created being that can dwell in both physical and spiritual realms. The spiritual realm is a permanent reality. How we choose to engage with it matters. Don't foolishly engage with it, but also don't walk in fear and avoid it. Walk in authority because words spoken in faith have power. The Holy Spirit that resides in us is the same spirit that raised Jesus from the dead.

I am so grateful for this past season of growth and learning in the classroom but I am also super grateful it's over. I don't think I could be more ready or excited for practical outreach in Fiji and Tonga :)

Please pray for my health as I am still carrying some sickness and infections on my leg. Life in the Pacific is beautiful and exciting but the more remote you go, the harder it is in almost every aspect. I have been praying about getting proper medical care if needed, having access to clean food and water, and the deep roots of spiritual warfare and strongholds of witchcraft etc. If you are willing, join me in prayer against attacks from the enemy in our physical, spiritual and mental health. Pray for safety and provision as we step out in faith. Also I would ask that you pray for the Holy Spirit to guide us according to His will, so we will speak the right things in the right places to the right people.

Time Capsule

The 1899 cornerstone date for the Eau Claire Scandinavian Lutheran congregation has been used for anniversary celebrations. Monday May 28, 1900 is mentioned in Rev. Cherland's book Lutheran Legacy pg 9.

The Roll of Honor
The historical order of the pastor's service here is as follows: H. C. Wik 1899-1901, C. M. Nodtvedt 1902-1903, O. J. Satre 1904-1906, M. B. Anderson 1906-1909, C. O. B. Ness 1910-1913, A. H. Thorsen, 1914-1916, visiting pastors 1917 and H. J. Folkland 1918-1920.

Rev. H. C. Wik of Wetaskiwin came to hold services in private homes in 1889. Basement dedicated 1910. C. O. B. Ness was the first resident pastor according to the Herald news article of Feb 10, 1962.

Time Capsule, continued

The Norwegian Young Peoples' Organization was formed in 1910. The manse on the lot adjoining the church cost \$1800 and was completed in 1914. It was decided at the annual meeting of February 15, 1923 to build a church on the basement. The mortgage was burned in 1933 and the congregation became self-supporting in 1949.

English became the language for the morning service in May 1927 and Norwegian for the informal evening service. The services were all in English from 1937 and Trinity became the name of the church.

As of 2026, Calgary has two Trinity Churches, the former Norwegian Lutheran and Trinity Baptist at 9920 Fairmount Drive SE in the community of Willow Park. Trinity Methodist began in Robert and Anna Legge's home in East Calgary in 1904 because Central Methodist was too far away. It had several name changes and relocations. The existing 1913 building at 1401-1 Ave SE was renamed Lantern Community Church around 2006.
