You are welcome at St. James Episcopal Cathedral!

At St. James Episcopal Cathedral, we embrace the teachings of Jesus Christ, seeking to follow His example of love, compassion, and justice. We strive to be a community that welcomes and celebrates diversity, honoring the dignity and worth of every human being. Here, you will find a place where questions are encouraged, doubts are welcomed, and the journey of faith is nurtured.

On Sundays we have a service in English at 8 a.m. in the Chapel, at 9:30 a.m. we have a service in English in the Cathedral, and at 11:30 a.m. we have a service in Spanish in the Cathedral; however service times may change for major feast days and special services. In between the 9:30 and 11:30 a.m. service each week, you are invited to join us for Coffee Hour in the Fireside Room. The restrooms are at the back of the Cathedral. An usher will be happy to direct you. If you are interested in hearing more from the Cathedral, please fill out the Welcome Card located in the chairback in front of you. You can place the card in the offering plate or give it to an usher or member of the clergy. You can also follow us on social media using the QR code on the Welcome Card!

Children at St James Cathedral – Sunday School on Summer Break

There is a soft space play area at the back of the Cathedral. It is intended for those moments when little ones – or anyone – might need a break from the service. There are children's Church Activity Bags and coloring pages available in the narthex (just inside the main doors) to use during the church service. During the school year, we offer Sunday School on the first and third Sundays of the month. Check In begins at 9:15 a.m. in the Cathedral Narthex. Our Sunday School teachers will provide information for new students and parents.

Guide to the worship service

This booklet contains the main text of the service – what the people and clergy say and do. This comes from *The Book of Common Prayer*, the prayer book of The Episcopal Church. *The Book of Common Prayer* (BCP) page numbers are listed throughout this booklet if you would like to refer to the text in the red prayer books located in front of you in the back of each chair.

The readings and music specific for each week are found on the leaflet available at the main doors. Hymns are found in the blue *Hymnal 1982* in the back of each chair. You are welcome to participate as fully as seems right to you. We also welcome questions!

The text that the congregation says aloud is in bold. *Italics indicate instructions.*

Standing, sitting, and kneeling

Generally – follow along with the clergy and altar servers. Stand as able for hymns, the Gospel proclamation, the Nicene Creed, the prayers, and the final blessing. You may sit for the readings and the sermon. You may stand or kneel for the confession and during the eucharistic prayer.

Acts of personal devotion – these are optional gestures that some people might make

You may make the sign of cross at +

You may bow your head as the cross and the Gospel book pass near you in procession.

You may bow at the name of Jesus throughout the liturgy.

You may genuflect (briefly kneel) or bow when exiting your row for communion.

Stand as able

Presider and People:

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead,+ and the life of the world to come. Amen.

The Prayers of the People

Deacon or Lay Leader:

Holy God, in whose son Jesus Christ we live and move and have our being, send your Holy Spirit among us as we seek to live out our faith in this season. Hear the fervent prayers of your people as we ask of you:

For this nation and all in authority, that they may be guided by the love that Jesus modeled and commanded of us. As we celebrate the 250th birthday of our nation, help us reclaim the idealism and hope of our country at its birth. For the good of all people of the world: for health, for healing, for righteousness in all our actions, that those who govern may do so with love and fairness for all.

Gracious God, teach and guide your people.

We pray especially for those who suffer from illness, sorrow, depression, economic hardship, injustice, or any distress, especially those we now name, silently or aloud. *(Pause)*. Hear the cries of your people, and make your loving presence known to all.

Gracious God, teach and guide your people.

We pray for those who have died: those known to us, and those unknown, especially those we now name, silently or aloud: _____ (*Pause*).

Holy God, hear the fervent prayers of your people. Be with us as we seek to live out the Christian faith we profess, listening for the voice of the Holy Spirit and seeking to be the Love Jesus has taught us by his death and resurrection. ***Amen.***

Remain standing or kneel as able

Deacon or Presider:

Let us confess our sins against God and our neighbor.

Silence may be kept.

Most merciful God, we confess that we have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done, and by what we have left undone. We have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We are truly sorry and we humbly repent. For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, have mercy on us and forgive us; that we may delight in your will, and walk in your ways, to the glory of your Name. Amen.

Presider:

Almighty God have mercy on you, + forgive you all your sins through our Lord Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep you in eternal life. Amen.

Presider:

We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, “Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me.” Therefore, according to his command, O Father,

Presider and People:

**We remember his death,
We proclaim his resurrection,
We await his coming in glory;**

And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Lord of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine. We pray you, gracious God, to send your Holy Spirit upon these gifts that they may be the Sacrament of the Body of Christ and his Blood of the new Covenant. Unite us to your Son in his sacrifice, + that we may be acceptable through him, being sanctified by the Holy Spirit. In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us to that heavenly country where, with James and all your saints, we may enter the everlasting heritage of your sons and daughters; through Jesus Christ our Lord, the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation.

By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **AMEN.**

And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory for ever and ever. Amen.

The Presider breaks the consecrated Bread. A period of silence is kept.

Presider: Alleluia. Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us;

People: **Therefore, let us keep the feast. Alleluia.**

Facing the people, the Presider says the following Invitation:

Presider: God’s holy gifts, for God’s holy people.

THOSE RECEIVING HOLY COMMUNION:

All baptized Christians are invited to receive communion. It is the custom to come forward and place the palm of one hand in the other to receive the bread. Please tell the clergy distributing communion if you prefer a gluten-free wafer. You are welcome to drink from the chalice or the server will intinct for you. You may make the sign of the cross before or after you receive communion. Upon returning to your seat, you may kneel or be seated.

FOR THOSE WHO WISH TO RECEIVE A BLESSING IN LIEU OF COMMUNION:

It is the custom to come forward and to fold your arms across your chest in an X-fashion, which indicates that you are not receiving the sacrament. The Priest will offer a prayer of blessing for you.

Send us now into the world in peace, and grant us strength and courage to love and serve you with gladness and singleness of heart; through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Birthday/Anniversary Blessing – BCP pg. 830

Presider and People: O God, our times are in your hand: Look with favor, we pray, on your servants as they begin another year. Grant that they may grow in wisdom and grace, and strengthen their trust in your goodness all the days of their lives; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

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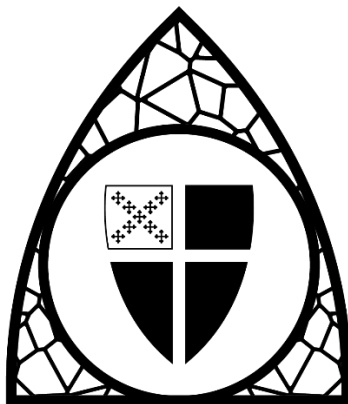


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
