PASTOR'S MESSAGE

Dear Saints,

Grace to you and peace in this season of summer light and renewed hope.

Yours, mine, and ours. These little words say a great deal about how we understand our lives together. "Yours" and "mine" can be useful words, of course. They help us name responsibilities, gifts, and belongings. But the word "ours" opens a wider door. It reminds us that God has joined us together in Christ, called us into one body, and entrusted us with a shared mission.

That is the beautiful work before us as a congregation in June 2026. We are not simply maintaining what has been handed down to us. We are receiving it with gratitude, tending it with joy, and offering it forward with hope. The ministry of this congregation is ours to steward for this time and place, but even more deeply, it belongs to God. And our God is abundant.

The early church in Acts 2 gives us a picture of this kind of holy abundance:

"They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers... All who believed were together and had all things in common... they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God."

What a joyful image of the church: people gathered in worship, learning together, sharing meals, praying, giving generously, and trusting that God was at work among them. They did not begin with scarcity or fear. They began with the Spirit. They began with community. They began with glad and generous hearts.

That same Spirit is still moving. God is still calling people together. God is still multiplying gifts. God is still giving the church everything it needs for the sake of love, service, worship, welcome, and witness.

So let us be enthusiastic about the mission we share. First Lutheran is **our** church not in the sense that we own it, but because God has entrusted it to us for the sake of the world God so deeply loves.

And God has given us much to share: faith, prayer, welcome, compassion, generosity, music, service, forgiveness, bread, wine, water, and the good news of Jesus Christ. And because God is abundant, there is always enough grace to begin again,

enough hope to move forward, and enough love to widen the circle.

Thanks be to God for the mission we share.

DEACON KORRA REFLECTIONS

In a recent conversation with high school youth, a teenage boy said, "We used to attend a different church, but we kept coming back to First Lutheran because it's a totally different culture". He went on to explain that at First, he (and other teens) feels truly welcomed and that adults take a genuine interest in his life. In youth ministry we call this "accompaniment". Accompaniment means to come alongside for a journey, and the concept can be traced back hundreds of years. It has recently gained traction in Catholic communities after Pope Francis' emphasis in the concept of pastoral care and outreach to younger generations. His claim is that young people need trusted adults who are willing to journey together with them through adolescence and faith exploration and development. Pope Francis writes, "spiritual accompaniment must lead others closer to God". Key concepts include the following:

- Personal Encounter-The church needs to walk alongside young people, showing genuine care and understanding.
- Listening and Dialogue-Pope Francis emphasizes the importance of listening to young people, valuing their voices, and engaging in meaningful dialogue.
- Faith Formation-It's not just about doctrines but about helping young people develop a deep relationship with God so their hearts and minds are shaped and molded.
- Being a witness-Adults should serve as positive role models and witnesses of the faith.

Thank you for accompanying our youth. We do this when we gather at pot-lucks, milestone celebrations, mentoring, and service together. Thank you to all who attended the Graduation Celebration Breakfast and helped make that event meaningful. Thanks to our dedicated and passionate Sunday School teachers and our Faith Formation Team. Let's continue to challenge each other to grow in our faith, service to others, and to accompany young people in their faith journey.

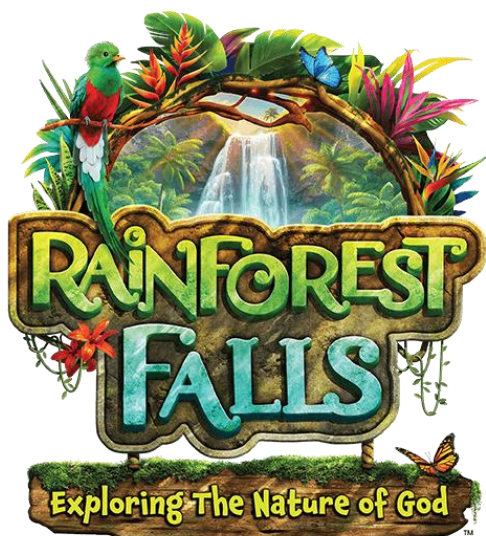
BIKE NIGHT-WEDNESDAY

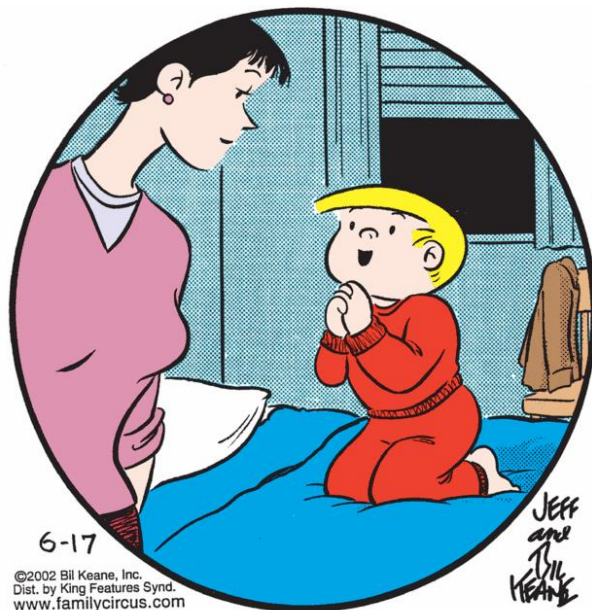
NEWS
