



13 And I heard a voice from heaven saying unto me, Write, Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from henceforth: Yea, saith the Spirit, that they may rest from their labours; and their works do follow them.



14 And I looked, and behold a white cloud, and upon the cloud one sat like unto the Son of man, having on his head a golden crown, and in his hand a sharp sickle.



15 - And another angel came out of the temple, crying with a loud voice to him that sat on the cloud, Thrust in thy sickle, and reap: for the time is come for thee to reap; for the harvest of the earth is ripe.

Wheat: Represents the "children of the kingdom" (true believers). As the wheat ripens and bears grain, it **bows downward** due to the weight of the fruit, symbolizing humility.

Tares (Darnel): Represents the "children of the wicked one". In their early stages, they look deceptively similar to wheat. However, as they mature, tares produce no valuable fruit, and they **stand tall and rigid**, symbolizing pride





16 And he that sat on the cloud thrust in his sickle on the earth; and the earth was reaped.



**17 And another angel came out of the temple which is in heaven,
he also having a sharp sickle.**




18 And another angel came out from the altar, **which had power over fire**; and **cried with a loud cry to him that had the sharp sickle**, saying, Thrust in thy sharp sickle, and gather the clusters of the vine of the earth; for her **grapes are fully ripe**.



19 And the angel thrust in his sickle into the earth, and gathered the vine of the earth, and cast it into the great winepress of the wrath of God.



20 And the **winepress** was trodden without the city, and blood came out of the winepress, even unto the horse bridles, by the space of a thousand and six hundred furlongs.



The "space of 1,600 furlongs" (or 1,600 stadia) is a symbolic, prophetic measurement in Revelation 14:20, commonly interpreted to represent 200 miles. It describes a river of blood flowing from a winepress to indicate the vastness, totality, and intensity of divine judgment
