1. **Welcome and Introduction of Board Members:** Murray Rust, Monte Paulson, Jesse Kornelsen, Tammy Klapstein, Regina Hansen, Stephanie Vander Veen
2. **Opening Prayer:** Regina Hansen
3. **Devotional:** Fear of the Lord is the beginning of Wisdom. Psalm 19. Our staff here are amazing! They are qualified and devoted, but most importantly, they love the Lord. We are blessed, and we appreciate you so much. We get wisdom through the Lord and His statutes. Through a world of change, He does not change. Praise the Lord.
4. **Business Items:**
  - a) **Adoption and/or Amendment of Agenda:** Mike Weselowski makes the motion to approve. Julene Kornelsen seconds. MSC
  - b) **Review and Approval of the February 13, 2024, Annual Society Meeting Minutes:** Denise Ronda makes the motion to approve. Jessica Rameder seconds. MSC
  - c) **Review and Approval of the 2023-2024 Annual Reports:** Mike Weselowski makes a motion to approve. Kelly Maxwell seconds. MSC
  - d) **Review and Approval of 2023-2024 Audited Financial Statements:** Denise Ronda makes a motion to approve. Jessica Rameder seconds. MSC
  - e) **2024-2025 Nominations and Vote for New Board Members:** Mr. Josh Hawley has put his name forward for consideration to join the board. Vote shows majority of hands to accept Josh Hawley as our newest board member. Congrats Josh!
5. **New Business:**
  - a) **Teacher Salary Update:** Tammy Klapstein: There has not been an increase for several years. We gave them a 12% increase this past year, trying to match Black Golds staff salary. We are currently at 70%. We are hoping and praying and working to meet that 5% gap.
  - b) **Tuition Fees Update:** Jesse Kornelsen: Last year we discussed hitting a \$3,500.00 fee for tuition in the next several years. Last year, we had a tuition at \$2,000.00. There is no fundraising commitment. Just volunteering instead. 10 hours for Kindergarten. 20 hours for Grade 1-9, per family. We are expecting our tuition to go up approximately \$500.00 per year until we hit \$3,000.00. We have been asked if there has been any pushback from families for the rise in tuition, but we have not heard from Valentina that that is the case. Charitable receipt is given for a portion of funds, but not all. Will it be a lump sum at the beginning of the year, or throughout the year? It is a families choice, with a 5% discount if paid upfront at the beginning of the year. Why are we offering a discount? Because it helps our staff get paid without waiting months for government payment, or tuition to come in. Now that we are asking more for tuition, is the school offering more in terms of curriculum, activities, etc? We are still offering the same programs and educational curriculum. From a previous school, there was mandatory participation, and if you did not participate, you would pay for it. We had that previously for our volunteer hours, but it takes a lot of work sometimes to find volunteers. Is there a reason we discontinued the Silent Auction? It was a lot of work, and from our list of actual customers, the list is getting smaller, or the same donors were buying back their own donations. A lot of the funds were being donated from the same people, and the amount of time and commitment and work did not seem to justify. We decided to pause for a few years. We may bring it back in the future, but nothing is set right now. The revenue from the silent auction is roughly four students. We are currently choosing to put our efforts into gaining more students.  
We have heard that from last years AGM that schools live or die by enrollment. Have we heard how we're doing? We have increased this year by 20 students. Valentina Martens has received several phone calls from South Edmonton families. There was a Pre-Kindergarten School Open House this past week, and several families were extremely interested, loving the values in the school. Our student body is growing. Our school is not, and in some places, we are feeling a bit snug.
  - c) **High School Update:** Murray Rust: We have been discussing this possibility for quite some time. We sent out a survey, and many parents mentioned if there was a high school, they would bring their friends to come too. Some of the

things they have asked for is excellent academic classes taught, and would we have involvement with other schools for music or sports? Would we have enough students to fund a full-time teacher, or the space? We have looked into other schools (Living Truth Christian School, for example) to see how they make it work. Some subjects are with a live teacher, and some classes are through online correspondence. Murray will be travelling to see one of the schools, to ask lots of questions, and see how they make it work successfully for the students.

**d) Homeschooling Possibility:** Valentina Martens: She was hoping to address this question, but being unwell, Jesse Kornelsen is presenting. How can we help with homeschooling, and be that place to work through? What would that mean for the teachers here? How are teachers benefitting from having students not in class? Will there be another facilitator. Who can help with extra work? Should be more funds from the government to assist, but not as much as a full-time student. Our piano teacher is a successful homeschooler who has taught all four of her children. Homeschooling can be a successful option here, but something that we would need to look into more.

**6. Question and Answer Session:** Jesse Kornelsen: Kelly Maxwell says every time she talks to anybody, they just do not know what is in this building until you come inside. After being invited to come inside, I have never worked with the quality of staff, and the amazing students. We are commended for our joy and what we have been doing. Tammy Klapstein mentioned our kids are amazing. At the Calmar Curling Club our kids were just so good and commended to be so well-behaved and polite. Murray Rust mentioned how well our kids work well together. Working for Edmonton Public, he's worked with many teachers and with lots of different students. The teachers and programs we have here are outstanding. Denise Ronda mentioned how well our kids play well and respect each other, even while playing popcorn tag during recess today. Rhonda Bray mentioned that Heather Berrington has heard from others that her previous students have been asked from high school teachers, "Where did you learn to write so well," "Tell stories so well," "Where did you learn to write so neatly?" She asks her students to keep a high standard, and we are honoured she is one of our teachers.

## PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

2024 - 2025

We praise the Lord for another wonderful year at Devon Christian School! God blessed us with 14 pre-kindergarten students and 92 students in kindergarten to grade nine. The children are so dear to our hearts, and it is an honour to learn and grow with them each day.

We had an amazing team of staff who loved the Lord and did their best to model a Christian lifestyle to students on a daily basis. Each educator displayed a personal relationship with Christ and was dedicated to serving the children and families that the Lord had put in their care. As a team we joined with parents in guiding students to love and serve the Lord and others. This entailed communicating a Biblical worldview of current issues or events or incorporating learning through traditional methods, research, technology, or hands on activities. Devon Christian School students endeavored to become proficient, knowledgeable, and passionate individuals who contributed to their society in meaningful ways. Staff members taught from a Christian perspective in all subject areas, as well as met the requirements mandated by Alberta Education.

There were nine teachers and six support staff in the 2024-2025 school year. Mrs. Hilsabeck taught our pre-kindergarten students, with assistance from Mrs. Elias. Mrs. Maxwell taught the kindergarten children, with assistance from Mrs. Elias. Miss Ronda was the homeroom teacher for grades one and two. In addition to being the homeroom teacher for grades three and four, Mrs. Bray also held the principal position. Mrs. Kornelsen and Mrs. Bueckert shared the homeroom teacher position for grades five and six students. Miss Berrington was the homeroom teacher for grades seven, eight, and nine. Mrs. Anghelone taught junior high math and science, as well as science and computers to grades three and four. All teachers taught a variety of complementary courses such as Bible, art, health, physical education, and computers. Miss Rosalee taught music to our students. Grades one to nine special needs students were under the care of our education assistant Miss Fritz and Mr. Taekema assisted with some of our special needs programming. Miss Robyn drove one of our busses to the Calmar and surrounding areas until Christmas and then Miss Verna joined our team for a short time. Mr. Thiessen drove another one of our busses to the Parkland area and Town of Devon. Mrs. Thiessen served as our custodian and Mrs. Martens filled the administrative assistant position.

At Devon Christian School we focus on the spiritual, academic, social, emotional, and physical components of education. Our greatest desire is to guide each child to God and pray that each student develops a personal relationship with their Savior. Each student is also encouraged to achieve their highest academic potential. We were so proud of our students' accomplishments last year. Here are a few of our accomplishments from the 2024-2025 school year:

1. Our students displayed Christ-like attitudes whenever they were out in our community on field trips, outreaches, and events. They were regularly praised for their exceptional behavior from people outside of our Devon Christian School family.
2. We felt an overwhelming gratitude to participate in our local community and to extend our hearts and hands to communities far and wide through our monthly outreaches. This year, some of our most cherished moments have unfolded in the following endeavors:
  - Our students walked or ran a total of 513 kilometres on our Terry Fox Run and raised \$466.00 for the Terry Fox Foundation.

- Our Devon Christian School families collected 100 Operation Christmas Child shoeboxes for needy children around the world.
  - The students and staff visited the Devon Hospital and the Devon Discovery Seniors Residence several times in the 2024-2025 school year. Our precious children are in demand as they are so loved by the patients and residents!
  - Our Devon Christian School family collected over 744 pounds of food for the Leduc and District Food Bank Association - more than double what we collected last year!
  - In our Socks of Love outreach, our Devon Christian School family collected 217 pairs of warm socks to wrap the less fortunate in our community in warm and compassion.
  - Students and staff were blessed to be able to participate in the Pitch in Devon event in the spring. Our students worked so hard with cheerful attitudes and collected over 20 big bags of garbage and had lots of fun doing it!
  - Over the duration of the school year, students purchased items from our “Sweet Shop” to support our World Vision child, Anthony, from Honduras.
3. Many awards were given to our students at our Year End Celebration. A couple of the highlights were:
    - 56% of our grade one to nine students were on the Honour Roll which means they earned an average of 80% or greater in all subjects.
    - 100% of our grade one to nine students did an outstanding job reciting their Scripture memory passage (James 2:1-26 and James 3:1-2) and earned Christian Character Certificates for demonstrating personal growth in the fruit of the Spirit.
  4. 100% of grades six and nine Devon Christian School students achieved the Acceptable Standard on the Alberta Provincial Achievement Tests. (*The Alberta Education provincial average was 64%.*)
  5. 30% of grades six and nine Devon Christian School students achieved the Standard of Excellence on the Alberta Provincial Achievement Tests. (*The Alberta Education provincial average was 17%.*)
  6. 98% of teachers and parents agree that students are taught attitudes and behaviours that will make them successful at work when they finish school. (*The Alberta Education provincial average was 84%.*)
  7. 98% of teachers and parents are satisfied that students demonstrate the knowledge, skills, and attitudes necessary for lifelong learning. (*The Alberta Education provincial average was 81%.*)
  8. 95% of teachers, parents, and students agreed that the learning environment is welcoming, caring, respectful, and safe. (*The Alberta Education provincial average was 87%.*)
  9. 93% of teachers, parents and students are satisfied that students model the characteristics of active citizenship. (*The Alberta Education provincial average was 80%.*)

10. Approximately 60% of our students invested their time, energy, and enthusiasm into after-school clubs at various points throughout the year. Our diverse selection of clubs offered opportunities for creativity, growth, and meaningful connection, including: Art Club, K'Nex Club, Construction Club, Olympics Club, and various Sports Clubs.
11. All our students participated in a wide variety of field trips. Some of them were to the following locations: Devon Recycling Depot, Rabbit Hill Snow Resort, Calmar Curling Club, Fort Edmonton Park, University of Alberta, Behrends Group Manufacturing, Clifford E. Lee Nature Sanctuary, Devon Fire Station, Devon Pool, Dale Fisher Arena, Camp Nakamun, and Activate Edmonton.
12. Our students had the opportunity to participate in several on-site learning experiences led by experts in their respective fields. These enriching activities included: Futsal, an Iqaluit and Inuit cultural presentation, the Zoo2U animal encounter, a visit from the Devon Lions Club, a critical-thinking workshop by Teacher's Pet Educational Services ("World of Meteghan, Nova Scotia"), the Breadlady presentation, and hands-on Food Studies sessions.
13. We had a 20% Kindergarten - Grade 9 enrollment increase from the 2023-2024 to the 2024-2025 school year!
14. We received an incredibly generous donation of 22 brand new laptops and Chromebooks for our computer lab from one of our stakeholders.

We are extremely grateful to have dedicated and supportive parents at Devon Christian School. Parents who serve on the Board generously give hundreds of hours of their time to the students, staff, and society to effectively govern our school. Devon Christian School could not operate without them. We also have a vast number of parents who volunteer for many events, field trips, and programs over the course of the school year. We are incredibly thankful for each and every member of our Devon Christian School family! We have been remarkably blessed with a Christian atmosphere that encourages our students to shine both spiritually and academically. We cherish your regular prayers as we seek the Lord's will for HIS school. To God be the glory!

## TREASURER'S REPORT

**2024 - 2025**

Since the pandemic, the Alberta Government has changed the model for school funding to reflect a three-year average attendance as has been mentioned in previous Annual General Meeting reports. Devon Christian School has seen significant growth in student numbers, and this is beginning to be reflected in the funding we are receiving.

Fundraising participation continued to decrease in the 2024-2025 school year. This trend played a large role in the decision to move to a Tuition model for the 2025-2026 school year. The lack of fundraising income, was, however, offset by the many generous donations given by school families and friends in this school year. We thank God for the gifts!

Unfortunately, we continue to struggle to maintain a balanced budget as we had another significant deficit for the 2024-2025 school year. Even though we accumulated a deficit, we are financially stable. We want to continue to grow and bring the Word of God out to our community and surrounding areas.

As a private school, we receive funding from Alberta Education at a rate of approximately 60% that of public schools. God's economy is our economy. What happens locally, nationally or globally may affect us, but we are not dependant on that. As such, we rely on God and His provision to cover all the operational expenses. At the same time, we seek to remain diligent and responsible in our expenditures.

Let's remember to keep praying and asking for His provision! Your continued support is very much appreciated and needed.
