

Reflection Questions

Titus 2:3-5

- In Titus 2:3-5, what specific qualities are older women called to embody?
- What does “reverent in behavior” look like in everyday life?
- Why do you think teaching “what is good” is emphasized before instructing others?
- How does this passage define “sound doctrine” in practical, lived-out terms rather than abstract beliefs?
- Who has been a “godly mother” or mentor figure in your life? What did they model or teach you?
- In what ways are your words and actions currently teaching others—intentionally or unintentionally?
- Are there areas where your lifestyle might contradict the truth you profess?
- How do you respond to the idea of being spiritually responsible for guiding others?
- How are you currently investing in the next generation of women?
- What experiences—both successes and failures—has God given you that could benefit others?
- Are there barriers (fear, busyness, insecurity) that keep you from mentoring? How might you address them?
- Are you open to receiving guidance and correction from more mature believers?
- What qualities do you seek in a mentor, and are you actively pursuing that relationship?
- How can you grow in areas mentioned in the passage (love, self-control, purity, kindness)?
- What is one specific step you can take this week to either mentor or seek mentorship?
- How can you model “sound doctrine” in your home, workplace, or community?
- What habits or disciplines would help you live in a way that honors God and teaches others?
