SESSION TITLE

Understanding Our Assignment vs. God's Assignment

Main Scripture

- Acts 1:8
- John 6:44
- 1 Corinthians 3:6–7

SESSION PURPOSE

This session teaches believers how to share the Gospel wisely without pressure, manipulation, argument, or fear.

Students will learn the difference between:

- Our responsibility
- God's responsibility

Many believers become discouraged because they try to do God's work instead of their own assignment.

This session establishes a biblical foundation for wise evangelism.

KEY TEACHING STATEMENT

“We are witnesses, not saviors.”

SESSION OBJECTIVES

By the end of this session, students should understand:

1. God is the One who changes hearts.
2. Our job is to faithfully witness.
3. Evangelism is planting and watering.
4. Pressure and debate often damage relationships.
5. Wisdom and love must guide Gospel conversations.
6. The Holy Spirit is the true evangelist.

TEACHER INTRODUCTION (Opening – 5 Minutes)

Suggested Opening

Ask students:

“Have you ever tried to share the Gospel and felt frustrated because the person did not respond?”

Allow brief answers.

Then say:

“Many Christians carry unnecessary guilt because they think salvation depends on them. But Scripture teaches something different. We are called to witness faithfully, but only God can open a human heart.”

MAIN TEACHING OUTLINE

PART 1 — OUR ASSIGNMENT

Scripture

Acts 1:8

“You shall be witnesses to Me...”

Teaching Points

We Are Witnesses

A witness does not force a verdict.

A witness simply shares what they have seen and experienced.

We Share Christ

Our goal is not:

- Winning arguments
- Defeating people
- Proving superiority

Our goal is:

- Revealing Jesus
- Demonstrating His love
- Speaking truth with wisdom

Evangelism Is Seed Planting

Not every conversation produces immediate fruit.

Some people:

- Hear
- Think
- Struggle
- Resist
- Return later

God works over time.

Teacher Illustration

Ask:

“When a farmer plants a seed, does he scream at the soil to grow?”

Of course not.

Growth takes:

- Time
- Water
- Sunlight
- Patience

The same is true spiritually.

PART 2 — GOD’S ASSIGNMENT

Scripture

John 6:44

“No one can come to Me unless the Father who sent Me draws him.”

Teaching Points

God Draws Hearts

Conviction is the work of the Holy Spirit.

We cannot:

- Force repentance
- Manufacture faith
- Create spiritual hunger

Only God can awaken the soul.

Important Principle

Revelation comes before transformation.

A person cannot genuinely follow Christ until God reveals truth to their heart.

Teacher Emphasis

Tell students:

“Do not carry pressure that belongs to God.”

Many believers:

- Burn out
- Become aggressive
- Get discouraged

Because they confuse:

- witnessing with
- saving people

Only Jesus saves.

PART 3 — THE PRINCIPLE OF PLANTING AND WATERING

Scripture

1 Corinthians 3:6–7

“I planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the increase.”

Teaching Breakdown

Human Responsibility	God’s Responsibility
Plant	Give growth
Water	Transform heart
Love people	Save people
Speak truth	Produce conviction
Pray	Bring revelation

KEY PRINCIPLE

“Success in evangelism is faithfulness, not results.”

PART 4 — SHARING CHRIST WISELY

Teaching Points

Wise Evangelism Is Relational

People listen more deeply when they feel:

- Respected
- Heard
- Loved
- Safe

Avoid Combat Christianity

Do not:

- Humiliate people
- Mock religions
- Attack culture aggressively
- Try to win debates publicly

Especially with:

- Muslims
- Jews
- Skeptics
- Hurt people

Teacher Statement

“A closed heart rarely opens through pressure, but many hearts open through love, patience, and wisdom.”

JESUS AS OUR MODEL

Scripture

John 4 — Jesus and the Samaritan Woman

Teaching Observations

Jesus:

- Started with conversation
- Asked questions
- Built connection
- Revealed truth gradually
- Did not begin with condemnation

Important Lesson

Relationship often becomes the bridge for revelation.

PRACTICAL APPLICATIONS

What Should We Do?

1. Pray Before Speaking

Ask the Holy Spirit:

- When to speak
- What to say
- When to stay silent

2. Listen Carefully

People reveal their pain if we truly listen.

3. Ask Questions

Questions open hearts better than arguments.

Examples:

- “What do you believe about God?”
- “What has your spiritual journey been like?”
- “Can I share my personal experience?”

4. Share Testimony

Personal testimony is powerful because people cannot argue with your experience.

5. Leave Room for Process

Some people need:

- Months
- Years
- Multiple encounters

God is patient.

We must also be patient.

COMMON MISTAKES IN EVANGELISM

Mistake	Better Approach
Arguing	Listening
Pressuring	Inviting
Condemning	Loving
Talking too much	Asking questions
Trying to win	Trying to reach hearts

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

1. Why do many Christians feel pressure during evangelism?
2. What is the difference between witnessing and saving?
3. Why is patience important in Gospel conversations?

4. What can we learn from Jesus and the Samaritan woman?
5. Have you ever experienced someone sharing Christ wisely with you?

PRACTICAL EXERCISE

Exercise: “Seed Planting”

Divide students into pairs.

One person acts as:

- a seeker
- a Muslim
- a skeptical friend
- a hurting person

The other practices:

- listening
- asking questions
- sharing gently

Focus:

NOT debating

BUT building connection.

MEMORY VERSE

1 Corinthians 3:7

“Neither he who plants is anything, nor he who waters, but God who gives the increase.”

FINAL CHALLENGE

Tell students:

“Your responsibility is obedience, not outcome. God never asked you to save people. He asked you to faithfully represent Jesus.”

CLOSING PRAYER

“Lord Jesus, teach us to share Your truth with wisdom, humility, and love. Help us trust the Holy Spirit instead of human pressure. Make us faithful witnesses who reflect Your heart. Give us discernment, patience, and compassion as we reach people for Your Kingdom. In Jesus’ name, Amen.”

TEACHER NOTES (Private Guide)

Main Goal of This Session

Remove fear and unhealthy pressure from evangelism.

Emotional Goal

Students should leave:

- encouraged
- lighter
- confident
- Spirit-dependent

NOT:

- guilty
- pressured
- argumentative

Important Reminder for Teacher

Avoid sounding passive.

Wise evangelism does NOT mean silence.

It means:

- courage with wisdom
- truth with love
- boldness with humility

SESSION TWO

Introducing Truth Too Quickly Can Create Rejected Truth

Teacher's Training Manual for

SESSION PURPOSE

This session teaches believers how to wisely introduce spiritual truth without overwhelming, offending, or prematurely closing the heart of the listener.

Many Christians present deep truths too quickly before trust, relationship, and spiritual hunger are developed. The result is often not rejection of Christ Himself—but rejection of the way truth was delivered.

This session helps students understand:

- Timing matters
- Wisdom matters
- Relationship matters
- Spiritual sensitivity matters
- Jesus often revealed truth progressively
- The Holy Spirit prepares hearts gradually

MAIN SCRIPTURE FOUNDATIONS

Proverbs 25:11

“A word fitly spoken is like apples of gold in settings of silver.”

Teacher Explanation

Truth is powerful, but timing gives truth beauty and effectiveness.

Even correct truth spoken at the wrong time can create resistance.

Ecclesiastes 3:1

“To everything there is a season, a time for every purpose under heaven.”

Teacher Explanation

Evangelism has seasons:

- Listening season
- Friendship season
- Question season
- Curiosity season
- Revelation season
- Invitation season

Many believers try to jump directly to harvest season without first planting and watering.

John 16:12

“I still have many things to say to you, but you cannot bear them now.”

Teacher Explanation

Even Jesus Himself did not reveal everything immediately.

Why?

Because people were not ready.

If Jesus used progressive revelation, we also must learn wisdom and patience.

Mark 4:33

“And with many such parables He spoke the word to them as they were able to hear it.”

Teacher Explanation

Jesus adjusted His teaching according to people’s ability to receive.

This is not compromise.

This is wisdom.

CORE TEACHING PRINCIPLE

“Unprepared truth often becomes rejected truth.”

Many Muslims, Jews, atheists, secular people, or wounded people reject not because truth is false—

but because:

- trust was missing
- relationship was missing
- understanding was missing
- timing was wrong
- delivery lacked wisdom

TEACHING OUTLINE

PART 1 — THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN SEED AND HARVEST

Key Principle

Not every conversation is meant to end with salvation prayer.

Some conversations are:

- seed planting
- bridge building
- trust creating
- curiosity awakening
- misconception removing

1 Corinthians 3:6–7

“I planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the increase.”

Teacher Notes

Students must understand:

- We are not responsible for forcing results.
- We are responsible for faithful obedience.
- Different people play different roles.

Sometimes:

- You plant
- Someone else waters
- Another person harvests

Teacher Illustration

If a farmer plants seed today and digs it up tomorrow to check growth, the seed dies.

The same happens spiritually when we pressure people too quickly.

PART 2 — JESUS DID NOT FORCE REVELATION

Example 1 — Woman at the Well

John 4

Jesus did NOT begin with:

- “I am the Messiah.”
- “You are sinful.”
- “Repent immediately.”

He began with:

- conversation
- water
- dignity
- relationship
- curiosity

Only later did He reveal deeper truth.

Teacher Emphasis

Jesus first won:

- attention
- trust
- openness

Then He introduced truth progressively.

Example 2 — Road to Emmaus

Luke 24:13–35

Jesus walked with them before revealing Himself.

He listened first.

He explained Scripture gradually.

Only later were their eyes opened.

Teacher Application

Many Christians reveal conclusions before building journey.

But Jesus often created journey first.

PART 3 — WHY PEOPLE REJECT TRUTH TOO QUICKLY

A. Identity Shock

When truth attacks identity immediately, people instinctively defend themselves.

Especially:

- Muslims
- Jews
- atheists
- people from strong cultural backgrounds

Teacher Insight

For many Muslims:

Islam is not only religion.

It is:

- family
- culture
- identity
- history
- honor

- community

If we attack Islam aggressively,
they often feel personally attacked.

Proverbs 15:1

“A soft answer turns away wrath, but a harsh word stirs up anger.”

B. Fear Barrier

People fear:

- rejection
- losing family
- shame
- social isolation
- persecution
- confusion

Sometimes they are listening internally long before they openly agree externally.

C. Information Overload

Some believers dump:

- theology
- prophecy
- apologetics
- end-times
- Trinity debates
- church systems

all in one conversation.

The listener becomes overwhelmed.

Teacher Principle

Wisdom asks:

“What truth is this person ready for today?”

PART 4 — JESUS USED QUESTIONS MORE THAN ARGUMENTS

Important Observation

Jesus often asked questions.

Examples:

- “Who do you say that I am?”
- “What do you seek?”
- “Do you want to be made well?”
- “Why are you afraid?”

Teacher Explanation

Questions:

- open hearts
- create thinking
- reduce defensiveness
- invite participation

Arguments often create walls.

James 1:19

“Let every man be swift to hear, slow to speak, slow to wrath.”

PRACTICAL TRAINING SECTION

WHAT SHOULD WE DO INSTEAD?

1. Build Relationship First

People receive truth better from someone they trust.

Teacher Application

Encourage students to:

- eat with people
- listen to stories
- show hospitality
- care genuinely
- remember names
- ask questions

2. Create Curiosity

Instead of forcing conclusions,
awaken hunger.

Example:

- “Can I share something that changed my life?”
- “May I ask your perspective?”
- “Would you like to hear why Jesus is important to me?”

3. Give Bite-Sized Truth

Do not dump everything at once.

Jesus often gave:

- one parable
- one truth
- one challenge
- one seed

4. Learn Spiritual Discernment

Not every door is open at the same level.

Teacher Emphasis

Ask the Holy Spirit:

- “What should I say?”
- “What should I not say yet?”
- “Should I speak or listen?”

Luke 12:12

“For the Holy Spirit will teach you in that very hour what you ought to say.”

PART 5 — THE DANGER OF WINNING ARGUMENTS BUT LOSING HEARTS

Key Principle

You can win intellectually and still fail spiritually.

2 Timothy 2:24–25

“And a servant of the Lord must not quarrel but be gentle to all, able to teach, patient, in humility correcting those who are in opposition...”

Teacher Explanation

Harsh debate may:

- damage openness
- create pride
- produce emotional resistance
- harden future conversations

The goal is not:

“I defeated you.”

The goal is:

“I represented Christ well.”

HEARTSBRIDGE PRINCIPLE

“Bridge before burden.”

Do not place heavy truth before building safe relational bridge.

GROUP DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

1. Have you ever introduced truth too quickly?
2. What happened?
3. Why do people become defensive?
4. How did Jesus gradually reveal truth?
5. What is the difference between planting and harvesting?
6. Why are questions powerful?
7. How can we discern spiritual timing?

PRACTICAL EXERCISE

Roleplay Activity

Scenario 1

A Muslim coworker asks:

“Why are Christians always trying to convert people?”

Students practice:

- gentle response
- curiosity
- non-defensive tone

Scenario 2

Someone says:

“I respect Jesus, but I don’t believe Christianity.”

Students practice:

- listening first
- asking questions
- avoiding argument mode

TEACHER WARNING SECTION

Avoid teaching students:

- manipulation
- fake friendship
- hidden agenda relationships

People are not projects.

We genuinely love people whether they accept Christ or not.

IMPORTANT BALANCE

Wisdom is NOT compromise.

Patience is NOT fear.

Gentleness is NOT weakness.

Jesus was:

- truthful
- bold
- compassionate
- patient
- discerning

FINAL TEACHING SUMMARY

Remember:

- Timing matters
- Delivery matters

- Relationship matters
- Listening matters
- Discernment matters
- The Holy Spirit prepares hearts gradually

FINAL KEY STATEMENTS

“Truth without wisdom can create resistance.”

“People rarely care how much you know until they know how much you care.”

“A prepared heart receives truth differently than a pressured heart.”

“We are bridge builders, not argument collectors.”

FINAL SCRIPTURE

Colossians 4:5–6

“Walk in wisdom toward those who are outside... Let your speech always be with grace, seasoned with salt, that you may know how you ought to answer each one.”

HOMEWORK FOR STUDENTS

1. Read John chapter 4 carefully.
2. Observe how Jesus guided conversation.
3. Practice asking questions instead of arguing.
4. Pray daily for wisdom in evangelism.
5. Write one example where timing could change the outcome of a conversation.

CLOSING PRAYER

“Lord Jesus, teach us to represent You with wisdom, grace, patience, and truth. Help us discern hearts, respect timing, and follow the leading of the Holy Spirit. Make us bridge builders who prepare hearts for Your Kingdom. In Jesus’ name, Amen.”

SESSION OVERVIEW

Main Theme

One of the greatest mistakes many believers make when sharing Christ with Muslims or religious people is trying to force the full divinity of Jesus immediately before building understanding, trust, and biblical foundation.

Jesus Himself often revealed His identity progressively.

He walked with people.

He listened.

He healed.

He taught.

He demonstrated compassion.

He revealed authority.

Then hearts slowly opened to deeper revelation.

This session teaches how Jesus often presented Himself in human relationship before people fully understood His divine nature.

MAIN OBJECTIVES

By the end of this session students should understand:

- Why progressive revelation matters in evangelism
- How Jesus revealed Himself gradually in Scripture
- Why Muslims often first connect with Jesus as prophet, teacher, healer, or Messiah
- How relationship opens the door to revelation
- Why arguing about divinity too early often creates unnecessary barriers
- How the Holy Spirit reveals Christ step by step

FOUNDATION SCRIPTURES

John 1:14

“And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we beheld His glory...”

Teaching Point

Jesus did not merely appear divine from heaven in overwhelming glory.
He came near.

He became flesh.
He entered humanity.

The incarnation itself is God choosing relationship before confrontation.

Philippians 2:5–8

“Who, being in the form of God, did not consider it robbery to be equal with God, but made Himself of no reputation, taking the form of a bondservant...”

Teaching Point

Jesus humbled Himself first.

This teaches us an evangelism principle:
Humility opens doors that pride cannot.

Luke 24:13–35 — The Road to Emmaus

Teacher Observation

Notice:
Jesus did not immediately announce:
“I am the resurrected Son of God!”

Instead:

- He walked with them
- Asked questions
- Listened to their pain
- Opened Scripture gradually
- Revealed Himself later

Evangelism Principle

Relationship often prepares the heart for revelation.

KEY TEACHING PRINCIPLE

Revelation Usually Comes Step by Step

Most Muslims do not begin by accepting:

- Trinity
- Son of God
- Crucifixion
- Resurrection
- Divinity of Christ

But many are willing to discuss:

- Jesus as prophet
- Jesus as miracle worker
- Jesus as Messiah
- Jesus as sinless
- Jesus as healer
- Jesus as compassionate

This becomes a bridge.

Do not despise small beginnings.

IMPORTANT WARNING FOR TEACHERS

Do NOT Hide the Truth

Wisdom is not compromise.

We are not denying Christ's divinity.

We are simply recognizing:

People often need a journey before understanding deeper truth.

Jesus never lied.

But He often revealed truth progressively.

EXAMPLES FROM THE GOSPELS

1. The Samaritan Woman — John 4

Jesus began with:

“Give Me a drink.”

He started naturally.

Then:

- conversation
- curiosity
- spiritual thirst
- prophetic insight
- Messiah revelation

He did not start with theological argument.

Teacher Insight

Many believers begin at level 10 while the listener is still at level 1.

2. Blind Man Healed — John 9

The man's understanding of Jesus grew progressively:

First:

“A man called Jesus...”

Later:

“He is a prophet.”

Later:

“If this Man were not from God...”

Finally:

He worshipped Jesus.

Teaching Point

Spiritual understanding develops progressively.

3. Peter's Revelation — Matthew 16:13–17

Jesus asked:

“Who do people say that I am?”

Then:

“Who do YOU say that I am?”

Peter’s revelation came from the Father.

Teacher Principle

Revelation cannot be forced by debate alone.

The Holy Spirit must open eyes.

HEARTSBRIDGE PRINCIPLE

Invitation Before Expectation

Do not demand mature theology from someone who just started seeking truth.

Allow space for journey.

Many Muslims first fall in love with:

- the character of Jesus
- the mercy of Jesus
- the purity of Jesus
- the peace of Jesus

Before fully understanding:

- incarnation
- Trinity
- atonement

COMMON MISTAKES IN EVANGELISM

Mistake 1 — Starting With Debate

Immediately attacking Islam usually closes hearts.

Better Approach

Start with Christ.

Mistake 2 — Forcing Theology Too Quickly

People may reject truths they have not yet understood.

Mistake 3 — Winning Arguments but Losing People

Truth without love often creates walls.

IMPORTANT THEOLOGICAL BALANCE

Jesus Was Fully Human AND Fully Divine

We must never deny either truth.

Hebrews 4:15

“He was tempted in all points as we are, yet without sin.”

Colossians 2:9

“For in Him dwells all the fullness of the Godhead bodily.”

Jesus is:

- fully man
- fully God

This mystery is foundational Christianity.

HOW THIS APPLIES TO MUSLIM MINISTRY

Why Muslims Often Resist Quickly

Many Muslims have been taught:

- Christians worship three gods

- Jesus never claimed divinity
- the Bible is corrupted
- the cross is false

If we begin aggressively,
their defense system activates immediately.

Better Approach

Introduce Jesus through:

- stories
- compassion
- miracles
- Scripture
- testimony
- relationship

Let the Holy Spirit reveal deeper truth.

TEACHER APPLICATION

Ask Students

Question 1

Why do you think Jesus often revealed Himself progressively?

Question 2

What happens when we pressure people too quickly?

Question 3

How can relationship become a bridge for revelation?

Question 4

What is the difference between wisdom and compromise?

PRACTICAL TRAINING EXERCISE

Exercise: Build a Conversation Bridge

Have students practice beginning a spiritual conversation WITHOUT immediately debating theology.

Example Starters

- “What do you think about Jesus?”
- “Have you ever read the Injil?”
- “What is your understanding of Isa?”
- “Can I share why Jesus changed my life?”

TEACHER NOTES

Important Reminder

The goal is not manipulation.

The goal is:

- wisdom
- patience
- love
- Spirit-led evangelism

KEY HEARTSBRIDGE STATEMENTS

- Relationship often opens doors that arguments cannot.
- Revelation is God’s work.
- We introduce Christ; the Holy Spirit reveals Him.
- Jesus walked with people before many worshipped Him.
- Truth must be spoken with wisdom and love.

STUDENT NOTES (HANDOUT SECTION)

Main Ideas to Remember

- 1. Jesus often revealed Himself progressively.**

- 2. Relationship prepares hearts for revelation.**
- 3. Muslims may first accept Jesus as prophet before understanding Him as Lord.**
- 4. Debate alone rarely changes hearts.**
- 5. The Holy Spirit brings revelation.**
- 6. Wisdom is not compromise.**
- 7. Jesus is fully human and fully divine.**

1. Why is patience important in evangelism?
2. Which Gospel story best demonstrates progressive revelation?
3. Have you ever seen someone pushed away by aggressive evangelism?
4. How can we stay truthful without becoming argumentative?
5. Why does relationship matter in Gospel ministry?

MEMORY VERSE

John 1:14

“And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us...”

FINAL CHALLENGE

Do not rush people faster than the Holy Spirit is working.

Walk with people.

Listen carefully.

Love genuinely.

Speak truth wisely.

And trust God to reveal Christ fully in His timing.

CLOSING PRAYER

“Lord Jesus, give us wisdom when we share Your truth. Help us to walk with people patiently and lovingly. Teach us to depend on the Holy Spirit instead of human argument. Give us discernment to know when to speak, when to listen, and how to reveal Your heart faithfully. In Jesus’ name, Amen.”
