

# Summary

This sermon examines the seven letters to the churches in Revelation 3, focusing on how Jesus reveals truth about the church through these diagnostic letters. The pastor emphasizes that these letters are not church improvement memos but rather reveal how churches can drift from faithfulness when influenced by evil spirits masquerading as the Spirit of God. Each of the seven churches represents different ways modern congregations can be led astray: Ephesus abandoned love for doctrinal gatekeeping, Smyrna faced self-serving consumerism, Pergamum and Thyatira compromised through accommodation and privatized faith, Sardis lived in comfortable nostalgia, Laodicea became self-sufficient and lukewarm, while Philadelphia faced fear despite their faithfulness. The central message warns that churches often confuse the spirits of the beast with the Spirit of God, leading them to lock Jesus himself out of their congregations while believing they are serving Him faithfully.

## Intro Prayer

Father, as we gather together today to study Your Word and examine our hearts, we ask that You would open our minds and spirits to what You want us to learn. Help us to be honest about where we are as individuals and as a church body. Give us the courage to face difficult truths about ourselves and the wisdom to discern Your true Spirit from the false spirits that would lead us astray. # Questions

- Which of the seven churches described in this passage do you think most closely resembles churches you've experienced, and why?
- The pastor mentioned that we often try to 'tame' or 'domesticate' God. What are some ways you've seen this happen in church culture or in your own faith journey?
- How can we tell the difference between being influenced by the Holy Spirit versus being influenced by 'spirits of the beast' that masquerade as God's Spirit?
- The church in Ephesus was criticized for abandoning their 'first love' while maintaining correct doctrine. How can a church or individual maintain both doctrinal faithfulness and genuine love?
- What does it mean for a church to 'privatize' their faith like Thyatira did, and how might this look in modern church culture?
- The church in Sardis was described as having 'a name of being alive, but you are dead.' What are some signs that a church might be spiritually dead despite appearing active?
- Philadelphia was small but faithful, while Laodicea was wealthy but lukewarm. What does this teach us about the relationship between size, resources, and spiritual health?
- How can we as a church body hold each other accountable while still showing grace and love to those who are struggling?

## Life Application

This week, spend time in honest self-examination asking God to reveal any areas where you might be confusing worldly spirits with His Spirit. Choose one specific area where you need to surrender more fully to Christ, whether it's fear, pride, comfort, or compromise, and take one concrete step toward repentance and change.
