Big Idea: Most people want to believe that their life has meaning and purpose. The problem is, sin has riddled our natural ambitions with pride, and that pride corrupts even our very best intentions. As a result, we often end up looking down upon others in order to prop up an inflated image of ourselves. Instead of seeing the opportunities to serve the needs of those around us. The significance we long for is only found in a life of faith-fueled surrender and devotion to the Almighty God.
