IMPACT MISSION CAMPS IN ACTION

The impact of the Alma Hunt Offering is felt in the lives of students across Virginia each year. Last summer, youth groups from twentyfour churches served in four communities through Impact Mission Camps, stepping into hands-on opportunities to live out their faith. Throughout the week, students work on projects that help keep homeowners safe, warm, and dry, but the mission goes far beyond construction. Alongside experienced adult leaders, they learn practical skills, build meaningful relationships with homeowners, and grow in confidence as they take on leadership roles both on the job site and in worship. Young adults also serve as camp staff, which gives them the opportunity to develop leadership skills and understand their calling more fully. By the end of the week, students haven't just repaired roofs or built ramps—they've discovered what it means to serve with purpose. They begin to see mission not as a one-time experience, but as a way to live out their faith in their community year-round. Last summer, twenty-four projects were completed, but the greater impact can't be measured in numbers alone. Students left knowing they are deeply loved by God and called to reflect that love through service in their communities and beyond.
